

Klamath Red Sox Shut Out by Redding, 3-0

PITCHERS JOIN IN MOUND DUEL

Local Batmen Unable to Produce Hits in Pinches.

Inability to hit in the pinches spelled defeat for the league-leading Klamath Red Sox Sunday afternoon in Redding, Calif., when the Oregonians lost a fast 3-0 contest to the suddenly inspired Redding Tigers.

The game, played in Coast league time of one hour and 45 minutes, sparkled with excellent hurling by Viscintainer of Redding and Carlstrom of the Red Sox. Each team completed three double plays to thrill the record crowd which filled the stands and stood on the outer edge of the turf.

Red Sox sluggers found the slants of little right-handed Viscintainer to be very lean for base knockers, collecting seven scattered singles. Only one Red Sox player reached third during the fray. In six of the nine innings, only three Klamathites faced Viscintainer per frame, so sloozy was his pitching, together with excellent support by his teammates.

Redding scored first in the fourth inning. Wickert grounded out, shortstop to first. Flowers raced to third on a Klamath error in fielding DeForest's ground ball. Gullison walked, filling the bases. Koehler, Redding catcher and former Coast leaguer, singled, scoring Flowers for the first run of the day.

Coming back in the fifth, Redding scored two runs, making the total 3-0. With Carlstrom pitching stellar ball, the Californians were held scoreless the remainder of the game.

The two teams were evenly matched. Redding collected nine base hits to Klamath's seven. Carlstrom struck out five Tigers and Viscintainer whiffed two Red Sox. Each club made one base and executed one sacrifice play.

Dick Comstock, lashing out two singles, was the only Sox player to get more than one base hit. Flowers of Redding lashed out a double in the fourth for the longest hit of the day.

Just how the first four teams in the Northern California league now stand depends on the outcome of a protested game by Mt. Shasta against Weed Sons of Italy. If the league directors give the game outright to Mt. Shasta, Weed Sons and Mt. Shasta will be tied for second place. Should the game go to Weed Sons, Klamath and Weed will be tied for first place. In any event, the game will not be replayed, but will be given to one or the other of the above-mentioned clubs.

The big play-off series starts in Klamath Falls next Sunday, but the Red Sox opposition in the semi-finals will not be known until Tuesday, when a decision is rendered over the protested game. Neutral umpires will be on hand for the fray on Modoc field, coming from other league cities. From all indications the opposition in the semi-finals will be either Mt. Shasta or Weed Sons of Italy.

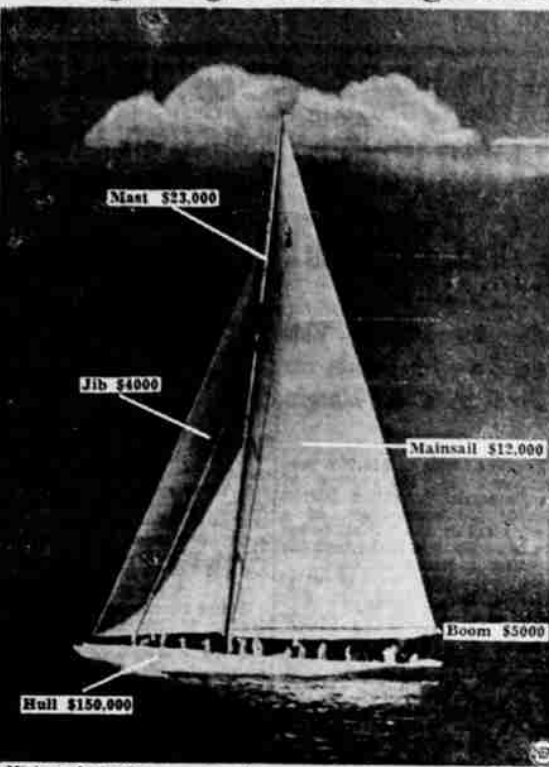

GRUDGE MATCH ON MAT SLATE

Savich, Clemens to Meet Tuesday in Return Main Event.

Another grudge match—one with a new twist—will be on tap at the Klamath armory Tuesday night, and local wrestling fans Monday were looking forward to a high grade of excitement and the probability of a spectacular finish.

The two feudists are Frankie Clemens, Oklahoma "wonder boy," and Danny Savich, the ex-Utah all-American. It seems that this very pair met in the top main event a week ago, just as they will do again Tuesday night, and that they waged battle to a draw over the period of an hour, an hour which produced very invigorating developments.

The crux of the matter is that Savich, who in all previous appearances has always been a shining example of sweetness and light, got mad at Clemens' "Indian paralyzer," and cuffed the Oklahoma brawler and yon, even unto the dark, dank regions beneath the ring.

Savich claims that the "paralyzer" is no more nor less than a strange hold, and as such invites retribution in the manner which heroes are prone to employ when the going gets rough. That's why, he says, he put his fists in motion after undergoing an application of the "paralyzer" last Tuesday night, and that's why he declares he will steer the same course again, providing circumstances repeat themselves.

All over the baseball map they're climbing aboard the bandwagon for a Yankees-Cubs world series this fall, and the way things shape up now that's not a bad guess.

A lot of applicants can be up in the 10 weeks still to go before they start commuting between New York and Chicago for their peanuts, hot dogs and homages, particularly in that National league race, but at the current pace of the Cubs and Yanks it's going to be tough to turn the trick.

As usual, the standout possibility to kick over the dope bucket are those New York Giants. For one thing, they always have that annoying habit of riding along within shooting distance of the top until the final weeks and then helting the very best of everything in sight in a Frank Merriwell fashion. For another thing, their pitchers, who were collapsing at the rate of one a day less than two weeks ago, have been given that shot in the arm again and once more are doing business at the same old stand.

As a result, it's not going to be any too much of a dead cinch for the Cubs at best, despite their current six-game lead and what probably shapes up as the best balanced outfit in the loop. They knocked off Boston's Bees in both ends of a doubleheader Sunday, 3-0 and 2-2, on a one-hit, pitching performance by Tex Carleton in the opener and by

clouting comeback by Phil Cavaretta in both games. But there's always the ever-present chance, so far as the Cubs are concerned, that the batting slump bug will bite 'em if they don't watch out—and then where'll they be?

The double win boosted the Cubs' lead by half a game, since the Giants could get no better than an even break with their favorite "stogoes," the Pirates. They won the opener, 10-2, but Jim Weaver's three-hitter blanked them, 3-0, in the nightcap.

It's far easier to settle the American league business in advance. Nine and a half games in front, despite a pitching staff that's as full of holes as a bag-out of doughnuts, the Yankees look like a shoo-in from here.

With their deadly hitting, which in the past week alone has accounted for the astonishing average of something like eight runs on nine hits per game, they should wait in as long as they dish out the same brand of pitchers' poison. They squeaked through with a 5-3 win over Cleveland's collapsible Indians Sunday for their eighth success in a row.

The Boston Red Sox, in second place at the moment, stretched their undefeated run to 13 games by taking the White Sox, 7-6, in their opener, but then had the string snapped by a 13-0 wallop in the nightcap.

Joe Medwick belted two homers in the first game and the Cards took a 3-2 decision over the Phillies, but the best they could get was a 6-all draw in the nightcap, despite Ducky Wuck's third round-tripper, of the day.

The Reds and Dodgers also went to a nightcap deadlock, at one all, after the Reds won, 4-1, in the curtain raiser.

The Tigers topped the Senators, 5-1, in a game cut to five frames by rain. The Athletics surprised with a double triumph over the St. Louis Browns, 5-4 Carleton in the opener and by
