

WARNING ISSUED ON
ABANDONING BABIES

Klamath authorities issued two warnings to the public Monday.

Police and Mrs. Ida Grimes, county juvenile officer, advised parents against leaving little children in parked automobiles on the streets. The officers Saturday night found a year-old Dorris child in an automobile, and turned the child over to Mrs. Grimes for safekeeping until the mother could be found. The parents showed up later, after having attended a show.

Mrs. Grimes said that the practice of leaving small children in cars while the parents are gone for any length of time is "all too common." She pointed out that if the car doors are left unlocked, there is danger the child will somehow get out and wander away. If they are locked, police or others could not get into the car in case of accident.

Chief Frank Hamm of the city police added his sentiments to those of Mrs. Grimes, and issued another warning against the breaking of glass on the streets.

Hamm said that glass from broken headlights, broken bottles, etc., should be swept up by those who break it. Instead, he said, it is permitted to lie on the streets where it constitutes a serious hazard.

PRISONER DIES
IN LOCAL JAIL

F. W. Hillier, 32, died early Saturday morning in the city jail where he had been housed the day before on charges of drunkenness. Cause of death, according to Dr. George H. Adler, was heart failure due to acute alcoholism.

According to statements from prisoners in the city jail at the time of Hillier's death, he had been extremely nervous all Friday night and unable to sleep. He did not complain, however, of being ill, and death was sudden.

He had lived at the Colonial Inn at Eleventh and Main streets, and a search of his room revealed nine empty gallon wine jugs and many beer bottles. He told one fellow prisoner that he had been drunk for a week prior to his arrest.

Hillier is believed to have come here from Colorado, and an effort is being made to locate relatives.

He had been employed as an extra at the local S. P. yards.

The handicraft and activities part of the summer recreation program will close this week. The final gesture will be a combined field day and exhibit at the Mills playground. This will probably be held Thursday. The exhibit will consist of the best specimens of the work completed during the summer program. This will include sewing and cooking work, an exhibit, shop work and a number of other activities that have been carried on. It should be interesting.

The field day part of the program will consist of all sorts of athletic events in which the children have been participating during the summer. There will be races of all kinds, jumping and games. It should be a full day for the children. Vern Spiers and Dorothea Goodfellow have been working hard in preparation for the day.

The playground work of the program will not close Friday. It will continue until September 1, which is the Friday before the opening of school. In fact, there is likelihood that the playground part of the program will increase materially with the closing of the shop program. So many of the children have been interested in some particular phase of the work program that occupied so much of their time they had little chance to do all the things on the playground they wished to do. They will now have that opportunity.

There is a pretty good chance that additional help will be needed to take care of the enlarged playground program. Supervisors will spend longer hours on the grounds and perhaps some of the shifts will be doubled. The people now conducting the activities work will be assigned to these new details.

The library at Mills will also close this week. It has been a busy place, and has been a big asset to the summer activity. Mrs. Foster, librarian in charge, has worked with the teachers and supervisors of the play program in lining up material for their work. All kinds of reference material, books on projects and on games, have been supplied to these teachers by Mrs. Foster and her library. In addition the library has been utilized by the children themselves at times when they were "fed up" with the other work of the summer program.

The nursery school at Mills will not close. It, of course, is a year-round activity, and will continue right on through the winter months. They will soon return to their winter quarters, which is the floor above where they have been holding forth all summer. The winter quarters are not so spacious as those used during the summer, but on the whole they will be much more comfortable than last year. The double decker beds will make some of this difference.

Another class that will not close this week is that conducted by Mrs. Cone. In all probability some other location will have to be found for these art groups, as the regular art classes of the Fremont school will utilize this room during the winter months. Mrs. Cone's classes are always popular, so there is little doubt that a satisfactory location will be found.

Playground activities will be continued at Modoc field, Mills, Fairview, Fremont and Richmond Park. Play equipment will be stored in a central location and drawn each day by the supervisor assigned to the various play centers. In that way new equipment will be coming around from time to time. All of which makes the playground more interesting.
