There will be many things there of interest to those who visit the lads in the camp on that day.

Thursday will see the close of the activities work in the summer recreation program. The final day will see an exhibit of all the work of the program. This exhibit will be made in the large gymnasium of the Mills school. Each department: sewing, shop, art, etc., will be allotted space and we think all space will be filled to capacity. Even the nursery school is planning an exhibit.

While the exhibits are being judged the youngsters from all playgrounds will meet in a combined field day. This will feature contests and sports of all kinds. Running, jumping, wrestling and relays of all sorts. Here will also be a chance to see how these playground lads handle that softball. The meet is not confined to boys alone. NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—The stock market made feeble rallying gestures today but most leaders finished with a downward slant.

Although a handful of oils, rubbers, utilities and specialties retained modest advances, sliding tendencies exhibited by steels, coppers and rails took the backbone out of intermittent recovery moves.

The news, on the whole, seemed to lack especially stimulating qualities and many traders, brokers said, took to the sidelines pending more definite indications congress will close up shop at least by the end of the month.

The steel group fell abruptly at the opening, almost erased losses around noon and dropped away again in the final hour.

Dealings were light from the start, and the ticker tape lolled during the remainder of the session. Transfers were around 700,000 shares.

There were reports Bethlehem was contemplating some \$40,000,000 of new financing for the purpose of expansion and clearing up maturing obligations. The stock was under water throughout.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Aug. 10 (AP-USA) The wool market was quiet today but quotations were steady.

Fair quantity fine Ohio Delaine wools were offered at 40-41 cents in the grease with some holders firm at 42 cents on their best lots. Staple combing lengths half blood Ohio fleeces were available at 42-43 cents in the grease, although some asked above this range.

Combing three-eighths length

Ohio fleeces were offered at 42-44 cents in the grease and quarter blood of similar lines could be bought at 42-43 cents but little sold.

Most asking prices above these ranges were unchanged despite little action in the market.

CHICAGO WHEAT MAKES BIG GAIN

CHICAGO, Aug. 10 (AP)—With all Winnipeg deliveries of wheat showing an excited bulge of five cents today, the Chicago wheat market scored 4 1/2 cents maximum gain.

Official figures were taken as indicating Canada this season owing to extraordinary crop failure could have less than 100,000,000 bushels for export and home carryover. Sudden revival of European demand today for North American wheat was much emphasized as a result.

At the close, wheat futures in Chicago were 3 1/2-3 3/4 above yesterday's finish, Sept. 11 1/2-2, Dec. 11 1/2-1 1/2, corn 1 1/2-2 1/2, Sept. 1 1/2-1 1/2, Dec. 6 1/2-7, and oats 1-1 1/2 off.
