INJURY HURTS CUB CHANCES

Collins' Fractured Ankle
Serious Blow to Chicago Hopes.

An accident may have accomplished what the combined efforts of seven major league clubs couldn't bring about—ending the Chicago Cubs' hold on first place in the National League.

Wednesday, it's true enough, the Bruins were six games up on the Giants. But as they resumed their series with the Pirates they did so in the knowledge that for the next month—to within a few weeks of the season's end—they will have to struggle along without the services of Jim (The Ripper) Collins, fancy-fielding, run-producing first baseman who was such a valuable factor in their climb to the top and their ensuing stay there.

Like the Yankees, the Cubs have managed to bounce back from previous injuries and illnesses. Tex Carleton, Larry French, Billy Herman, Gabby Hartnett, even Manager Charles Grimm—they are just a few of the north siders who have been incapacitated at one time or another this season.

But it will take a lot of bouncing to make up for the loss of Collins. There are harder hitters in the senior circuit than the Ripper. When the first baseman, a bone in his right ankle fractured as the result of a desperate but futile slide for home, was carried to the dressing room at Wrigley field Tuesday, he had a batting average of .278.

The batting average, though, doesn't tell the whole story. It fails to show that Collins was fifth in the league in driving in runs, that he had clouted 15 homers, that his defensive work had been just what Dr. Grimm ordered when he got the Ripper in a deal that also involved Lonnie Warneke and Roy Parmelee.

With the last third of the campaign in sight—the Cubs' 6-5 defeat by the Pirates Tuesday was their 100th game, and Collins had been in every one—the first base portfolio now must be entrusted to Phil Cavarretta, part-time outfielder whose fielding average in 1936, when he played in 115 games as first base, put him in seventh place among the regular incumbents.

While the Cubs were bowing to the Pirates and Al Todd's four-run homer, the Boston Bees kept them from losing any ground to the Giants. Danny MacFadden, veteran Boston right-hander, put an effective six-hit damper on the Terrymen that stopped them, 5-1, and gave them a record of one earned run in their last two starts.

Meanwhile Cardinal Warneke moved a victory ahead of teammate Dizzy Dean by handreeling the Reds, 3-2, with six hits for his thirteenth triumph, and the Dodgers whipped the Phillies, 7-3, to inch a step further away from the gaping National League cellar.

In the American league, the Senators went off to a scoring spree that produced victories over the Athletics by 15-7 and 8-6 and brought them within a game of fifth place. The White Sox moved into third, half a game and one percentage point ahead of the Tigers, by noosing out Mickey Cochrane's crew, 6-4.

The Yanks and Red Sox, in Boston, and the Browns and Indians, in Cleveland, were rained out.

Low Qualifiers Matched As Public Links Tourney Opens

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11 (AP)—Match play in the national public links tournament starts today with 64 golfers hanging along the championship trail.

San Francisco's none-too-easy Harding course, still shuddering from yesterday's wind-up of the 36-hole qualifying play which saw the tournament team record smashes and the medal score mark tied, was ready for today's warfare—18 holes of play this morning and 18 holes in the afternoon.

Tournament officials drew today's pairings from a hat, and with it an undertone of criticism for the procedure followed. The result found some of the best shortmakers in the lot firing away at each other in the first round.

Pat Abbott, defending champion from Pasadena and runner-up medalist yesterday, with a total score of 141, faced Ralph Presley of Sacramento, who followed him on the board with 142.

Don Erickson, the rough and ready one from Alhambra, Calif., who shot a spectacular 67-72-139 to tie the medal record set in 1932 at Toledo by George Aubuch, drew as his opponent Paul Jensen of Toledo, who carded 74-73-147. Erickson's score was 5 strokes below par.

Two more 18-hole rounds will be run off tomorrow, with the semi-finals Friday and finals Saturday, both at 24 holes.

Six Named as U. S. Wightman Cup Defenders

NEW YORK, Aug. 11 (AP)—Dorothy May Bundy, heiress to a family tradition of top notch tennis, has been named with Alice Marble, Helen Hull Jacobs, Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Fabyan, Carolin Babcock and Mrs. Marjorie Gladman Van Ryn to the United States Wightman Cup team, which will meet the British team at Forest Hills August 20 and 21.

Miss Bundy's mother and father were both prominent in American tennis. Her mother, May Sutton Bundy, was national singles champion in 1904 and won the singles title at Wimbledon in 1905 and 1907. Thomas C. Bundy, her father, was a noted doubles player. He paired with Maurice E. McLoughlin, another Californian, to win the national championships in 1912, 1913 and 1914 as well as earn similar honors on Davis Cup teams.

With the exception of Mrs. Fabyan, who is from Boston, and the non-playing captain and donor of the cup, Mrs. Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman, also from Boston, all the players are Californians. Miss Jacobs, Mrs. Van Ryn, Mrs. Fabyan and Miss Babcock were members of last year's team.

The British team, after campaigning in Canada, already has started practice at Forest Hills. It includes Kay Stammers, the world's seventh ranking woman player; Mary Hardwick, who beat Miss Stammers in London; Joan Ingram, Margot Lamb and Euan Dearman.

Dorais Elected to Drill College All-Star Eleven
CHICAGO, Aug. 11 (AP)—Charles E. (Gus) Dorais of the University of Detroit, will head the board of strategy for the college all stars in their charity battle against the Green Bay Packers, national professional football champions, at Soldier Field September 1.

Dorais, whose Titan team have won no national titles but who received solid support from his own state and batches of votes from other parts of the country, won the assignment of heading the college coaching staff by amassing 5,269,179 points in a nation-wide poll during the past two weeks. His assistants will be Lynn Waldorf of Northwestern University and Elmer Laiden of Notre Dame, both of whom served with Head Coach Bernie Bierman of Minnesota for last year's all star game; Jimmy Phelan of Washington and Bernie Moore of Louisiana State University.

Waldorf, whose Wildcats won the Big Ten championship last year, was second in the voting with 4,011,198 points. Laiden had 3,464,384. Phelan, whose Washington eleven gained the Pacific coast conference title, had 3,023,977, and Moore collected 2,521,941.

Dorais, head coach of Detroit since 1925, collaborated at Notre Dame with the late Knute Rockne in forming the first of football's famous forward passing combinations. In 1913 the pair, Dorais throwing and Rockne catching, staged an aerial assault against Army that produced a 25 to 13 triumph and made passing a major part of gridiron offense.

Dorais and his staff will take charge of the all star squad of 65 men Saturday morning at Northwestern University where preparation for the battle will be started.

HOPES RAISED BY WATER FLOW IN TULELAKE WELL
TULELAKE—Water, coming from the bore of the water well Tuesday, pumped to the surface at the rate of 20 gallons to the minute, raised hopes of Tulelake residents to a new high level, that in the not too distant future, Tulelake's greatest problem will be solved.

While no analysis has as yet been made, samples of the water drawn from the well have been sent to a Mr. Seiffert, Southern Pacific geologist, and a report is expected immediately.

Water, standing within 26 feet of the top of the well, was being cleared of markiness and proved to be of better quality than other samples taken at earlier dates. The big drill, sent to Portland for minor repairs, arrived Tuesday but was found to have been damaged. Drilling will be delayed until next week but in the meantime Driller George Hardesty will continue to draw water to the surface by means of catcrapper power.

Casing is now down 1655 feet and the depth of the bore is 1720.

Two hard strata of formation have been pierced recently, both averaging approximately 10 feet. This, according to Hardesty, is one of the most promising signs of good water yet encountered.
