

BIDS RECEIVED ON KENNETT PROJECT

Thirty-six bids for Kennett government camp work are being studied by the bureau of Reclamation preparatory to award of the first construction contracts on the Kennett division of the Central Valley project. The work is expected to start this summer after the awards are approved by the secretary of the Interior in Washington, D. C.

At four bid-opening sessions in Sacramento offers were received for the erection of 27 duplex cottages, 46 other residences, two dormitories, an office building, a concrete-testing laboratory and a combined garage-fire station. The camp, when completed, will house 500 persons, comprising bureau of reclamation employees and their families, near the Kennett dam site north of Redding.

Teachers, particularly, have been very much interested in the program and almost every day finds one or two visitors making notes and discussing "ways and means" with members of the local supervisory staff.

Sometimes these visitors are not content with simply "taking notes." They actually join the classes and get at first hand the work that is being taught. An example of this interest was noted yesterday when a young lady—a teacher in a southern California city—asked Mr. Robinson for permission to join his class. She had one day to spend, and wished to learn how to make a reed tray so she could teach it this winter. She joined the class at Fremont in the morning, and being unable to complete the project, went to the Mills school in the afternoon to finish. The job was done and the lady will carry out of Klamath Falls something that will be of real value to her students this winter. That is what we call interest.

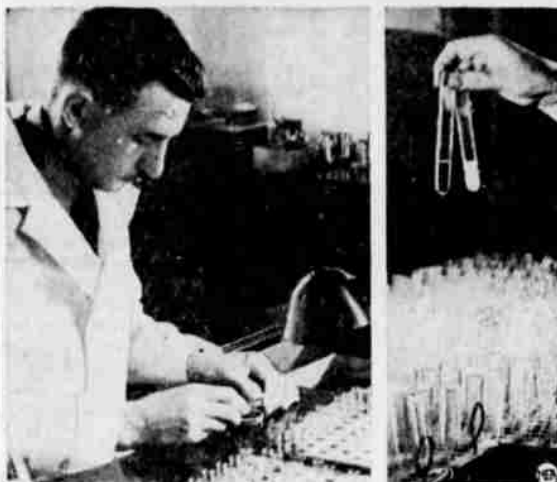
