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COYOTE NIGHT SCHEDULED BY WILDLIFE BODY

"Coyote night" will be observed by the Klamath county council of the Oregon Wildlife Federation at its next meeting September 14, it was decided Wednesday night's session. Representatives of the biological survey, sheep men and others interested in the eradication of predatory animals will be invited to attend.

Chairman Hal Ogle said he may have a caged coyote at the meeting. If he does, the coyote will be placed "on trial." The wildlife federation adopted a resolution asking for a study of methods of stream control on the Klamath river below the Keno dam.

The resolution states that extreme changes in the water level of the river below the dam occur in a short period of time, endangering the lives of fishermen and stock that feed on the mosses of the river bed during low water.

It was also stated that a large amount of small fish and other aquatic life are left stranded to die and later to be flooded into the stream, thereby causing pollution. This condition, it was said, will ultimately destroy the value of the river to fishermen and will render the state egg-taking plant on Spencer creek worthless.

The resolution expressed opposition to present methods of control of the water level and urged a study in an effort to correct the condition.

OREGON'S WHEAT RESERVES LOWER

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Interior mills, elevators and warehouses of Oregon this year contained 825,000 bushels of wheat on July 1, as compared with 2,100,000 bushels last year at this time, the United States department of agriculture reported.

The estimates were based on reports representing 51 per cent of the total state storage capacity for interior houses. Stocks on hand July 1 this year are only 41 per cent above the average for the five years (1932-32) of 2,020,000 bushels, the report showed.

Stocks in Oregon, Washington and Idaho interior mills, elevators and warehouses were estimated at 4,905,000 bushels as of July 1.

Commercial stocks of wheat in terminal elevators of the Pacific northwest reported by the market news service of the bureau of agricultural economics were 774,000 bushels as of June 28, compared with 2,034,000 bushels last year at the same date and 912,000 bushels two years ago.
