LIVESTOCK SHOW PREMIUMS LISTED

The premium list of the Future Farmer department of the Klamath county baby beef and livestock show was announced Monday. The show will be held August 30-31.

One of the regulations governing the show requires that all entries be in place by 2 p. m. Sunday, August 29, according to William Holloway, agriculture instructor at Bonanza, who is in charge of the FFA division.

One division of the fair will feature the awards of ribbons and premiums for the best projects carried on by the agricultural students of the county. These projects will be judged Monday, August 31, by Clark Henkle, assistant county agent, Lee S. McMullen, secretary of the KPCA, and Prof. H. H. Gibson, teacher-trainer at Oregon State college. Each Smith-Huxley department in the county will pick out its three best projects.

In judging the projects, points will be given for the way they represent a cross section of a type of farming adaptable to the farm and community, the boy's ability to plan his project on a long time basis, evidence that the boy has a definite financial interest in his project, and has something to say about the management of it; the kind of plans he has made for himself; his ability to answer questions and scientific facts about his project.

The best three projects will receive \$5.50, the next best three \$5, and the next best three \$3.50.

There will be showmanship contests for the Future Farmer showmen this year. Various breed associations have donated subscriptions to their breed journals to be awarded the best showmen. The Aberdeen - Angus breeders' association has donated two subscriptions, one to go to the champion Angus, The Duror-Jersey breeders' association has given two subscriptions, the Hampshire Swine association one subscription.

The Hereford breeders' association has donated \$10 for the FFA grand champion baby beef, provided it is a Hereford.

All fat stock entered in the FFA division is to be auctioned off. There will be a minimum charge of 3 per cent taken from each sale to cover costs of the auction.

Duplicate ribbons will be furnished buyers of fat stock so that both the boy and buyer will have ribbons.

Future Farmers will show baby beef, dairy cattle, sheep, swine, poultry and turkeys. There will be many more quality stock from the agriculture departments at Bonanza, Henley and Malin, it is expected.

Lumber Production Mounts

OUTPUT THIS YEAR TWICE 1932 FIGURE

From a depression low of less than 4,000,000 board feet in 1932, lumber production in Oregon and Washington for 1936 climbed back to 8,649,821,000 feet, according to preliminary data just collected by the federal Pacific northwest forest experiment station in cooperation with the bureau of the census. This is an increase of roughly 21 per cent above the 1935 production of 5,977,640,000 feet and more than double the 1932 cut of 3,845,510,000 board feet. It is within 3,500,000,000 feet of the 1929 production, the highest ever attained by the two states.

Of the total cut, 6,028,652,000 board feet were Douglas fir, of which Washington produced 3,593,669,000 feet and Oregon 2,434,983,000. Next in importance was ponderosa pine with 1,594,718,000 feet produced, of which Washington cut 3,414,000 feet and Oregon 1,280,304,000. Next in volume came western hemlock with 418,881,000 board feet, of which Washington cut 343,211,000 and Oregon 75,660,000.

Other species were spruce with 173,040,000 feet, Washington cutting 86,764,000 and Oregon 86,276,000; cedar, 120,285,000 feet, of which Washington cut 108,211,000; Idaho white pine, 38,600,000 feet, of which Washington cut 85,880,000; sugar pine, 60,504,000, and Port Orford cedar, 54,098,000 feet, both species cut entirely in Oregon; white fir, 28,954,000 feet, of which Washington cut 3,272,000 feet and Oregon 25,682,000; larch, 23,632,000 feet, of which Washington cut 17,748,000 and Oregon 5,884,000; hardwoods, 57,527,000 feet, with Washington cutting 29,020,000 feet and Oregon 28,507,000.

Shingle output in 1936 totaled 5,173,068 squares, with 4,602,050 produced in Washington and 571,018 in Oregon. Lath production for Washington totaled 24,311,000 pieces and for Oregon 162,652,000 pieces.

The canyons showed that 1229 lumber and shingle mills in the two states operated at least a portion of the year.

Washington ranks first and Oregon second in the country as lumber producing states.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Aug. 16 (AP)—Stocks groped in the dark in today's market and only a handful of specialists managed to find higher ground.

U. S. steel suffered an early sinking spell and at the worst was down more than two points. Other leaders took their cue from this top-notch and declines of as much as a point or so were widely distributed at the close.

Continued confusion in the congressional legislative program and revival of doubts early adjournment is likely, tended to restrain buying forces to some extent.

Although it was said to be debatable whether the Sino-Japanese crisis inspired many stock offerings, some speculative contingents apparently retired to neutral territory pending clarification of the Shanghai conflict which could possibly involve foreign nations.

Dealings were extremely light throughout, with transfers approximating 650,000 shares.

Japanese loans broke sharply in the bond market on far eastern developments. Domestic bonds were uneven.
