Some of the senators who joined in what they knew was a hopeless fight said that confirmation had not ended the dispute over Black's eligibility. They predicted that the legal question would be raised soon before the supreme court itself, possibly when some litigation asks a ruling on the right of the Alabamian to occupy the bench.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (UP)—Senator Copeland (D-NY) said today the Klan issue in the senate today against the nomination of Senator Black (D-Ala) to the supreme court was denounced by Senator McGill (D-Kas) for basing his opposition upon "prejudice."

Defending Black's qualifications for the supreme court, McGill said: "It ill behooves Senator Copeland to 'come on the floor of the senate and complain simply because Senator Black is a liberal and because his name was sent in by President Roosevelt."

Copeland opened his attack on Black with the charge that he was a "Klan sympathizer" at the outset of today's session. He was followed by Senator Burke (D-Neb), who argued that Black was not eligible and also that he did not have an "impartial" mind.

Copeland had read to the senate, before opening galleries, a prepared speech citing newspaper stories that Black was backed for the senate in 1936 by the Klan.

McGill said Copeland's speech did not appeal to him "because it was based on prejudice and intended to prejudice the American people" against a man who was to sit on the court.

A hurried autopsy indicated that death had been caused by a .32 caliber bullet fired into the back of the victim's head. A tattoo mark had been carefully cut off the arm, but another remained.

The body was discovered when a clerk noticed blood dripping from the trunk which he had just received from a tall young man with red hair who brought the trunk in a taxi and ordered it shipped collect to Joe Marshall, Memphis, Tenn.

Police rushed his body to Bellevue morgue for a scientific thorough examination. They also took his fingerprints for identification.

Wedged with the body in the trunk, which was less than three and one half feet in its longest dimension, were a blue shirt, three pillows and a dark pair of pants.

The red-headed man, who seemed to be about 30 years old, helped his taxi driver drag the trunk, which was old and battered, to the loading platform at the agency office on Tenth avenue at 23rd street. Nearby is the railroad terminal, the general post-office, the Hotel New Yorker and other places where throngs gather and the streets were crowded.

The man was calm and careful in spelling out the name to Clerk Michael Bertadotti, and he explained that that was his name, and that he would call for and pay for the trunk in Memphis.

But just before the clerk finished making out his tags, the red haired man suddenly beckoned to the taxi driver, and they drove away.

The clerk, in moving the trunk on a hand truck was horrified a few moments later to see blood dripping from it. The trunk was forced open, the body discovered.

Committees working on arrangements announce that the doors will be open at 8:30 a.m. to receive entries and following judging will again be opened to the public from 2 until 5 p.m.

All entries must be in by 11 a.m. and containers must be furnished by exhibitors who must also make their own arrangements.

Only one entry in each class is to be placed by each exhibitor with the exception of vegetables and fruits. The club will welcome exhibits from anyone who has flowers, fruits, grains, vegetables, regardless of place of residence.

Mrs. Hugh O'Connor is acting as general chairman of the exhibit. The following classification of entries is listed for those planning to exhibit:

1. Living room arrangements: A. Arrangements under 12 in. B. Arrangements under 12 in. C. Basket arrangements.

2. One variety, with or without greens. D. Table arrangements — over 6 inches — under 12: A. Few flowers. B. In mass. C. Flowers in one color. D. Fruits, vegetables and blossoms.

3. Gladiolus — Specimen blooms (1 or not over 3). 4. Phlox — Specimen blooms (1 or not over 3). 5. Dahlias — Specimen blooms (1 or not over 3). 6. Arrangements of bush, berries or vines.

7. Wild flowers, which includes seeds, pods, foliage, grasses or weeds. 8. Children's Exhibits: A. Under 10 years. B. 10 to 15 years. C. Over 15 years.

10. Four-H club displays: A. Canning. B. Gardening. C. Fruits and vegetables must be locally grown.

1. Fruits, specimens in paper plates. 2. Vegetables. 3. Grains and grasses (not over 2 dozen heads in collection).

4. Vegetables in collection. 5. Fruits in collection. 6. Vegetables as comic faces or animals.

Prices of one dollar each are to be offered in each division of sections 1 and 2 also for 5, 7, 8, 10; for divisions 4, 5 under fruits and vegetables, first prizes of 75 cents and second prizes of 50 cents are offered for each division of section 9.

LOYALIST CLAIMS REACH DIZZY PEAK

PARIS, Aug. 17 (UP) — The rightist newspaper Le Jour, adding up Spanish loyalist war casualties to "debunk" the Valencia government, showed that since the war started the loyalists claim to have:

1. Shot down 13,400 insurgent airplanes.
2. Captured 80,000 automobiles and tanks.
3. Captured 6000 cannon.
4. Killed, wounded or captured 2,600,000 rebels.
5. Captured Cordoba 20 times, Toledo 15 times, Oviedo 20 times and Huesca 32 times — all of which remain in the hands of the nationalists.

1200 MARINES TO SAIL TO SHANGHAI

either was spread on the upper deck. The tender left the jetty at 11 a. m. It was endangered by Chinese artillery pouring shells across the Whangpoo from Pootung in a bombardment of the Yangtze Poo district.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 17 (UP) — Shell splinters sprayed peaceful foreign home areas with death by day and great guns roared out terror tonight for the Chinese-Japanese battlefield of Shanghai.

One hundred thousand men with guns and bombs fought on to a goal none could foresee. Fires raged the city.

Unconfirmed reports said Chinese troops had pressed hard on Japanese positions along the lines northeast of Shanghai facing the Whangpoo river beyond the international settlement. In some places they were believed to have penetrated Japanese advance positions.

Darkness disclosed three huge fires started by Chinese bombs and shells within Japanese lines.

One raged in Chapel, across Soochow creek from the international settlement. The other two roared skyward uncontrolled in the mill district northeast of Shanghai.

International settlement fire fighters withdrew to south of the creek, leaving the Chapel blaze unchecked, to protect the settlement itself from the advancing flames.

Business Collapses Japanese big guns boomed after dark in a renewal of the duel which earlier today threw shell fragments into the French concession, where most Americans in Shanghai live.

Concession police were unable to learn the number of dead or injured, but estimated 50 persons, all Chinese, were struck by shrapnel or shell splinters. Business utterly collapsed.

More than 2000 American and British women and children fled from Shanghai. They played hide and seek with death down the Whangpoo river to reach waiting liners under the blazing guns of the Japanese fleet.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (UP) — Secretary Hull said today this government had ordered 1200 marines to sail from San Diego to Shanghai to protect American nationals from violence.

Hull also announced the department was asking congress to appropriate \$500,000 for all necessary relief and evacuation expenses arising from the Chinese-Japanese emergency.

The marines will sail within 10 days, Hull said. He added that it would require five weeks to land them in Shanghai.

JAPS KEEP WATCH ON FOREIGN SHIPS

ABOARD S. S. PRESIDENT MCKINLEY AT THE MOUTH OF THE YANGTZE, Aug. 17 (UP)—All American and other foreign steamships plying between Japan and China are now under the rigid scrutiny of Japanese sailors.

Four Japanese bombers from Saishu Island, Korea, roared over this ship en route from Kobe to Shanghai, established her identity and returned to their base.

A Japanese destroyer sped past the President McKinley's bow in the inland sea for purposes of identification.

Because of the dangers of the Whangpoo river the McKinley was forced to anchor at the mouth of the Yangtze river overnight.
