MOORE PARK TO CLOSE AT NINE NIGHTLY

Curfew will ring at 9 o'clock every evening at Moore park beginning this week, according to an announcement from the city park board, and after that time all entrances will be barred and no automobiles allowed to enter.

Heavy chains are to be padlocked across all park roads, and signs will warn motorists to keep out.

This action is being taken as the result of continued depredations of vandals who have broken off park trees, torn seats on the tennis courts, tipped over tables and even opened gates of the deer pen.

Fortunately the deer were all asleep when the gates were opened, and none made an attempt to escape. The open gate was discovered by E. K. Spencer, park caretaker, the next morning.

The park vandals take particular delight in disturbing the deer and other animals and causing great turmoil in the zoo.

Time and again the caretaker has been roused by cries from the sleepy animals and has gone out and scolded the marauders.

These practices must stop, according to rulings of the park board, hence the 9 o'clock closing order.

The caretaker reports that virtually all evening parties are over by 8 or 8:30 o'clock, and that it is only the night prowlers, boys of about 15 years of age as well as many older men, who do the damage.

Anyway, as soon as the signs are posted and chains are ready, the entrances will be barred at 9 p. m. every night, and the caretaker and animals will enjoy unbroken rest for the first time in many months.
