

### EQUITABLE HOLDS CONFERENCE HERE

An educational conference of central and southern Oregon districts of the Oregon agency of the Equitable Life of New York was being held here Friday.

T. Howard Groves, agency manager, with headquarters at Portland, stated that Klamath Falls was selected as the meeting place to compliment John H. Houston, the district and agency leader and fourth man in the United States in paid cases. This district, he said, also has led the agency this year and in 1936 in total production.

The meeting was being held at the Willard hotel, Saturday morning the visitors will go to Crater Lake.

Groves said that for the fourth consecutive year, Equitable is leading all previous records. In the first six months of 1937, the company showed gain of insurance in force of over \$210,000,000, making a total of \$4,822,000,000. Admitted assets are up \$59,000,000, making a total of \$2,044,000,000. The surplus has increased \$23,000,000, up to a total of \$100,816,000.
