Mrs. Sanders is Mrs. Andrews' mother and Mrs. Thompson is a sister.

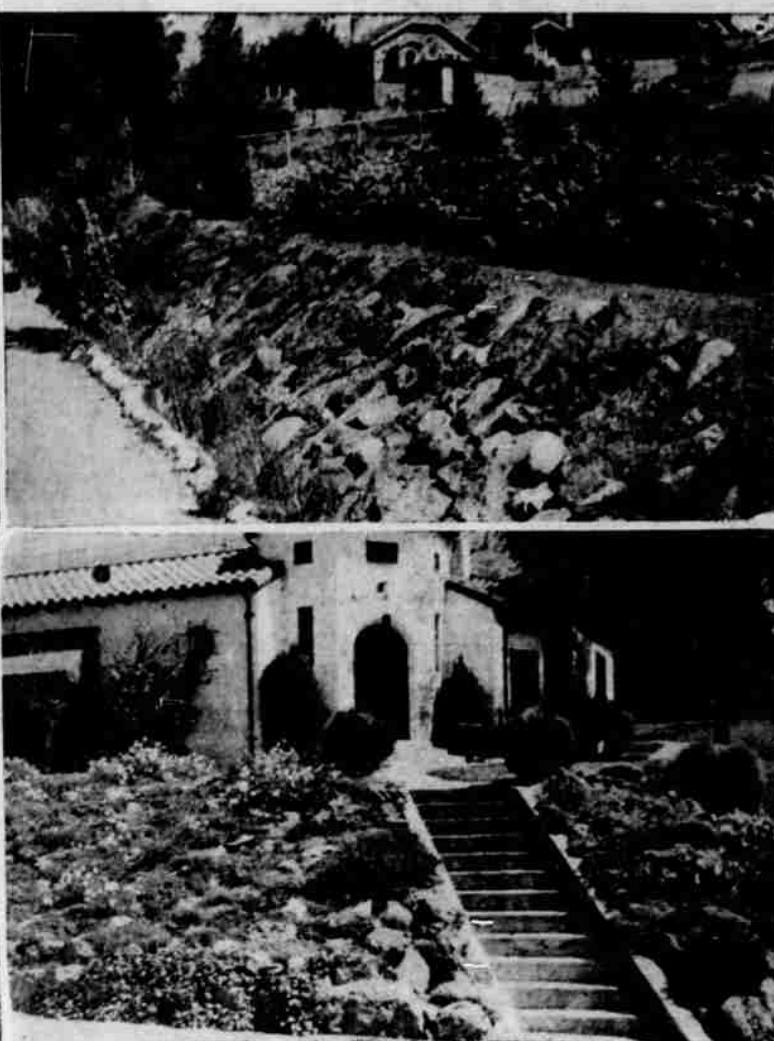
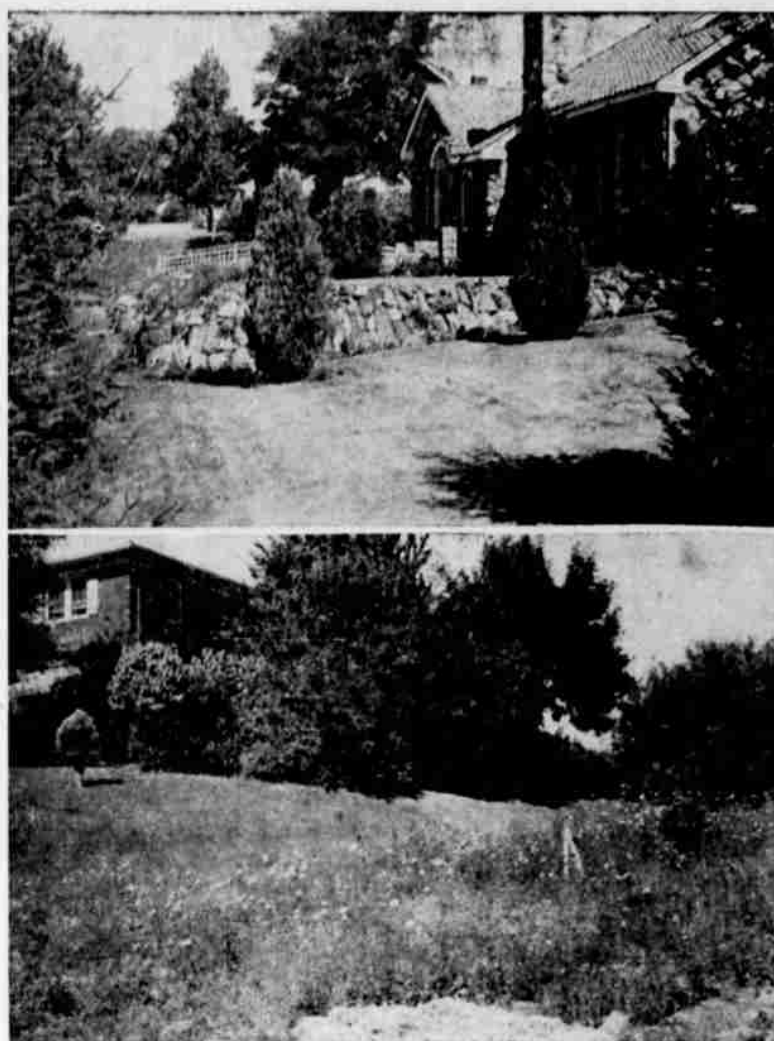
The party spent Wednesday picnicking at Crater lake.

Local Authors, Verse Writers Attend State Conclave In Portland

August is proving a month of activities for Oregon's chapters of the League of Western Writers with a three-day state convention held at the Hotel Portland in Portland, August sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth, and a visit of the league president, Dr. Lawrence E. Nelson of Redlands, California, to the state.

Dr. Nelson is scheduled to be a guest in Klamath Falls at a dinner to be given in his honor by the Klamath-Lake chapter of the league on Saturday evening, August twenty-eighth. Mrs. Katherine Nelson is in charge of arrangements for the affair, details of which will be announced later. Members of the Medford chapter will be invited to attend the dinner and meet Dr. Nelson who will be en route home after attending conventions in Oregon and Washington.

Addresses of welcome at the convention were presented by Governor Charles H. Martin and by Portland's mayor, J. K. Carson, Jr. L. D. Mahons, who was a visitor in Klamath Falls several weeks ago, acted as chairman of the convention.

Among some of the outstanding speakers on the program were Harriette C. Long, state librarian at Salem, who talked on "Early Women Writers in Oregon"; Pamela Pearl Jones, state coordinator of adult education at Seattle, Washington, whose topic was "Drama Goes Modern"; an address by B. F. Irvine, former editor of the Oregon Journal, and Professor Nelson, the national president of the league, who is also head of the department of English at Redlands university in California, who spoke on "Verse vs. Versus."

Mrs. Lydia O. Mohe, one of the delegates from the Klamath-Lake chapter, presented an interesting talk on "My Method of Writing Novels." Mrs. Mohe is the author of a novel which will be published during the autumn by Caxton's in Idaho.

A post-breakfast was a feature of the second day. Inasmuch as the league has many members who are verse writers, this form of writing is always given a prominent place in the program. Harold E. Hunt, editor of the "Poet's Corner," which is a weekly feature of the Oregon Journal, was one of the program speakers.

Presidents of the various state chapters represented participated in a general session on Tuesday afternoon at which there was general discussion of chapter meetings, programs and objectives. Mrs. Walter F. Brown, president of the Klamath-Lake chapter, and Mrs. Merton E. Joyce were the others who attended from this city.

A formal banquet closed the program on Wednesday evening at which an impromptu program was presented with many delegates taking part.

All music at the convention was furnished by Gladys Conrad McCellan of the Pacific Northwest Conservatory of Music.
