

Redding Ties Up Semi-Final Playoff Series

SOX EDGED OUT BY 7-6 MARGIN

Deciding Game Set Next Sunday; Mt. Shasta Enters Finals.

Defeating the Klamath Falls Red Sox, 7-6, in a thrilling contest on Tuesday night in Redding, the Redding Tigers tied up the semi-final series in the Northern California league baseball playoff at one each. A third game will be played next Sunday, with the winner entering into the finals with Mt. Shasta City, which made two straight over the Weed Sox at Redding.

Redding began scoring in the opening frame of the contest, touching Carlstrom for two bingles and crossing home plate once. The Tigers duplicated in the second inning, making the score 2-0. Carlstrom settled down to some stellar pitching and blanked the Californians until the sixth when they rallied, driving out three blows which together with a costly Red Sox error, counted for three more scores. At the end of the sixth frame the score stood 5-0 for Redding and another shut-out appeared likely.

Klamath rallied and came through in the seventh to drive out seven hits of Vinsantiner, scoring six runs, taking a one-run lead in the game. After five men had singled, Hammericksen, Red Sox centerfielder, tripled, driving in two of the six runs. This was Hammericksen's second triple of the game.

Klamath held Redding scoreless in its portion of the seventh, and the game went into the eighth with Klamath holding a one-run lead.

In the eighth and ninth innings the Tigers held the Red Sox to three hits and no runs. Brooks reached reached third for the Sox but died on base when Wheeler struck out.

Redding was more fortunate in the last two seasons, slamming out two hits in the eighth to score once, tying the game at 5-5. In the final frame for Redding, DeForest was safe at first on a Sox error and was sacrificed to second by Gullixson. Carlstrom walked the next two men, filling the bases. DeForest started home from third on a squeeze play and Carlstrom, attempting to stop him, threw wild at home plate. DeForest scored the winning run of the game.

Vinsantiner and Carlstrom each allowed 12 bingles, with Carlstrom striking out four and Vinsantiner six. Carlstrom issued five free passes to first, while Vinsantiner allowed none.

Hammericksen topped the slugging list for the Sox, slamming out two triples and a single in five times at bat. Harshbarger collected two singles, and Carlstrom did likewise.

Wolfe of Redding found Carlstrom's slants in his liking, getting four blows in five trips to the plate. Heavy hitting was done by McDonald, first-sacker for the Tigers, and Balma, second baseman.

A third game will now be played between the two clubs for entrance into the league finals. Both teams have won one game each and are tied in the semi-finals. Redding is anxious that the deciding game be played on its diamond, but Klamath is holding out for a neutral field and the exact spot of the game will be announced in a day or two.

Mt. Shasta reached the finals Sunday by making it two straight over the Weed Sox of Italy. The short score of Sunday's game was as follows:

Bob Feller's Wildness Loses Another Game for Cleveland

It doesn't even take a good look any more to show what's wrong with Bobby Feller. Just a peek at the standings will tell you his record, like Babe Ruth's figure, bulks in the wrong places.

With his speed and youth, he may still become the sensation of his baseball generation, but up to now he seems well on the way to going down as the biggest bust since Fred Merkle detoured from first to third.

For all the good he's done the Cleveland Indians this year, he might just as well have been back on the farm, and for all the class he's shown to warrant the book full of headlines they gave him, he might as well have been a butcher in Bangkok.

And it's all because Master Bobby, game by game, is living up to baseball's bewhiskered old saw, "every walk means a run."

Overlooking for the moment the fact that the Cubs' worries have been momentarily sidetracked by a four-game lead in the National League race, take a look over Feller's figures for the season.

He's been in 15 games for 79 innings, has allowed 61 hits, given up 43 bases on balls and fanned 69.

His inability to get his pitches within mauling distance of home was responsible for his defeat Sunday. Although he allowed only 100 hits in the five innings he worked, he walked seven in two frames, five of them in a row, which does not exactly come under the head of control.

As a result, the White Sox socked him and the Indians, 5-2, in the first game of a doubleheader. The Tribe came through, 5-2, in the second, but by that time the record books showed Feller's fifth defeat against three wins for the year, with one of the season's queerest performances.

Meantime, the Chicago Cubs, who were supposed to be falling apart, rolled along to a twin win over the Reds, 4-1 and 5-2. Since the Giants' doubleheader with the Phillies was rained out, the Cubs rested on a four-game lead as they headed east to tangle with their arch-rivals.

The Cardinals came back and took the Pirates for a double "buggy ride," 12-0 and 9-7. Dizzy Dean won his first victory since July 4 and hit his first homer of the year in the nightcap. The Dodgers beat the Bees, 5-1, in six innings before rain ended their scheduled doubleheader.

Joe DiMaggio belted homer No. 36, Lefty Gomez fanned 19, and the Yankees whipped the Athletics, 4-1, in a five-inning meeting. Their nightcap also drew in the weather. The Tigers trounced the Browns twice, 11-3 and 4-3. The Senators and Red Sox were washed out.

SONS WIN OVER ALTURAS, 16-14

Local Club to Play Burns Here Next Sunday for League Pennant.

Sons of Italy, Klamath member of the Inter-Wonderland league, posted a lucky 16-14 defeat on Alturas Sunday while Burns was suffering an upset at the hands of Lakeview, and as a result, the Klamath Falls and Burns club will move into the season finale here next Sunday all tied for the league lead.

The race between the Sons of Italy and the Hines Lumber company outfit has been nip and tuck from the start of the season. The Sons edged out a 2-0 victory over Burns in the opening game of the year, but since that time Burns has gone undefeated until Sunday, while the Sons dropped two surprise verdicts to Fall River and Bieber.

Now the two teams' records for the season add up to seven victories and two defeats apiece, and Sunday's game on Modoc field will prove the deciding factor in determining whether Klamath Falls or Burns will win the loop championship.

Sunday's Alturas-Sons affair, played on an Alturas diamond, was a hit-and-run demonstration from beginning to end.

Alturas, as has been the case with other clubs in the league, had strengthened its line-up considerably since earlier in the year, without saying much about it, and after three innings or so, the Sons were surprised to find themselves well on the short end of the score and their prize pitcher, Harry Griffith of no-hit, no-run fame, catapulted from the box.

Lefty Wakeman moved in from first base to take over the mound duties vacated by Griffith and managed to hold the Alturas batters more or less in check from there on out. Simultaneously the Sons' sticklers began to get the range and managed to turn enough hits into runs to pull away in the stretch. Just the same, the Sons were outlived, 19-15, and pretty lucky to win.

Quinn topped Klamath's batters with a home run and two triples and J. Pastega also collected three for five including a double, but the heaviest stickwork of the day was credited to Allen, Alturas centerfielder, who banged out five in six, including a brace of two-baggers, and H. Flournoy, also of Alturas, who boasted a home run and a double among his five hits.

The game included one almost unbelievable feature—there were no strikeouts on either side.

Monday morning Pitcher Griffith and Third Baseman Quinn, who fills the catcher's role in softball play, left for Salem with the Smoke team in quest of the state softball title.

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SAVICH, ESTES RENEW BATTLE

Utah Grappler Hopes to Wipe Out Memory of Previous Defeat.

It was late on the evening of April 13, 1937, that Danny Savich and Toots Estes, principal competitors in Tuesday night's wrestling program here, last treading holds on the armory mat, and the memory of that evening has hung heavy on the minds of both participants—to say nothing of a big bunch of wrestling fans—ever since.

To Savich it is a memory of a close and heart-breaking defeat, to Estes a memory of a successful but narrow escape and to both a memory of one of the fastest, hardest-fought battles in their respective ring careers.

On that memorable evening Savich pinned Estes first, dropped him with a flying tackle that echoed from one gallery to another and shook the cobwebs from the rafters.

When they returned to action, they went at it harder than ever, on and on and on until finally, with the time limit drawing near, they launched simultaneous counterattacks from opposite sides of the ring.

They collided head-on and collapsed in a heap, gasping, dizzy, Savich, however, was injured, and Estes was not. Eventually Estes managed to crawl out of the pile of arms and legs and on top of his opponent. All he had to do to win the fall was just lie there, because Savich wasn't moving, not so you could notice it, anyhow.

That was the end until now. Savich hurt his leg in the collision, wasn't able to return for another round, and Estes was declared winner by default.

Savich and Estes were the main events on that April night, and they will be the main events again Tuesday, largely because in both cases, they had cleaned up on about all the other opposition in sight. Savich is determined to wipe out that previous defeat, which he is inclined to believe was not honestly imposed, and Estes will be out to prove that his earlier victory was no fluke.

Promoter Mack Lillard thinks it's a match which will appeal to all the fans.

From this distance, the outcome of the Sammy Kohen-Wild Man Zim affair, which will support the Estes-Savich feature, appears to rest to a big extent on whether or not Kohen can evade Zim's punishing surfboard.

Last week the wild man specialty made Jack LaRue fold up like a deck chair, and LaRue is no softy, as he once amply demonstrated by kicking out of Frank Clemens' "Indian analyzer" three times before finally going under.

Kohen, however, is not only a heap more clever but also a powerful lot more powerful than LaRue, and he very likely will be able to escape Mr. Zim's surfboard, meanwhile inflicting the villainies at which he is most adept on the person of the erstwhile Ozark mountaineer.

Already the stadium lights have lighted in Brother Kohen's eyes at the thought of Zim's long and stringy locks. In brief, he plans to make a mess of that mareel.

For his own good, though, he should bear in mind that Zimmy does not long brook any maneuvers involving tantalization to his topknot. It was, indeed, LaRue's ill-advised attack on the wild one's mane that set off the dynamic cap resulting in his downfall a week ago.

The opening bout may prove to be a show-stealer, especially among those who like their wrestling straight, fast and spectacular. The participants in the initial engagement are Sailor Dick Trout, the dropkicking tar from San Diego, and Bobby Wagner, New England light and junior heavy titleholder.

Both boys are billed as clean, scientific grapplers. Trout has already established his methods here and Wagner coming with that reputation.
