

DAMAGE SUITS SEEK \$60,000 IN AUTO DEATH

Damages totaling \$60,000 were demanded in three suits filed in circuit court here Tuesday as an aftermath of the automobile accident July 24 in which Mildred Hicks and Dewey Byrne were killed.

The Ewauna Box company, employer of Byrne and Ralph Peyton, driver of Byrne's car, was named defendant in each suit, as was Peyton. Peyton also faces involuntary manslaughter charges filed against him after the accident.

Ray M. Hicks, father of Mildred Hicks and administrator of her estate, is the plaintiff in a suit asking \$10,000 damages, the statutory limit in case of death. Mrs. Grace Hicks, mother of Mildred, and Viola Hicks, another daughter, assertedly permanently injured in the accident, are plaintiffs in two suits asking \$25,000 each.

Complaints in the three suits are similar. They assert that the automobile occupied by Byrne and Peyton belonged to Byrne and was used in connection with his employment as logging superintendent of the Ewauna Box company. They state Peyton was driving the car with Byrne's consent and charge the speed of the car just prior to the accident was in excess of 75 miles an hour. Supporting the charge that Peyton was driving negligently, the complaints allege the car was on the left side of the highway.

Mildred Hicks, who was killed in the accident, was riding with her sister, Viola, and her mother, who was operating the Hicks car. The accident occurred on the Lakeview highway near the junction.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs are William Lord, T. Walter Gillard and Arthur W. Schaupp.

DAMAGE BY FROST REPORTED SPOTTY

Damage from this week's frost has been "spotty" and in general of no great extent, County Agent Charles A. Henderson stated Tuesday.

The frost, he said, seemed to strike in "pockets." It touched some fields which escaped entirely the heavy frost of August 1.

"Fields that were hit hard by both cold spells look pretty bad, but a majority of the potatoes are in condition to respond nicely to warm weather, which we devoutly hope for," said the agent.

Twenty days of good growing weather, Henderson said, would add tremendously to the size of the crop in this basin.

FIVE 'JONER DAY' BLAZES CONTROLLED

August 23, "Joner day" for Klamath forest and grass fire fighters, came to a close with the day's five fires under full control.

Klamath Forest Protective men said they had come to look on August 23 as a sure day for fires and therefore were not surprised Monday when one fire report after another was received. For several years, that date has been marked by numerous fires.

Most dangerous blaze of the day was in the Grizzly mountain region. Fire started there in grass land, close to fine timber. A crew with a tractor surrounded it late Monday.

Two boys who set a fire near the city dump with a piece of magnifying glass have been turned over to county juvenile authorities. A resident of the district brought them to the police station, after they had gone to his house to report a bad fire. The boys admitted they had set the blaze, but said they attempted to stamp it out and when it grew they took off their shirts to beat it. They said they had obtained the glass from the city dump and that they previously had set fires in this manner.

The fire set off in the direction of Hogback but was controlled.

Two loggers working on Jenny creek, irked at yellow jackets, set a fire to burn them out. The blaze spread but was checked before it had done any damage.

Grass fires broke out on Lake-shore drive and near Weyerhaeuser junction.

MEAT CONTEST TO FEATURE 4-H FAIR

The junior livestock show and auction sale which is to be held on August 30 and 31 at the fairgrounds is expected to be especially interesting to 4-H boys and girls this year as there will be so many different things for them to participate in.

One of the contests which is creating considerable interest is the "meat identification contest" which is being sponsored by the Swift and Company. This is the third year that Swift has sponsored such a contest throughout the United States for 4-H club boys and girls. It is, however, the first year that it has been sponsored in Klamath county.

Mr. Mead, manager of the local Swift and company plant, is giving the contest his full cooperation. Any boy or girl who is enrolled in 4-H club work in Klamath county is eligible to enter the contest. The winner of the contest will be awarded a trip to the Pacific International livestock show which is to be held in Portland this fall. This award for first place should inspire any boy or girl who is lucky enough to be the winner.

The contest consists of identifying 30 different retail cuts of meat and writing an essay of not more than 500 words on one of the following subjects: "The Story of Beef, Pork and Lamb," "Building a Balanced Diet Around Meat," or "What May Be Learned From a Visit to a Retail Meat Market." There is also a mathematical problem concerning the weights of various carcasses to be solved by those entering the contest.

Mead, manager of the local plant, in cooperation with Safeway has arranged to have these cuts of meat on display at the Swift and company plant on the afternoon of August 25 at 3 p. m. so that the contestants may examine them and see how they look in the actual kind of meat.

All 4-H club members who intend to participate in the contest should be at the Swift and company plant on Market street.

at that time so they may examine these various cuts of meat.

After these cuts of meat have been examined, the contestants will be given paper and pencil and will be expected to identify the cuts of meat from the pictures as they appear in the Swift and company pamphlet, and this part of the contest will be completed.

The essay to be written on any of the above three subjects and the problems appearing on page 6 of the pamphlet may be written up and turned in at the fairgrounds by 2 o'clock on Sunday, August 29. These papers will be judged, the problems corrected and the name of the boy or girl winning the contest will be announced at the auction sale Tuesday afternoon, August 31.

This is an excellent opportunity for the boys and girls to learn more about these various cuts of meat and to see how the animal that they are feeding will be used after it is slaughtered. It will also encourage a broader knowledge of retail cuts of meat.

NEW GASOLINE PLANT TO RISE ON SOUTH SIXTH

Marshall Cornett, head of the Modoc Gas and Oil company, announced Tuesday that he has acquired three acres on South Sixth street just outside the city limits and will develop there immediately a new wholesale distribution plant for Richfield products as well as other improvements.

Cornett said the estimated cost of the projected work is about \$30,000.

The three acres were purchased from the Klamath White Pine company and lie between South Sixth street and the O. C. and E. tracks. A spur track will be constructed to serve businesses on the property.

The Richfield plant, with 100,000 gallon storage facilities, will be developed back off of Sixth street. Facing the street, a store building will be constructed and leased to tenants, Cornett stated. The Modoc Gas and Oil company will move from its present location on the Great Northern tracks near Link river. Cornett said the business has expanded to such an extent a move into larger quarters is necessary.
