Los Angeles was tied again with the San Francisco Seals for third place in the Pacific Coast baseball league Friday as the circuit leadership remained status quo.

The Angels, with the aid of Steve Meener who had a perfect night at bat, getting five for five, including a brace of two-baggers, gave the Oakland A's their second straight licking, 6 to 2, as Seattle broke into the win column for the first time in its series with the Seals to take a 3 to 2 decision.

Behind the two-hit pitching of Mangel Salvo, the San Diego Padres defeated Portland, 1 to 0. It was their first win of the current series. The Beavers made both hits in the eighth inning.

The league leading Sacramento outfit had an easy time with the cellar champion San Francisco Missions, winning 11 to 3 to hold its half-game margin.

Seattle ganged up on Sad Sam Gibson, the league's leading pitcher, to score all its three runs in the sixth inning when Hal Spindel, Dick Barrett, Alan Strange and Art Hunt bagged singles.

The Seals gave Gibson poor support, Ted Jennings at short and Frankie Hawkins at third base making errors. The Seals out-hit the Tribe, 8 to 7, and made two double plays. In the fifth inning they made three hits and one run and in the eighth, two hits and one run.

Until their victory Thursday night, the Padres had lost five in a row. They scored their lone and winning run in the second inning when George Detore singled, Ted Williams walked and both runners advanced as Cedric Durst grounded out at first. George McDonald was walked and the bases were loaded. Detore scored on a long outfield fly by Joe Berkowitz. Leroy Herrmann, one of the Missions' most consistent winning pitchers, was lost to them for the balance of the season Thursday when he broke a thumb stopping a line drive from the bat of Nick Cullop.

Five Collegians To Carry Brunt Of All-Star Tilt

CHICAGO, Aug. 27 (AP)—Not even the coaches know how many of the 66 college all-stars will see action against the Green Bay Packers next Wednesday night—but they indicated today that at least five are being counted on to carry much of the burden against the professional champions.

Those five were Sammy Baugh of Texas Christian, John Drake of Purdue, Ed Jankowski of Wisconsin, Vernon Huffman of Indiana and Ed Wilkinson of Minnesota. After a heavy drill last night, Head Coach Gus Dorais intimated he would take no chance on last minute injuries to those men. The stars probably will hold one more heavy scrimmage, but it is probable they will have little part in it.

Baugh and Drake are counted on as "key passers" for the game, while the coaching staff believes that the blocking of Wilkinson, Janowski and Huffman will be one of the big factors in the Stars' offense.

Next Monday night, the Collegians will work out in Soldier field, scene of the fourth annual charity tilt. The Packers will drill there Tuesday night.

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Referee-Socking Interlude Provides Brisk Arguments

Whether Toots Estes, fiery former Hawaiian champ, was justified in socking Referee Marshall Carter at the climax of last Tuesday night's armory main event wrestling bout and whether, in turn, Carter was justified in disqualifying Estes and awarding the match to Danny Savich are two questions which are raising the warmest kind of discussion among Klamath's mat fans, according to reports from the places where that part of the population gathers for its hot stove grapping.

There's no doubt that Toots did sweat the referee. He did that in plain sight of all the customers, not once but half a dozen times.

At the time neither Carter nor Savich was in the ring, because Estes had previously sent them both flying through the ropes as if the object of the sport was to clear the wrestling site of all forms of human life.

The socks came when Carter and Savich took turns at trying to return to the ring. Savich, in order to continue hostilities and Carter in order to superintend them. Estes dashed alternately from one side to the other, first punching Savich back into the ringside seats and then clipping the referee until he collapsed to the floor.

After a while Carter grew pretty exasperated and indignant and ceased trying to climb back in. Instead he walked over to where Savich reclined and lifted the Utah boy's hand in token of victory by a foul.

Now the consensus of opinion is that Savich had come to him all the rough treatment he received. He'd been anything but good-natured in his manner from the start of the bout and anything but genteel in his wrestling.

PORTLAND, Aug. 27 (AP)—Good fishing in spots, disappointing coastal streams and conditions generally only "fair" were indicated by reports from over the state during the past week in the Oregon game commission said in its weekly bulletin.

Reports by counties included: Lane—Eastern half, some good catches in upper McKenzie; upper Willamette fair, with good catches near Oakridge; best lakes in Taylor burn.

Deschutes—Fishing good in Deschutes near Maupin, spinners and worms working best. Fly fishing unusually good in East and Paulina lakes and Deschutes below Sheeps bridge. Baitfishing good at south Twin lake and bucktail fly at Sparks lake.

Crook and Jefferson—Angling generally poor, but good catches on soft-shelled crawfish in Deschutes river in Jefferson county.

Josephine—Reports from over 250 miles of the Rogue river show fishing only fair. Best trout fishing in the forks and tributaries of upper river from Prospect. Large fish, steelheads and salmon scarce until mouth of Kelsey creek is reached, about 50 miles below Grants Pass.

Bill Terry and Charley Grimm, a couple of guys who are about as chummy as the Japs and Chinese, had one thing in common Friday.

Neither could shed any tears over the fact that Dizzy Dean was on the way back to St. Louis with a sore shoulder that may keep him off the firing line long enough to put the Cardinals' pennant hopes in the face with a spade.

And Frankie Frisch, the Cards' boss, who has no bed of roses, at best—the Gas House gang being what it is—found a couple of new gray hairs when he applied the comb to his scalp this morning.

Without Dizzy in there, the Cards have as much chance against Grimm's Cubs and Terry's Giants as a siren steak with a pack of hungry dogs. Short on pitchers even when they're all present and accounted for, it's a creaky machine with the great talker out of action.

So, when Dizzy served Leo Norris with a two-base ball to open the Cards' game with the Phillies Thursday and then announced that his right arm—the most valuable piece of pitching bric-a-brac in the business—was on the friz, the dark clouds overhead landed right in Frisch's lap. On the way down, they washed out the second game of a scheduled doubleheader, after the Phils took the opener, 8-5, but by that time a tornado would have received no more notice from the St. Louis outfit than a mild breeze.

Both the Giants and Cubs had a day off Thursday, with old man weather washing out everything in the circuit but the Phils-Cards clash.

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YOUNGSTER IN SEMI-FINALS

Bud Ward Pitted Against Fischer, Goodman and Billows.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 27 (AP) A young upstart from the Pacific northwest who has never won a title of any kind—Marvin (Bud) Ward—caused a lot of commotion in the national amateur golf tournament here today when he joined three big-shots, Champion Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati, Johnny Goodman of Omaha and Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., in the 36-hole semi-finals.

The 24-year-old youngster from Olympia, Wash., who works in the collection division of the Washington state tax commission, collected enough pars and birdies to knock off four tough opponents, and today the trio of famous sharpshooters, particularly Fischer and Goodman, didn't know how seriously to take him.

Goodman, winner of the national open in 1933 and the pre-tournament favorite, was to find out just how tough this Ward fellow might be in the lower-bracket battle today.

Fischer, only two matches away from successfully defending the crown he won last year with an extra-hole victory over Jock McLean of Scotland, took on Billows, New York state champion, in the other long-distance battle that was more to the liking of the experts than the quick-finish once-around affairs.

"I'm just going out and hit that ball and if the shots aren't good enough, I guess it will be just too bad for me," commented Ward, who has been campaigning around the northwest for several years but has never been able to knock off a championship.

He was low qualifier in the northwest district trials for the national both this and last year and has been low amateur in several open tournaments, but his match play hasn't been too hot.

"Guess I've learned how to play extra hole matches, anyhow," Ward said, after beating Fred Haas of Baton Rouge, La., national intercollegiate champion, at the 21st hole and Winfield Day, of San Gabriel, Cal., at the nineteenth.

Last year, in his first national tournament, he was beaten by Claude Rippey of Washington, D. C., in a bitter 21-hole battle in the first round.

Fischer, seeking the distinction of being the seventh man to win the title two years in succession in the 41-year-old history of the national tournament, eliminated Bill Holt of Syracuse, N. Y., 5 and 4, and 47-year-old Chick Evans of Chicago, 1 up in that order yesterday.

Evans, after capturing his 52nd national amateur victory by downing Frank Straatof of Brooklyn, former national public links king, 3 and 2, made a great stand against Fischer but a series of wild shots on four holes on the first nine cost him the match. He carried Fischer to the eighteenth only to miss a six-footer for a half that would have sent the match into extra holes.

The grand old man of the links who won the national championship in 1916 and 1920 had squandered the battle at the seventeenth when the titlist missed a four-footer for a par.

Evans' nerves were on edge throughout the battle because his wife, Mrs. Evans, had been hit in the mouth with a golf club swung by a caddy earlier in the match and it caused him considerable concern. Mrs. Evans suffered shock from the injury and the accident delayed Chick in teeing off against Fischer.

Goodman played steadily, was three over par in defeating Lieut. Ken Rogers of Honolulu, 3 and 1, in the morning, and was one over when he eliminated Don Moe, the

Portland pride, 3 and 1, in the afternoon.

Billows became a strong threat when he disposed of two strong contenders, Charles Kocsis of Royal Oak, Mich., 3 and 2, and then Reynolds Smith of Dallas, Texas, a former Walker cup player, 2 up.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 27 (AP)—A new champion is in order for the 35th annual women's western golf tournament, which reached the semi-final round today—although champions will be very much in evidence.

All remaining four players are champions in their own right, holding titles of other important events.

Meeting in the upper bracket of the championship division today were Marion Miley of Cincinnati, winner recently for the 3rd straight time of the women's western derby, and Marian McDougall of Portland, Ore., Pacific northwest titlist.

Pushed out of the competition yesterday in a tight battle by Miss Betty Jameson, San Antonio, Texas, was Dorothy Traugott of San Francisco, who won the tournament a year ago by defeating

Miss Beatrice Barrett of Minneapolis, 4 and 5, in the 36-hole finals at South Bend, Ind. Miss Jameson dropped in a 12-foot putt for a birdie deuce on the eighteenth hole to win one up.

Miss McDougall also had a hard time in gaining a decision by a similar margin over Betty Berg, the young Minneapolis red head, who in the past few years has been figuring prominently in tournaments of national importance.

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
