

HIGH SCHOOL OFFICE OPENS TO STUDENTS

High school students who have not registered for the coming year should do so at once. Principal Lloyd B. Emery stated Friday.

Emery said that the school offices are kept open daily for the convenience of registrants. Students who wish to change their programs, or new arrivals in town who did not register last spring should call before the opening of school on September 7, he stated.

Teachers will hold a special meeting on September 6, Labor day, and classes will get underway on the seventh.

Emery said the program had been worked out to the full capacity of the building, and late changes may disrupt the plans. Hence it is necessary for all students to be registered prior to the opening.

The principal announced that Chester R. Shuler, of the University of Nebraska, has been employed to teach English. Mrs. Alene Williamson, Portland, has been assigned to manage the cafeteria and to teach home economics. She will be the only full-time home economics teacher.

Aletha Gray, who has been office secretary, will teach commercial subjects the coming year. Mrs. Ruth Livingston, Seattle, has been employed as secretary.

Emery said there are two vacancies still in the staff but that he expects they will be filled in a few days.

Emery also cited important changes in graduation requirements ordered by the state department of education.

Hereafter, three years of physical education will be required of all graduates, beginning with last year's freshmen. Freshmen and sophomores the coming year must all take physical education. If any sophomores have signed up for five subjects without physical education, they must change their schedule to include that subject.

Seniors must take a half year of civics and a half year of U. S. history. Seniors hereafter must take a course in socio-economic problems.

CALLIOPE FAN NEAR ULTIMATE AMBITION

PORTLAND, Aug. 27 (AP)—It took Albion C. Libby, Spokane newspaper writer, to furnish the aesthetic touch in amateur circus performances.

No clownish costume or garish mask justified his presence in the parade preceding the "big show" (Cole Bros.) here today. Anticipation of an ambition yet to be attained contributed, with pride, to his thrill as he rode through Portland streets on the steam calliope.

Next year, he hopes, he may be at the keyboard.

A life-long circus fan, Libby was drawn by the artistic, rather than the humorous appeal of the world of the sawdust ring and the big top. He conceived an early ambition to become a calliope player.

Two years ago he began his apprenticeship, learning to pronounce the word to rhyme with antelope rather than penelope. The next lesson he learned from "Crazy Ray," the circus virtuoso, and learning to fire the boiler, which, he declares, requires an artistry approaching that of the musician.

Libby, says Ray, shows exceptional promise at firing.

The yearning for artistic expression, combined with that intrinsic lure of the circus that causes Harper Joy, Spokane banker, and Rufus Woods, Wenatchee, Wash., publisher, to play short engagements as clowns, caused Libby to leave his writing assignment for a few days and fly to Portland to continue his training.

His devotion was rewarded when Ray, his maestro, admitted that next year he might reach the ultimate goal and preside at the keyboard.

When they are married, officials performing the ceremony must write on the marriage certificate the time of the ceremony.
