

Sons Meet Burns Here for League Pennant

CONTEST WILL CLIMAX SEASON

Two Clubs Tied for Lead; Close, Bitter Struggle Forecast

A battle for the Inter-Wonderland league championship and possibly the last big local baseball game of the year will be played Sunday on Modoc field when Hines invades the city to meet the Klamath Sons of Italy.

Sunday's game will wind up the regular season for both Burns and the Sons, and the pre-contest standings find them in a tie for the league lead with seven victories and two defeats apiece.

The Sons opened their schedule against Burns in the central Oregon town more than two months ago and edged out the Hines outfit, 3-0, on Harry Griffith's three-hit pitching job.

Since that time the Klamath entry has suffered upset defeats in the field to Bieber and to Fall River, which has now dropped out of the league. After its initial loss, the Hines outfit ploughed through the season unbeaten until it ran into a surprise at Lakeview two weeks ago and took another one on the chin.

Both teams will collide on the battle scene with virtually the same lineups with which they started the season, and another close, hard-fought struggle appears in prospect.

The Sons will rely for victory and the league pennant on a crew of sluggers averaging .323 and led by H. Wakeman, who boasts a .486 percentage, and on the strong right flipper of Pitcher Griffith.

Overwork in the form of the tough San Francisco Seals and bi-weekly softball engagements in addition to his regular duties with the later-Wonderland club has recently shown signs of lowering Griffith's effectiveness, but Manager Louis Pastega of the Sons thinks that the week of complete rest Griffith has had since his last engagement will restore his star flinger to early-season form.

If the Red Sox of the Northern California league drop the rubber game of the semi-final playoff series with Redding Sunday, regular baseball on Modoc field will probably end with the Burns-Sons encounter. Pastega said, however, that if the Sox are eliminated from the playoff and the Sons manage to beat Burns, he will try to arrange a Sons-Sox exhibition for the Labor day weekend.

In a game sprinkled with errors played on wind-swept, dusty Modoc field, the Klamath Falls Red Sox went down to defeat 6-2 before the traveling Van Dyke's colored House of David club Friday evening.

The contest was marred throughout by the strong wind which swept the entire field, making the diamond a veritable dust bowl and causing numerous errors.

The game got underway soon after 5 o'clock, but by the sixth inning it was becoming too dusky, and the battle was called off at the first of the seventh.

The House of David gang went to work on Turpin, Red Sox hurler, in the first frame, gathering three hits and scoring twice, and the Red Sox came right back in their half of the inning and scored two runs on one hit and two free passes to first by Pitcher Berry, together with an error by Centerfielder Worley of the Van Dykes.

The score remained 3-2 until the fourth inning when the colored boys got out their big bats and slammed out four hits, including a double, to bring in three runs, making the count 5-2 at the start of the fifth.

Frankhouse Hurls No-Hitter As Dodgers Beat Cincinnati

Like an accident going some place to happen, or a guy falling off his horse, you never can tell what spot fame will pick out to land on.

That's not taking any of the credit from curvballer Freddy Frankhouse for the no-hit, no-run game by which he checked his hat in the hall of fame Friday. But, rated off the records, Freddy, who has kicked around the National league for 11 seasons, without causing any wholesale gnashing of teeth on the part of rival batters, would certainly not be one of the 19 or 20 pitchers you'd name as most likely to turn the trick. And particularly since he's working for the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Yet, there it was in the record books Saturday, 31-year-old Fred Frankhouse, with a record of 102 victories and 77 losses in tossing for the Cards, Beas and Brooklyn since 1927, receives credit for a no-hit, no-run game. He walked six, and a seventh man drew a life on an error as he did the job against the Cincinnati Reds by a 5-0 margin.

Bill Radonits, Portland hurler, was credited with his sixteenth win of the season. Herman Pillette was charged with the Padres' defeat.

Johnny Vergez drove out a homer for Sacramento as Tony Freitas of the Senators emerged victorious from a tight pitching duel with Lou Tost of the Missions. Cooper's single in the ninth inning, driving in Williams and Prout, was the pay-off hit of the game.
