At the same time, the girls' canning club exhibits will be judged beginning at 9 o'clock in the exhibit building, and at 10 o'clock the girls will give competitive demonstrations of canning methods, the winning team receiving a trip to the state fair to enter the contest there. Last year a team from Malin won third place in state competition.

Special Awards
Canning exhibits will include, in the first division, two varieties of canned fruit by each girl; in the second division, two varieties of fruit and two jars of jelly or preserves; and in the third division, two varieties of fruit, two jars of jelly or preserves and two jars of meat, vegetables or pickles.

In addition to the regular premiums for these exhibits, starting with scholarships to the Four-H summer school, special awards have been donated for the contest by the Art and Gift shop, Mary's Beauty shop, Malin Mercantile, Pearce Beauty shop, Norman Beauty shop, Peoples' Thrift store, Malin's Furniture store and O'Brien Sales and Service. The Modern Electric shop is furnishing refrigerators and a range for the demonstrations.

election campaigns to go to work: Wyoming, home state of Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney; and Montana, where Senator Burton K. Wheeler is making a series of speeches to his constituents. All five senators fought the court bill.

The bloc of democratic senators who opposed the court program repeatedly have challenged the national leadership to "fight" and read them out of the party, although most of the administration leaders in congress have declared there would be no move toward interference in the primaries.

Fight Ahead
An attack on the rebels as "in-grates" by Senator Joseph Gaf-

ney, democrat, Penna., just before adjournment of congress and the remarks of President Roosevelt in signing the lower court bill—which was substituted for the original supreme court enlargement program at the dictate of the insurgents.—prompted Burke to express belief that there was "a real fight" ahead. The president emphasized in his statement that the battle for the objective of his court program would continue.

Burke said that, if the conflict were carried into the states by the administration, it would mean that the president sought to reform the party by driving out those who have swerved from his leadership.

"I hope that the president does carry the fight to the people," Burke said.

"If the people of my own state are not convinced now that the supreme court proposal was a 'useless, futile and utterly dangerous abandonment of constitutional principles,' I would like to know about it at once."

"I have no doubt at all that in Missouri, Nevada, Wyoming, Montana and Nebraska, the overwhelming majority of the people were delighted that the court bill went down to defeat. I think they commend their democratic sena-

tors who helped bring about that defeat.
"They still, in large numbers, love and respect the president. They know all of the reasons given for his court bill.
"If Mr. Roosevelt has any new ideas it is probably well for him to go out and present them. If Senator Guffey, Mr. Farley or the president go into Nebraska to defend the original or substitute court proposals or to criticize me for opposing them, I shall welcome the occasion to let my people know just how outrageous and vicious a proposition it was. And I shall mince no words in describing it."

badly in need of funds and because of the large membership of the lumberworkers. It looked like a juicy plum to them to pay up their indebtedness.

"The Klamath local of L. & E. M. workers has a large portion of its membership in sub-locals established at or near where the membership works so that they may have a meeting place convenient for their attendance. Only these members actually living in Klamath Falls were affiliated with the Central Labor union. According to the AFL set-up, all local unions in a district are eligible to affiliate to the nearest central labor body. Had all of the sub-locals and other L. & E. M. workers in this district insisted upon their right to affiliate to the Central Labor council here and have sent their quota of delegates the L. & E. M. workers would have been able to have outvoted all other unions affiliated to the Klamath Central Labor council, and held our position there. At no time have the lumberworkers tried to dominate the Central Labor council.

"Another reason that the lumberworkers did not pay the July per capita tax was that the Central Labor body had promised to reimburse us for the cost of fixing up the basement so it would be fit to use as an office. The cost of this work was more than the per capita tax owed. The lumberworkers delegates to the meeting at which they were ousted had a check to pay the July tax but were instructed to hold the same in case we were ordered to vacate the Labor temple.

Small Fees
"Because we are an organization controlled by the membership and not by a group of highly paid officials, we are able to carry on our business with the small fee of \$1 per month dues, also we are able to set our initiation fee at \$1 for a period of 30 days, that is until October 1, 1937.

"We would like to inform the Central Labor council that we have sent our old charter back to the Carpenters & Joiners, but due to the fact that a social security agent representing the federal government has informed us that we must retain our financial records for a period of four years as they are liable to government inspection for that length of time, therefore, much as we would have liked to we have not sent these books to the Carpenters & Joiners."

ported," Dr. Ginsburg said, "about 80 percent of our cases have become extremely drowsy. Even during work, the patient would drop off to sleep and awaken several hours later as if nothing had happened. These sleeps became more frequent and a deep coma preceded death."

The incubation period seems to be 10 to 20 days after exposure. Symptoms include: drowsiness, headaches, restlessness, stiff neck, backache, fever, or a common cold.
"As for treatment, we are frankly baffled. We use medical science to keep the patient's body existence high and have been experimenting with a new drug but have not been overly successful so far.
"Many persons have mild cases and think it a common cold. Most of those who recover require three or four weeks to become normal while there are other persons who retain a permanent disability of some type, such as tremors, spasms, convulsions or insomnia."

Goodman, knowing the title he sought since 1929 was within grasp, pitched safely and sanely seven feet short of the pin. Billows sent a pitch and ran to the green but it ran past the pin about 25 feet. He took his regular, rather bowed, putting stance and tapped the ball sharply. He was off line and his ball rolled by the cup.

Under great strain, Goodman and Billows played excellent golf. The national open champion of 1933 who made the headlines in 1933 when he eliminated Bobby Jones in the first round of the national amateur at Pebble Beach, Calif., mediated the par 72 course in 146 strokes for the two rounds. Billows was one under the new champion with 145.

ALDERWOOD COUNTRY CLUB, Portland, Ore., Aug. 28 (AP)—Omaha's stocky John Goodman split the first two holes of the second 18 today to maintain his two-up advantage over Ray Billows, Foughkeepsie, N. Y., in the tussle for the national amateur championship. Five thousand spectators saw
