I Say Duchess —Did He Win?



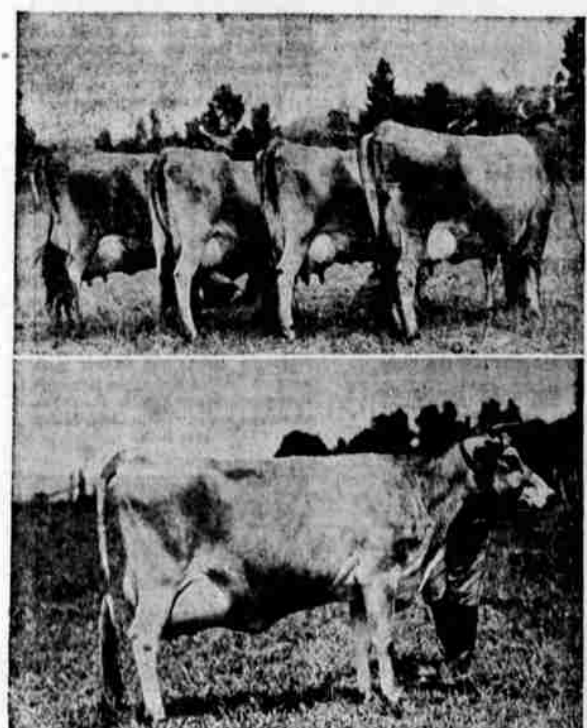

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (AP)—While the stock market's appetite was far from voracious in today's brief session, leading issues nibbled at a rally.

A number of the long brown-beaten rails came to the fore and encouraged quiet buying in some steels, oils, coppers and specialties.

The Shanghai powder keg continued a source of apprehension in the financial sector, but tension over possible international complications in the Far East appeared to have lessened.

There was little change in the spotty business and industrial picture and brokers attributed the selective upturn mainly to quick-turn trades based on the theory the list was due at least for a sizeable temporary upturn in view of the lengthy and sharp setback.

Dealings were exceptionally apathetic throughout. There was an assortment of losers at the finish. Transfers were around 300,000 shares.

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WORLD WHEAT PRICES DROP

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP)—World wheat prices sagged today under selling based partly on receipt of much needed rains in important producing sections of Argentina and slow demand of importing nations.

Chicago wheat fell more than two cents a bushel to within a fraction of the season's lows.

Wheat closed 2-2 1/2 cents below yesterday's finish, September \$1.04 1/4-%, December \$1.06 1/4-%, and corn was 1/4-1 1/4 % 92, September 94 1/4-%, December 92 1/4-%. Oats were 1/4 off to 1/2 up.
