Two Klamath Gospel Groups Will Combine

Climaxing what is said to have been one of the most successful revival meetings held in Klamath Falls, it was decided by unanimous vote of the joint membership Sunday to dissolve the Assembly of God church and unite it with Klamath temple. This action, forming one of the strongest full gospel churches in the northwest, makes it possible for a real progressive work to be carried out in Klamath Falls and the surrounding vicinity, according to the pastors of both churches.

Rev. Guy DeVries, pastor of the Assembly, has resigned and will leave shortly for evangelistic work in the south. Mr. DeVries is well known in Klamath Falls, and his many friends wish him well in his new work. A farewell service will be held at a later date.

Rev. Roy E. Southard, who joined the Klamath temple about four months ago as pastor, will continue as pastor of the united congregation. Mr. Southard is very optimistic about the future of the work and feels that the merger is one of the outstanding steps of the full gospel work in this city.

The revival services that have been conducted by Evangelist C. G. Meyers and party of Florida will continue under the leadership of Rev. R. O. Melby of Los Angeles, with meetings every night except Monday night.

Mr. Melby is one of the oldest ministers in the full gospel movement, having been in the Azusa street mission. Everyone is invited to enjoy these services, and a warm welcome to all is given by the pastor.

At any rate the grounds are busy. The reports coming in from almost all the centers show that the aggregate daily attendance is mounting day by day. Of course weather conditions have a lot to do with attendance but, warm weather does not seem to stop the youngsters materially, and neither does cold. RANGER RECEIVES LETTER RECOVERED FROM AIR WRECK
LAVA BEDS NATIONAL MONUMENT, Cal. (Special)—A grim reminder of the air crash which claimed 13 lives near Panama a short time ago, Ranger Albert E. Long last week received an air mail letter recovered from the wreckage.

The letter was one of only 52 recovered from the plane's mail cargo. It bore a rubber stamp impression indicating its recovery from an airship crashed at sea. Effects of water soaking were plainly visible.

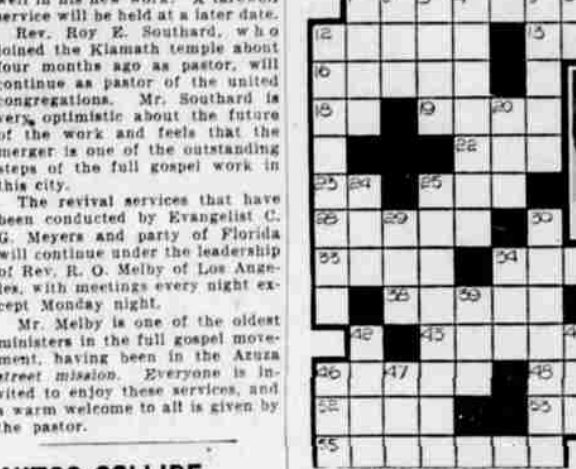

Driver Convicted on Triple Charge

Charges of drunken driving, hit and run and having no operator's license were filed by city police against George Groat Monday. Groat was fined \$25 on the hit and run charge, \$5 on the operator's license count and was given a sentence of \$100 fine and 30 days in jail on the drunken driving charge. The jail sentence was suspended on condition he would pay for damage done to the car allegedly struck by his machine.

Olin L. Priddy was given a sentence of \$100 and 30 days for drunken driving. He was fined \$5 for having no operator's license.

Gene Blanche Smith forfeited \$15 on a reckless driving charge. Hiram E. Vinson forfeited \$5 on a charge of having four persons in the driver's seat of his car. Jacob Mantiel forfeited \$5 for reckless driving, as did Chester L. Stokes and Eldon A. Clark. Donald Chapel, arrested for reckless driving, was to appear Monday afternoon.

George Woodrow Dodson, charged with reckless driving, was given a fine of \$50 or 25 days in jail.

Bill Anderson, convicted of vagrancy, was given a fine of \$100 and a jail sentence of 30 days was suspended.

Those arrested by city police for drunkenness, with the sentences were: Bill Murdoch, \$15 or 7 days; Edward La Plant, \$15 or 7 days; Raymond Pompey, \$15 or 7 days; W. T. Gibbs, \$10 or 5 days; Pat McGilivray, \$10 or 5 days; Wilbur C. Courtney, \$10 forfeited; Alma Kraft, \$15 forfeited.

Joseph Burk, charged with vagrancy, was given a \$10 fine or 5 days in jail; Thomas Carroll, charged with vagrancy, was given a fine of \$100 or 30-day jail sentence, the latter being suspended in part.

Lonnie R. Griffith, charged with drunkenness, entered a plea of not guilty. He claimed he went to sleep in a car while waiting for some one and that police arrested him unjustifiably.

Christian Science

"Christ Jesus" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, August 29.

The Golden Text was, "The Father judgeth no man, but hath committed all judgment unto the Son: that all men should honour the Son, even as they honour the Father" (John 5:22, 23).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And John calling unto him two of his disciples sent them to Jesus, saying, Art thou he that should come? or look we for another? And Jesus answering said unto them, Go your way, and tell John what things ye have seen and heard; how that the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, to the poor the gospel is preached" (Luke 7:19, 22).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The mission of Jesus confirmed prophecy, and explained the so-called miracles of olden time as natural demonstrations of the divine power, demonstrations which were not understood. Jesus' workers established his claim to the Messiahship. In reply to John's inquiry, 'Art thou he that should come,' Jesus returned an affirmative reply, recounting his works instead of referring to his doctrine, confident that this exhibition of the divine power to heal would fully answer the question" (p. 131).
