TULELAKE CHAMBER TO PETITION FOR ROAD IMPROVEMENT

TULELAKE—Chamber of commerce members will meet October 12 in Alturas with Earl Kelly, director of public roads, and with Governor Frank Merriam to petition for some sort of action on the mile and a half stretch of unfinished highway that harrasses motorists both summer and winter.

While no immediate change in the road situation is seen the people of the Tulalake district plan to keep the problem fresh in the mind of those in authority in an effort to get action as soon as possible.

Captain Smith of the state highway patrol was present for Monday night's session and heard a protest against the recent change in the state patrol set up here. Ed Washburn, formerly permanently located in Tulalake has been moved to Dorris and will divide his time between that town and Tulalake. It is the opinion of the Tulalake residents that a full time officer is needed here and an effort is to be made toward an immediate change.

Dwight Gilchrist, Klamath Falls, Modoc council Boy Scout director, spoke on the need for more direct support for the local scouts, and members of the American Legion, speaking for that organization, pledged support of the local troop.

With decisive backing the troop will contribute financially to the central organization and in return will receive benefits of the council not received in the past.

Some discussion of the proposed change in game laws for next year also came before the session. While it is too late for action this season, Tulalake residents will continue to work toward a change in the season for hunting migratory water fowl before the opening of the shooting season next year, to conform with the season in southern Oregon.

"While from the president's viewpoint, I may have over-emphasized the importance of its partial use for industry, yet I have always advocated its widest distribution for the benefit of the greatest number of people," the governor said, referring to the Bonneville power output.
