

San Diego Wins Four in Row from Portland

COAST LEAGUE SEASON ENDS

Padres Claims 1937 Pennant With Sweeping Playoff Drive.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 4 (AP)—A successful Pacific coast league baseball season was buried with full honors today, and with it the Portland Beavers' hopes of retaining the championship they won in 1936.

San Diego's Padres furnished both pallbearers and the slow music when they defeated the Beavers for the fourth straight time, 6 to 4, in the shaggy playoff finals yesterday.

While the slow music was dished up by left-handed Wally Hebert who consistently defeated Portland during the scheduled season and for the second time in the playoff, the Padres buried the Beavers under a smothering barrage of base hits, including Rupert Thompson's fourth home run of the four-game series.

Wet grass and skidding outfielders converted George Myatt's single into a triple for the Padres in the opening inning. This, followed by a walk, two steals by Hal Patchett, a wild toss by Bill Cronin, Portland backstop, a two-bagger by Ted Williams and a single by George McDonald, gave San Diego a three run lead the Beavers never overcame.

Portland pushed across two runs in the fourth, but Thompson's homer was the straw which broke the Beavers' back, and San Diego coasted in.

The Padres won the series with eight straight wins. Four over first place Sacramento in the first of the playoff series and four over Portland. San Diego was skidding badly as the scheduled season ended and was in third place but dormant talent came to life in the playoffs. Portland nosed out Los Angeles to get in the first division and eliminated San Francisco in four straight to gain the finals.

Linfield's victory was marked by the brilliant running of Fred Scherner, fullback, who romped 53 yards for the sole touchdown of the game.

Eastern Oregon normal scored in the second period after recovering a fumble and again in the final.

The southern Oregon game rained out at Ashland, was played at Medford.

Nebraska And Cornell Offer Grid Surprises

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—Standing out in bold relief today after a "black Saturday" of frenetic football that left the experts groggy were the all but incredible performances of Nebraska's Cornhuskers and Cornell's big red stalwarts.

It is doubtful if the current season will witness any upset to compare with Nebraska's astonishing 14-9 conquest of Minnesota.

Hailed in some quarters as unbeatable, the Gophers overcame an early Cornhusker lead on Horace Bell's field goal from the 23-yard line early in the fourth quarter, but the aroused Nebraska's smothered right back to score the winning touchdown on Harris Andrews' bullet pass to Bill Callahan.

It was a triumph for Nebraska's hard-bitten line and her alert backs, who took full advantage of Minnesota's mistakes. It was a triumph, too, for Lawrence (Biff) Jones, new head coach of the Cornhuskers.

As for Cornell, veteran football reporters had to tuck back to the kaw-pann days for comparisons after watching the Ithacans shell Colgate into submission, 40-7. This was supposed to be one of Andy Kerr's best Colgate teams, but it was simply overwhelmed by the hard-charging Cornell line and bewildered by the ball-carrier and passing operations of Bud Holland, big Negro end, who scored three touchdowns. 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Injuries, Attendance, Boston Bees Major League Features

The 1937 major league season is a matter of history, with only the world series chapter still to be written, but up and down the big time a lot of the things that happened in the last 24 months won't be forgotten in a hurry.

Aside from little old New York's second-straight championship monopoly, the developments that seem standouts as you look back over the campaign were its success from a financial viewpoint, the epidemic of injuries that hit every club in both loops, the big surprise that was pulled out of the hat by the Boston Bees and the high-class wallowing of Ducky Medwick and Joe DiMaggio.

When the books are written off on this season, there seems little doubt that it will top any post-season mark in fan turnout and financial return. Except in few instances, attendance reports through the season have shown distinct improvement.

Riding high on the strength of their batting might, the New York Yankees Murderers' Row had little trouble finishing 13 games in front in their pennant chase during the season, largely because the rest of the American league fell apart at their approach.

Their neighbors across the Harlem, the Giants, found the going tougher, but once they climbed into the saddle, there was no stopping them. This became particularly apparent when the last of a long series of injuries deprived the Chicago Cubs of their first baseman, Rip Collins, in early August, definitely confining the Cubs to second place.

The Giants wound up with a 4-1 win over their best-hated pals, the Brooklyn Dodgers, Sunday.

An injury also took whatever there was in the Detroit Tigers. When an accidental baseball fractured Mickey Cochrane's skull and removed him permanently from the playing scene, a large part of the Tiger strength was gone.

The Cardinals, minus Dizzy Dean, who was of no use after having a hand in the National league's loss to the American leaguers in the all-star game, just made fourth place, dropping their finale to the Cubs, 6-4.

Boston's Red Sox again were the "cold flops" for Tom Yawkey and finished fifth. Their finale was a 6-1 beating at the hands of the Yankees Sunday, featuring Joe DiMaggio's homer with the bases loaded.

Cleveland's Indians again were a disappointment and rode in with fourth place. Johnny Allen, who had won 15 straight since recovering from illness, dropped the season's windup, 1-0, Sunday to the one-hit pitching of Jake Wade for the Tigers.

Washington's Senators and the Athletics, neither of which was ever in the race, split their last doubleheader, the A's taking the first game, 5-4, and losing the second, 4-3.

Riggs Defeats Von Cramm In Net Semi-Final

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 4 (AP)—Bobby Riggs, sensational young Los Angeles tennis master, defeats the world's No. 1 amateur player, J. Donald Budge, in the final match of the Pacific coast tennis tournament here today.

Tournament officials had expected to co-star Baron Gottfried Von Cramm with Budge in the championship match. But the 19-year-old Riggs upset their plans by cutting down the German star in three consecutive sets, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2, in their semi-final battle yesterday.

Budge previously had advanced to the finals with a 6-3, 5-7, 7-5, 6-2 victory over Frank Kovacs, 17, of Berkeley.

Riggs' victory evened his score with Von Cramm. In the semi-finals of the last national championship at Forest Hills he had the German down two sets but lost out in five.

It was Riggs' skillful backhand strike that really won the match from Von Cramm yesterday. He fired shot after shot of this kind to either pass the Baron with sharply-angled placements or force his opponent to net on attempted pickups of shots to his backhand.

The men's doubles final was called on account of darkness with the fifth set tied at nine all. The playoff, between Von Cramm and his Davis cup partner, Henner Henkel, and Budge and Wayne Sabin, of Portland, Ore., will be held Tuesday night in San Francisco.

Tinsley Standout Star Among Pro Football Rookies

CHICAGO, Oct. 4 (AP)—Gaynell Tinsley apparently isn't content to just win his spurs as a national professional football league "freshman"—he straps them on for every battle.

The husky all-American end from Louisiana State, who has blazed a brilliant path through the pro-league ranks from the start of the season, gave another demonstration yesterday of his right to be hailed as one of the standout first-year men of the season.

In the second period of the Cleveland Rams-Chicago Cardinals game before 10,000 fans at Cleveland, Tinsley scooped up a fumble by Harry Mattos and ran, stumbled and battered his way 20 yards for the touchdown which gave the Cardinals a 6 to 0 victory. Tinsley, a 195-pound six footer, fell to the ground on the five yard marker but regained his feet and continued over the goal line.

It was the second time in 10 days that Tinsley provided the Cardinals with their margin of victory. He scored all three touchdowns as the Cardinals whipped Washington on September 24.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4 (AP)—One of the major intersectional clashes of the season and three engagements bearing on the Pacific coast conference championship race headline this week's football scramble in the far west.

The league encounters bring into action the four eleven's still boasting unmarred records in the matter of title competition. Haring ties, the championship chase will develop into a three-way affair after next Saturday but the trail to the top will still be long and arduous.

Before the schedule is run out, each of the eight conference teams will have played the other in the round robin series.

Washington, defending the title, remains at home to take on Oregon State college, with the former favored to chalk up its second conference win. The Huskies defeated University of Southern California, 7 to 0, last week on the same day Oregon State was losing to University of California 24 to 6.

California turns on the power against Washington State college, the latter making its opening conference bid after winning from Idaho, 13 to 0, Saturday and playing a scoreless tie with Gonzaga the week before.

Championship hopes of the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins will be tested for the second time with luckless Stanford in the role of host at Palo Alto.

The Bruins, inactive since September 24 when they demolished a better than average Oregon team, 26 to 13, displayed sufficient power to rate them as strong challengers for the flag.

On the basis of the inaugural performance they will line up as favorites to trip a Stanford eleven which lost to Oregon, 7 to 6, last week and to Santa Clara, 13-7, the preceding Saturday.

Stanford, ranked as a pre-season threat, had several all-time players in its first game and lost the services of Quarterback Paulman in the Oregon game. Paulman tore shoulder ligaments and may be out for some time.

The main intersectional battle of the week will bring Ohio State's pass throwing combination to Los Angeles for a meeting with Southern California. Ohio State whipped Purdue handsly last Saturday and the training program at USC this week probably will include intensive drill against laterals.

St. Mary's Gaels face University of Nevada. Oregon squares off with Gonzaga and Arizona enters the Oklahoma Aggies in other top matches.

The Universities of Santa Clara and San Francisco come together Sunday in their annual yardage struggle.

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CARTER READY FOR BELCASTRO

Missourian Declares Himself Well Able to Handle Italian.

Marshall Carter, Missouri mentor of mangle, meets Pete Belcastro, a fellow of whom you may have heard, in the main event of Tuesday night's armory wrestling program, and he goes into the contest with all the confidence that comes of three weeks' intensive training.

Brother Carter probably did not realize at the outset that his activities would be directed to the end they have now taken, and indeed, they were not, at the time. Nonetheless, it is expected his recent experiences will stand him in good stead when he comes face to face with the obdurate Belcastro.

It's fairly common knowledge by now that ever since Wolfe allegedly fouled Clements in a gymnasium training bout, the sentiments of the Oklahoma and Texan bear toward each other have been just about as warm as the love of China for Japan.

Observers who remember how the Indian twice dumped "the Black Dragon," one of the more notable of recent ring terrorists, after he hadn't been given a ghost of a chance, are pretty confident Clements fans won't have any need for crying towels after the match is over.

The Tuesday night card opens with a bout between Bobby Wagner, little New Englander, and Gorilla Pogi, stubby Argentine.

Pogi is dreadfully unskilled in wrestling etiquette and, for that reason, may make things tough for Wagner. The New Hampshire laddie, however, has a way—many ways, in fact—of putting guys on their backs. You may remember he did just that to Toots Kates a couple of weeks ago, and Pogi hardly stands as high in the wrestling ranks as Kates.

Frankie Murdock, another of Oklahoma's myriad grappling products, will serve as referee for the nonce.
