

BUDGET CUTS PROPOSED BY HEALTH BOARD

Reduced budget for operating expenses of the Klamath county health department was recommended late last week by the board of health in regular session.

Outstanding in the board's recommendations was a reduction in travel mileage payment to 4-cent per mile basis in place of the 8-cent per mile basis of the past year.

If this recommendation is accepted, the amount for travel from the health officer and staff would be \$1400, instead of \$2800 last year.

Other reductions in budgeted amounts for the health department make a total of \$16,732.50 over expenses in 1936, a saving of \$2635.50. If the recommended travel expense reduction is approved, more will be saved from the budget, making a total of \$18,732.50 over 1936, a saving of \$4635.50.

From the 1936 budget (from the 1935 budget) the following items were listed as reductions: salaries for health officers, secretary, nurse and laboratory technician, \$7020; travel, \$2800, or \$1400 if the reduction is accepted; maintenance of health unit, \$2797.50; isolation hospital, \$2210; and operation, \$2395.

Through the county health department has been able to offer additional service this year. Five nurses are included on the present staff at present, two paid directly by federal funds and two receiving a portion of their remuneration from the government.

Extended school and home service is offered, and immunization for smallpox and diphtheria is to be made 100 per cent this year. Tubercular tests are to be continued, and immunization against typhoid offered to all who desire.

Plans for a public hall at the most Thanksgiving night were discussed by club members.

but was "the personal and vicious act" of the governor. The conditional parole required that he stay out of Jackson county until last August.

After passage by the last legislature of a bill upholding good-time rewards to prisoners, Fehl claimed the governor released other prisoners but failed to take any action in his case.

Fehl once sought release from prison with good-time credits deducted from his sentence, but the state supreme court refused his plea. The ruling was followed by a riot in the state prison last year which was attributed to resentment of convicts against the court's decision.

sun permitting the president and members of his party to go but without topcoats.

The great throng cheered for a full minute and railroad locomotives and river boats shrieked their whistles as the president stood before a battery of microphones to broadcast his most important message on foreign affairs since he took office.

Mayor Edward J. Kelly presented him as "our friend and good neighbor."

"America Hates War," the president declared the hopes of mankind for a continuing era of international peace, raised to great heights with the signing of the Kellogg-Brundage pact 15 years ago, had "lately given away to a haunting fear of calamity."

Cheers and handclapping greeted his declaration that there "must be a return to a belief in the pledged word, in the value of a signed treaty" and recognition of the fact that "national morality is as vital as private morality."

"America hates war," he said, emphatically. "America hopes for peace. Therefore, America actively engages in the search for peace."

International Anarchy

He charged aggressor nations with violating the covenant of the League of Nations, the Kellogg-Brundage pact and the nine-power treaty guaranteeing the territorial integrity of China, and of "ignoring" humane instincts.

This, he said, was creating a "state of international anarchy and instability from which there is no escape through mere isolation or neutrality."

the speech, and semi-official quarters said Mr. Roosevelt's declaration for a "quarantine" of offender nations is carried out, would be the greatest boon to humanity that any statesman possibly could accomplish.

First reaction in Berlin was one of surprise and even amazement at the president's apparent abandonment of the United States' strict isolation policy. Many observers doubted that there would be such a complete about face in actual policy and believed the president was testing public reaction by means of a trial balloon.

Neither the propaganda ministry nor the foreign office would comment until they had seen the full text of the speech, but the newspaper Tagblatt said:

"Reprimands on moral grounds such as the president issued to the world have been heard from him before, without, however, the result of practical consequences therefrom for United States policy. Specific mention of the Kellogg pact and the nine power pact in the Chicago speech, however, leads to the assumption this time that the reprimands are meant as less theoretical."

In Moscow it was pointed out that President Roosevelt's remarks coincide with the soviet viewpoint on the necessity of peace-loving nations co-operating against aggression.

French diplomatic and political quarters expressed the greatest satisfaction with the Chicago address. It was stated openly that the president's view summarized the principal lines of French foreign policy.

A qualifying official of the Italian government characterized the Roosevelt address as "too demagogic and vague." He expressed doubt that the American president actually was informed of the present European situation.

OLD-AGE RELIEF CASES REVIEWED

The county relief committee spent Tuesday morning going over all old-age assistance cases being handled by the relief bureau.

Under the law, a review of the cases must be made at least once a year. At the Tuesday session, case-workers reported on each case. Assistance was increased in some cases, decreased in others and discontinued in a few. One new application was approved, and one new application for aid to dependent children was approved.

Old age assistance is on a 70-year age basis until the first of the year, when it drops to 65 years.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Oct. 5 (AP)—Leading stocks topped to new low ground for the year or longer in today's market, many losing one to seven points and a few as much as 15 points or so at the worst.

Brokers pointed to a combination of depressing influences as contributing to the fresh relapses.

The list broke early following rumors the president's final important speech on his western tour of Chicago would sound a world warning against violation of international treaties and stress the dangers to the United States of foreign war of aggression.

The reports were confirmed later when the chief executive bitterly arraigned aggressor powers and called upon the peace-loving countries to join in a "combined" effort to restore tranquility.

It was noted he referred to "the present reign of terror and international lawlessness," and declared that, while the United States is determined to stay out of war, it will "not remain aloof, from of force to oppose treaty violations."

Steels led the backslide, with coppers and miscellaneous issues in the van. Such support as appeared brought a slowing of the ticker tape. Quotations were not far from their lows of the session at the close.

Transfers during the session approximated 1,750,000 shares.

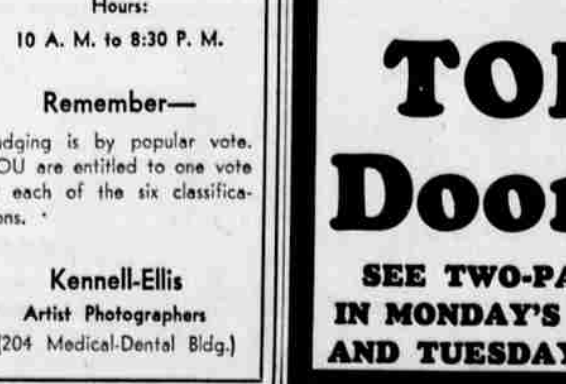
