

Yankees Take Series Opener From Giants 8-

7-RUN SPLURGE ROUTS HUBBELL

Sixth-Inning Blast Puts Game on Ice; Gomez Allows Six Hits

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, Oct. 6 (AP)—Concentrating their heavy fire in one big seven-run inning, the Yankees whipped Carl Hubbell and the Giants, 8 to 1, today in the first game of the 1937 world series, before close to 60,000 fans.

After being handcuffed with one hit through the first five innings, the American league champions broke loose in the sixth with a barrage of five hits that drove Hubbell from the mound and continued against Harry Gumbert and Dick Coffman. Four
