Captain and Kids" Provides Movies With New Comic Reel

MINISTERS DON WORK CLOTHES, ERECT CHURCH

The erection of the Rayburn tabernacle is now well under way. The first timbers were placed in position Wednesday morning and the framework was well up by late evening, under the direction of Robert Rayburn, son of the noted missionary.

The initial crew of workers found the ministers of various churches in overalls and with hammers and saws busily employed among the band of volunteers. Sometimes the ministers in attempting to hit a nail, hit the right one. It is generally understood that the construction is to be almost entirely done by donated labor, as is usually the case in such projects.

Some delay had been experienced by the absence from the city of the general chairman, who was to return Thursday, and the chairman of the finance committee. Nevertheless, it is expected that the building will certainly be completed by Saturday evening and perhaps by Friday evening.

It has already been advertised that the first chorus choir rehearsal will be held in the tabernacle Friday evening. In case the structure is not completed by that time, all singers are asked to go to the First Methodist church for their rehearsal. Robert Rayburn, skilled pianist, singer and song leader, will direct the rehearsal.

Thursday Robert Rayburn appeared before the Kiwanis club, not as a speaker but to make an announcement, informing the club of the project first hand.

Dr. James Rayburn is to arrive in Klamath Falls Friday evening, coming from St. Louis, Mo., where he has just completed a mission lasting a month. He will speak for the first time in the tabernacle Sunday afternoon. The time will be announced later.

It should be generally known that Dr. Rayburn, who has been serving as a pastor for many years and has been highly successful as an evangelist for the last 30 years, has the most unqualified endorsement from pastors and officials of all denominations. He is said to be "a Christian gentleman of the finest culture," with a wide experience in church work, and a man whose purpose is to build up the church rather than to advance his own personal interests. On account of this he has, during his career, had many return engagements in the southwest and midwest, where he has been largely operating.

This is the first time he has held an evangelistic mission in Oregon, although he comes highly recommended from various cities in California.

No one recognizes more than he that evangelism has had some unworthy representatives. It is declared that Dr. Rayburn has no special advertising qualifications such as a jail record, the breaking of bucking bronchos or bull-dogging steers. He has never been a down-and-out and certainly has no record as a bank robber or racketeer, but he is said to be a man of integrity and education. Assurance is made that there will be no halloo or high pressure methods. It should be generally known that he is here as the representative of the local churches, all of whom have united in this city-wide movement. The churches urge the general public to give him a fair hearing.

The bond sale has been going forward in the city and will be continued throughout the week. Adequate preparation was not made previous to the coming of Robert Rayburn, and the absence of the chairman of the finance committee from the city has delayed the canvass somewhat, but the canvass itself is proving highly successful, and it is expected that all the necessary funds for local expenses will be raised by the end of the week, so that it will not be necessary to harass the audience at the tabernacle by repeated and frantic appeals for money.

Additional volunteer workers are needed Thursday, Friday and possibly Saturday to complete the tabernacle. One does not need to be an expert carpenter to help.

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JOBLESS CENSUS QUESTIONS LISTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—Here are the questions which will be asked on registration blanks to be mailed the country's 31,000,000 families in the forthcoming unemployment census:

1. Print full name. (Do you live on a farm?)
2. Are you: (A) Totally unemployed and want work? (B) Partly employed and want more work? (C) Working at WPA, NYA, CCC or other emergency work?
3. Are you able to work?
4. Age at last birthday?
5. Color or race?
6. Sex?
7. How many hours did you work in last week?
8. How many weeks did you work in the last 12 months?
9. What is your occupation, or kind of work? (Examples—tool-maker, waitress, watchman, farm laborer, etc.)
10. Kind of business or industry in which you did, or are doing this kind of work? (Examples—Machine shop, restaurant, railroad, cotton farm, etc.)
11. How many other workers are there in your family living in the same household with you?
12. How many of these workers are: (A) Totally unemployed and want work? (B) Partly employed and want more work? (C) Working at WPA, NYA, CCC or other emergency work?
13. How many persons are mainly dependent on you for support?
14. What was your individual total income, cash and other, last week? (exclusive of WPA and similar payments).

SHE DIDN'T KILL HIM, SO SHE'LL DIVORCE HIM

LONDON, Thursday, Oct. 7 (UP)—Alice de Trafford, the former Countess de Janze, has instituted suit for divorce against Raymond de Trafford, 35-year-old sportsman, whom she tried to kill before their marriage, it was learned today.

The suit was placed on the divorce list for the Michaelmas term of court, and was not contested.

Mrs. de Trafford, formerly Alice Silverthorne of Buffalo, N. Y., eloped with Raymond de Trafford by luring him into a train carriage at the Gare du Nord in Paris on June 15, 1927, and shooting him and herself. She was fined \$3.75 for the shooting.

She was at that time the wife of Count de Janze, who subsequently divorced her. Four years later she married young De Trafford.

JAPAN WON'T IMPOSE HARD PEACE, CLAIM

TOKYO, Oct. 7 (UP)—Japan has absolutely no intention of imposing severe demands on China when the present undeclared war with that country is terminated, Vice-Admiral Mitsumasa Yonai, imperial navy minister, told the United Press today in an exclusive interview.

Yonai explained Japan's justification for the war and outlined the general terms upon which she is prepared to end it.

His statement may be taken as carrying authority since the Japanese navy and the army have been vested with preponderant power in the present crisis.

The minister made these points:

Japan is not seeking to crush the Chinese people but to crush the anti-Japanese movement in China.

She does not intend to interfere with the trading rights of the other vested interests of the powers in China.

Her blockade of the Chinese coast will be lifted as soon as it is militarily safe to do so.

Her justification for the war is what she considered to be a series of Chinese violations of solemn agreements with Japan, murders of Japanese citizens by Chinese nationalists, repeated attacks upon Japanese and other property by mobs of Chinese, the adoption by the Chinese government of an anti-Japanese movement as an instrument of national policy, and her desire to make China into a "good neighbor."

Her general terms for settlement will be a cessation of the things to which she objects by a Chinese government willing and able to carry out a policy of friendship for Japan.

In clipped, forthright sentences, Admiral Yonai emphatically stressed Japan's desire to terminate her blockade of the Chinese coast as soon as possible. He insisted that Japan has no desire to disrupt foreign trade and commerce with China.

While in Shanghai, I heard American, British and other business men accuse Japan of adopting a dog-in-the-manger attitude, meaning that while Japan is not conducting business in China, accidental business will be crippled as much as possible. Yonai bluntly denied the charges that Japan is taking advantage of the mili-

tary situation to crowd accidental traders out of the Chinese market.

"The blockade is due entirely to the exigencies of the military situation," he said, "and it will be lifted as soon as the military necessity which dictates it is ended."

WONDERLAND AREA TRAVEL INCREASES

REDDING, Oct. 7 (WNS)—An increase of travel into the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland is shown in the reports of the border checking stations. Travel during August 1937 showed an increase of 10,302 automobiles and 20,450 passengers as compared with the same month in 1936.

Reports for the corresponding months of the two years show travel during August 1937 included 29,818 California cars, 11,211 foreign cars, and a total of 81,265 passengers, not counting commercial vehicles. Travel during August 1936 included 22,457 California autos, 8352 foreign autos and 60,818 passengers.
