SEVENTEEN GET SENTENCES FOR SELLING LIQUOR

MEDFORD, Oct. 12 (AP)—Thirteen men and four women were sentenced today under sentences ranging upward to the maximum of two years in prison for selling liquor to Klamath reservation Indians.

They had all entered pleas of guilty and were sentenced in United States district court here yesterday by Judge James A. Lee. One of the defendants pleaded for leniency so that he would not lose his seniority rating with the Southern Pacific company from whom employ he said he was on a leave of absence. Judge Lee, however, said he had no sympathy with selling liquor to Indians.

Fourteen of the 17 sentenced were from Klamath Falls. They were Roy E. Sullivan, 54, eight months in a federal road camp; Charles J. Shelton, 63, 18 months in a federal prison; Omar A. Hughes, 34, 19 months in a road camp and \$100 fine; Jack Arkwood, 46, eight months in a road camp and \$100 fine; James Kaye, 37, 18 months in prison; Michael J. Heaney, 65, 10 months in a road camp and \$100; James Howard, 22, 16 months in a road camp and \$100; Hope Meeker, 53, two years in a penitentiary and \$100; Clyde Barnes, 22, year and a day in prison and \$100; Fred Butler, 49, eight months in a road camp and \$100; Lee Purdin, 40, 16 months in a road camp and \$100; Joe Novarro, 40, 18 months in a penitentiary and \$100; Stuart H. Walker, 57, eight months in a road camp; and Harold Russell McDonald, 29, a year in a road camp.

Others sentenced were James Johnson, 59, of Rly. two years in a penitentiary; Yndaleto Lopez, 30, of Beatty, 12½ months in a penitentiary; and Joseph Hubbard, 56, of Shady Pine, eight months in a road camp and \$100.

The prison and camp are to be designated by the attorney general. Usually convicts from this jurisdiction serve at the prison on McNeil island and the road camp at Stilleton, Wash.
