SUGAR BEET PLAN GIVEN APPROVAL

Endorsement to a proposal for a 1000-acre experiment in growing sugar beets in Klamath county was given Monday by the agricultural committee of the chamber of commerce.

The sugar beet experiment plans were outlined to directors of the chamber about a fortnight ago by J. Earl Coke, representative of the Sprackels Sugar company.

Coke said at that time that if the experiment proved that beets of the proper sugar content and other qualities can be grown in this district, the Sprackels company plans to establish a \$2,000,000 factory here.

The agricultural committee of the chamber of commerce at its Monday meeting requested County Agent C. A. Henderson to cooperate with committees from local agricultural organizations and to furnish them all possible assistance and facts in order that they may determine the feasibility of growing sugar beets here.

CHILOQUIN HABEAS CORPUS DISMISSED

MEDFORD, Oct. 12 (AP)—The writ of habeas corpus issued in the case of Kilda Chiloquin, an allegedly insane person, was ordered dismissed by Federal Judge James A. Fee, at a hearing in federal court here this morning.

Chiloquin was ordered remanded to the custody of the Klamath reservation superintendent, pending further legal action.

The writ was sought to prevent the transfer of Chiloquin to a government hospital at Washington, D. C.

The court directed that government agencies take appropriate steps before the proper Oregon tribunal to determine Chiloquin's sanity within a reasonable time, or the court would issue a new writ and hold the failure to take the directed action as contempt of court.

The court ruled that the question of Chiloquin's sanity, or lack of it, was a matter for a state tribunal to determine, before any federal court action could be made.
