AFL ATTACKS LABOR BOARD PARTISANSHIP

Three Directors Claimed Partial to CIO; Boycott on Japan Favored

 DENVER, Oct. 13 (AP)—The American Federation of Labor tonight adopted a bill of rights including a trade union boycott of Japanese goods and a demand that President Roosevelt purge the national labor relations board of alleged Communist sympathizers.

Speeding toward adjournment of its 57th annual convention, the federation unanimously endorsed the militant policy of its leaders, embracing:

"Clean Out" Board
 1. A resolve to embargo immediately all products of Japan and supplement this action with a summons to workers of the world to unite in similar protest against the "unbelievably barbarian" aggression in China.

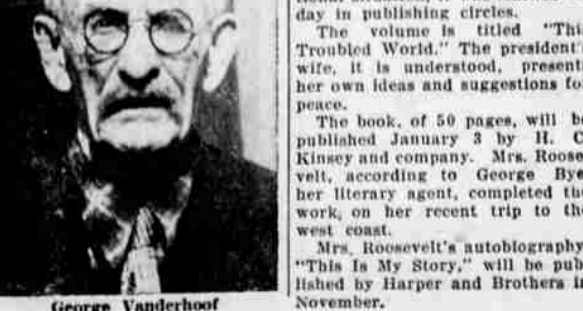
