

Football Championship Candidates Dwindle

ONLY 24 TEAMS STILL PERFECT

California's Bears Given Best Chance of Ending Season Unmarred.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—With the list of major undefeated and untied football teams now down to a mere 24, the Golden Bears of California today shaped up as having the best chance of all to finish the season with a perfect record.

California, with power in the line and speed in the backfield, is enjoying its best football season since Andy Smith's "Wonder team."

All the other perfect record teams—with the possible exception of Santa Clara—have bruising schedules that include meetings with one or more members of the same group. California has only one undefeated, untied team left on its schedule—Georgia Tech—which it plays late in December if the Rose Bowl date doesn't intervene.

On the basis of past performances and games left, the following teams appear to be the major ones in the race for the national championship:

Pittsburgh, Cornell, Nebraska, Northwestern, Louisiana State, California and Texas A. and M. And the chances are that no more than two or three will survive. Pittsburgh, for example, has Nebraska still to play. Texas A. and M. still must face unbeaten Baylor. Louisiana State has unbeaten Vanderbilt on its schedule. Cornell has three unbeaten foes coming up—Syracuse, Yale and Dartmouth—and Northwestern has Wisconsin, Minnesota and Notre Dame.

The list of perfect-record teams will be in for serious slashing this Saturday because six games bring together unbeaten, untied eleven.

Army-Yale; Pittsburgh-Fordham; Navy-Harvard; Holy Cross-Georgia; Detroit-Catholic U. and Syracuse-Cornell. One of the perfect eleven, Boston College, was eliminated Tuesday in a scoreless tie with Temple.

The other perfect eleven, in most cases, have stiff opposition this week.

California has a double-header against the California Aggies and College of Pacific. After that the Golden Bears, favored to win the coast title and the Rose Bowl assignment, have nothing but opponents who have been beaten—except Georgia Tech. They are: USC, UCLA, Washington, Oregon and Stanford.

Nebraska has a tough foe this week in Oklahoma. Northwestern meets Purdue and Alabama may have its record marred by Tennessee. The other southern leaders—Georgia Tech, LSU and Vanderbilt, respectively face Duke, Mississippi and Southern Methodist, all hard opponents.

Baylor plays Centenary; Texas A. and M. has Texas Christian and Wisconsin faces Iowa. Dartmouth meets Brown and should preserve its record while Santa Clara, which has Marquette and St. Mary's as its remaining tough games, has a breeze in University of Portland on Sunday.

Oklahoma Rodeo Rider Killed In New York Show

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—Far from his prairie home, Walter Cravens, 29-year-old Oklahoma rodeo performer, rode the lone trail to "the last roundup."

Cravens, once runner-up for the world's steer riding championship, was killed Saturday night by the slashing hooves of a wild steer in Madison Square Garden.

Last night the range folk took leave of their dead. Spectators were barred at the close of the regular evening performance and 350 fellow performers trooped on foot past the casket on which lay Cravens' body, clad in cowboy regalia.

A cowboy quartet sang "The Last Roundup" and "Nearer My God to Thee" and the Rev. Dr. Nathan A. Seagle, rector of the St. Stephens Episcopal church, conducted services.

The casket, accompanied by Mrs. Eddie Curtis, wife of one of Cravens' best friends, will leave here by train tonight for Butler, Okla., where the dead cowboy's mother and stepfather have a ranch.

BEAVERS HOPE TO STOP NEGRO

UCLA's Kenny Washington Biggest Problem for OSC Eleven.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—"Stop Washington and you will stop the Bruins," was the word passed to the Oregon State college football squad by Line Coach Jim Dixon who scouted the UCLA Stanford game last Saturday.

The Beavers, who stopped Washington University at Seattle last week, knew he meant Kenny Washington, sensational Negro sophomore who sparks for the Bruins on offense.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13 (AP)—The UCLA coaching mapped out a hard practice session today for the Bruin football squad before entraining tonight for Corvallis to meet the Oregon State Beavers.

The Bruins, who will stop over in Sacramento tomorrow morning for an hour's practice, will probably start with the same backfield that performed against Stanford last week—Johnny Baida at quarter, Kenny Washington and Hal Hirschon at half and Walt Schell at fullback.

Head Coach Bill Spaulding planned to take a squad of 30 or more players north.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13 (AP)—Southern California's Trojans preparing for an invasion by the rejuvenated Oregon Webfoet, were billed for strenuous drill today, but little punishment awaited the regulars.

Coach Howard Jones indicated his outfit might prove too finely drawn after last week's upset of Ohio State if scrimmages were too heavy, and he's taking no chances with the coming conflict here.

With Tackle Ray George probably out of the game with injuries, Phil Caspar will draw the starting assignment. It was indicated. Otherwise the Trojan squad is in good shape.

SEATTLE, Oct. 13 (AP)—Disciplined more zipper in practice sessions than at any time previous this season, the hopped up Washington Huskies looked forward to two more drills on the home field today before entraining tomorrow night for Pullman where they play Washington State college Saturday.

Apparently relieved of the strain of being undefeated and unscathed upon defending champions after Oregon State's upset 6-3 victory over them last week, the Huskies relaxed, threw off their cares and banded through scrimmages like a drove of playful pups.

Don Jones, sub fullback, was back at his chores, and Al Cruver, the regular fullback, showed signs of being able to resume his line smashing for the Cougar tussle.

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 13 (AP)—Nipping the stiff kind of gridiron battle, Coach Ted Bank ordered concentration by his University of Idaho football squad today on Utah State plays from the Vandal scout's notebook.

The teams meet Saturday at Boise. Bank also stressed the need of better tackling and blocking, although he credited the team with improvement in those categories in the 9-6 victory over Utah last week.

PAJO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 13 (AP)—A kicking contest with the Carleton club of Melbourne, Australia, featured Stanford's football practice yesterday. The Indians punted, placekicked and dropkicked for accuracy and yardage. Records will be compared with those of the Australian team and the winner will be determined within a fortnight.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13 (AP)—Football teams of St. Mary's and University of Idaho will clash here Friday, October 22, instead of the scheduled date of Saturday, October 23, to avoid conflict with the California-University of Southern California game at Berkeley that day, officials announced.

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 13 (AP)—First serious football casualty at University of California was Bill Plascch, promising sophomore guard from Los Angeles, who suffered a broken leg in yesterday's scrimmage for the double-header Saturday with the California Aggies and College of the Pacific.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13 (AP)—Coach George Malley will bundle 22 University of San Francisco football players aboard a north-bound train tonight for their game at Butte Saturday with University of Montana's Grizzlies.

The Dons will then play Gonzaga at Spokane October 24.

SALEM, Oct. 13 (AP)—Williamette's Bearcat gridmen went through a stiff practice session today in preparation for their encounter with San Jose State college on the California eleven's turf next Friday night.

San Jose is one of the nation's highest-scoring teams with 131 points in four victories.

Coach Spec Keene's star halfback, Billy Heard, out last week with an injured shoulder, will be back in top shape for the San Jose tilt, allowing Weisgerber to return to fullback.

Cubs, White Sox Tangle in Final Game of Series

CHICAGO, Oct. 13 (AP)—This was showdown day at Wrigley field for the White Sox and Cubs in Chicago's longest city baseball rivalry since 1931.

The White Sox, hopes of winning the autumnal event for the fourth straight time were given a setback yesterday at Comiskey park when they couldn't do much with Southpaw Larry French, while the Cubs belted the American leaguers' ace right-hander, Vernon Kennedy, and their crack catcher, Clint Brown, for 15 hits and a 6 to 2 victory to square the series at three triumphs apiece. The Sox had to go the seven-game limit to win in 1931, but swept through the 1933 and 1935 series in four straight.

Manager Charlie Grimm nominated Curt Davis to do the pitching necessary to give the National league delegation its first city championship since they won four out of six games in 1930. Jimmy Dykes' selection was burlly John Henderson Whitehead who conquered the Cubs last Saturday.

"Gabby Hartnett, the Cubs' great catcher, was the batting leader for the series to date with an average of .412, compiled on seven hits in 17 official times at bat. The Sox leader was Rip Radcliff with eight hits in 21 times up for .381. The Cubs boasted a team clubbing mark of .295 to .257 for the American league defenders.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 13 (AP)—The football house of Morrison will be divided against itself when Vanderbilt and Southern Methodist battle in Dallas Saturday.

On the Vanderbilt bench will be Ray Morrison, veteran grid tutor, watching his 21-year-old son, Jack, perform as field general of the Southern Methodist Mustangs, whom he coached for several years before coming here three years ago to succeed the late Dan McGugin.

"We'll be out there to win just as in any other game," said Morrison, adding, "I'll be satisfied with a one point victory."

Asked if he would like to see his son do well against Vanderbilt, Morrison replied, "I wouldn't mind seeing him make a long run, but I don't want him to score a touchdown on my boys."

POTATO FESTIVAL RECEIPTS \$1700

MERRILL.—Assurance of a bigger and better fifth annual Klamath Basin Potato festival was given at Tuesday's luncheon session of the Merrill Service club in view of the outstanding success of the one just past.

Prize money next year in all events will probably be increased, new features added and additional attractions offered. George Thoma, club president, in reporting on the financial findings of the committees in charge stated that total receipts of the festival stand at approximately \$1700.

Expenses of the two-day event will absorb a large part of the income and that remaining will go into a fund to be used for community betterment as has been done in past years.

In connection with the community betterment program the club, working on improvement for the 2 1/2 miles of road at the top of the grade leading to Medicine lake that has long been a nightmare to fisherman and tourist going to the lake, received a letter recently from M. H. Davis, forest supervisor of Shasta National forest, located at Mt. Shasta, assuring the club that work on this stretch will get under way as soon as spring opens.

The letter, read by T. W. Chaburn, committee chairman working on the suggested project, stated that plans call for a complete re-alignment of the present road, a change in the grade and a widened thoroughfare.

A letter from Congressman Walter Pierce, La Grande, was also read in which Pierce stated that he will be in Klamath county within the next few days and plans to make a trip through the Merrill and Malin districts.

Pierce made reference to the proposed re-surveying of the Klamath river with a view to water conservation that is planned to have some planned bearing on the suggested re-flooding of Lower Klamath lake for which the Merrill Service club has been boosting over a period of several years.

Pierce requested that a representative of the club meet with him to discuss such plans as may benefit the south end of the county.
