

Rangelands Need More Rain

CONDITION OF PASTURE BEST IN TEN YEARS

PORTLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—Fall winter ranges are covered by abundance of old grass but are needed to start the new year, the bureau of agricultural statistics said today in its monthly summary of stock conditions.

Range conditions are the most favorable since 1927. Both hay and grain supplies, the report says, are sufficient for the winter. Hay prices will be relatively high because of the high cost of grain. Grain prices probably will be under a year ago.

There has been a brisk demand for feeder cattle and the eastern market is large.

The reports by districts:

Willamette valley—Pastures are up well; hay ample and water abundant; fewer ewes held than a year ago.

Clatsop river area—Ranges of grain and stock water are good; eastern demand for hay but low fed locally.

Willamette area—A heavy rain ranges especially dry, some hay in hay and grain, few ewes to be fed locally.

Northwestern Area—Recent rains resulted in exceptionally good conditions, hay, stock ample, ewe lambs available to replace winter losses, fat numerous, good demand for cattle.

Southeastern area—Good supply of old grass but hay ample; shortage of stock water, men selling close to take advantage of high prices, southern reports sheep and cattle under a year ago.

WHEAT PRICES HIT BY PROFIT-TAKING

CHICAGO, Oct. 14 (AP)—Late selling to realize profits on price upturns virtually wiped out wheat market gains today after a maximum rise of 1 1/2 cents a bushel.

Upturns of wheat values were largely based on estimates that for four successive days the export purchases of United States hard winter wheat had averaged 1,000,000 bushels. Unsettled weather in sections of domestic winter crop territory southwest accounted for some late selling.

At the close, wheat varied from 1 1/2 decline to 1/2 advance, Dec. 97 1/2 to 98, May 98 1/2-98 1/2, corn 1 1/2 down, Dec. 58 1/2-58 1/2, May 59 1/2-59 1/2, and oats 1/2 up.
