BUDGET BOARD NEARS END OF

The Klamath county budget committee struggled on toward completion of its work Friday afternoon, hoping to finish the 1938 financial schedule by the end of the day. Many important decisions were still to be made.

Priday morning the committee talked over the 1938 road budget as proposed by County Engineer Prank Howard.

Howard's budget calls for ex-penditures of \$150,000 as against \$96,000 in the past year. He stat-ed, however, that it is his contention that mark-offs for receipts will make the increased tax levy only 8 of a mill.

The engineer proposed \$120,000 for general roads and \$32,000 for market roads. The estimated refrom gas tax returns are

To this. Howard contends should be added \$14,000 which represents an excess of gas tax receipts for the present year over what had been anticipated when the 1937 budget was drawn. Howard said that this should be car ried over as a receipt item for

This gave the budget committee a legal poser and it sought legal advice before coming to a final decision. Howard said that a lot of important road work will be accomplished if the budget goes

The committee has decided on a \$3000 item for tax foreclosures next year. This will permit foreclosures, at least, on property de-linquent back to 1936, it was esti-
