

19 ABOARD BIG PLANE FEARED DEAD IN CRASH

His wife was quoted as saying: "If there is the faintest spark of life left in my niece, my husband will perform a Caesarian operation to save the baby if possible."

Boe said they were holding to the "slim hope" the young couple were alive.
"I'll go prepared for anything. All I can do now is pray," he said.

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 18 (AP)—An airliner lost more than 14 hours with its 19 occupants was sighted from the air today 12 miles southwest of Evanston, Wyo., and first indications were it was badly wrecked or burned.

Whether any of the 15 passengers or crew of four escaped alive could not be immediately learned.

Arthur Willoughby of San Francisco, postal inspector who flew here today, said he "understood" the plane was "burned or badly cracked up."

Hits Mountain Side
"They have nothing definite on it yet, but it is my understanding the men who found the ship got the impression it either had been badly smashed or had been partially burned," Willoughby said.

R. W. Schroeder, vice president and former chief of federal air line inspection, announced the mighty transcontinental transport was sighted by Bob Bergensen, United Air Lines pilot, and Observer Bill Williams, who then radioed they would land at the Knight, Wyo., field, near the Utah border.

"The plane definitely has been wrecked," Schroeder said later.

"It cracked up on the side of Chalk Mountain, about 25 miles south of Knight, at an altitude of 10,000 feet. The observers could not fly close enough to see whether anyone was alive."

Storm Hinders Rescues
Immediately after Schroeder and a party of air line officials left by automobile for Knight.

NEW BROADCAST LANES CHARTERED

The band from 41,020 to 43,950 kilocycles, officials said, "paved the way" for consideration later of applications for commercial as well as experimental service on those frequencies. In the past, frequencies above 30,000 kilocycles have been reserved for experimental broadcasting.

The new assignments affect largely "safety and life" transmission, such as police and aviation broadcasts, and experimental work.

Today's order marked culmination of the commission's attempt to chart lines in the frequencies above 30,000 kilocycles, where experimental work has been carried on without commission regulation of frequencies.

Field Greatly Enlarged
Effective as of last October 13, the order was issued as the result of hearings last June when engineers told the commission six years of study had led them to believe the time was ripe for harnessing the upper frequencies.

Previously the commission regulated frequencies from 10 to 25,000 kilocycles. Its new order stakes out the frequencies from 10 to 43,950 kilocycles.

In effect, officials said, the order permits experimental stations to use the higher frequencies which they have been employing but limits them to a definite range. Instead of television being broadcast on almost any higher frequency desired by the broadcasting company, it will be limited to the channel from 44,000 to 105,000 kilocycles.

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COUNCIL VOTES WARD CHANGES

Gas company.

The first ordinance calls for the franchise transfer with an agreement between the city and the Klamath Natural Gas company passed at the time the franchise was allowed. By this agreement the company allowed the city to fix rates, waiving its right to payment of a two per cent gross revenue tax from the company.

New Floor Bid
The new amendment nullifies this agreement, and stipulates that the gas company pay the tax, throwing rate settlement back to the public utilities commission instead of the city of Klamath Falls.

After some discussion the matter was referred back to the city attorney for further study, but it was indicated that the council favored the amended ordinance calling for payment of the two per cent gross revenue tax paid by other public utilities companies.

J. E. Hosking, chairman of the fire committee, recommended that the floor in the engine room at central fire station be rebuilt, and his recommendation was adopted by the council.

A bid of \$235 submitted by W. McDaniel of this city was accepted, and work will start soon under the supervision of City Engineer E. A. Thomas.

A second bid for the work was submitted by Julius Oss, local contractor, at a cost of \$283.65, but despite the small difference in cost the council felt that McDaniel offered a better type of reinforcement for the floor, which is to be eight inches thick.

New Car Needed
The fire committee plans to visit the station and make plans for improving doors on the engine room in order that this work may be carried out at the same time the floor is rebuilt.

The police judge was instructed to advertise for bids on a new police prowl car to take the place of the machine wrecked in a three-way accident last week.

Cost of repairing the automobile was estimated at from \$210 to \$240 in bids submitted to the council by local garages, and in the advertisement for new machines the city will offer the damaged car as partial payment.

The council also approved the purchase of a new generator and a heater for one of the police cars.

A request to use the council chambers Thursday evening for a unity meeting of the CIO and AFL was denied. The request was presented by Pearl Wright, delegate from the two organizations.

The police committee was authorized to inspect a shooting gallery installation before a permit for its installation at the Klamath Billiards was granted.

BIGGER DEFICIT SEEN THIS YEAR

day last for which treasury figures are complete, it was \$36,339,513.136.74 at the close of business.

While his new revision definitely abandons the idea of a layman's balance for 1938, it is not expected to have any effect on the president's announced intention to bring expenses within income in the 1939 fiscal year, beginning next July 1. Some financial experts found indications of a possible "clearing of decks" for a balanced budget next year.

Hints of such action were believed in:

A. Savings to be effected by administrative action and in the old age reserve account totaling \$323,000,000.

B. Ultimate cancellation of undischarged RFC and public works administration commitments estimated to exceed \$250,000,000.

Mr. Roosevelt gave these explanations for the changes in the budget which produced the increased deficit:

1. A reserve feature in the new railroad retirement act which necessitated investment of \$113,000,000 to establish a reserve against future annuity payments.

2. Action of congress in voting over his veto—continued low interest rates on federal bank loans and reducing interest rates on land bank commission loans with a resultant loss of \$40,000,000.

3. Social security tax refunds to states totaling \$36,000,000.

4. Extension of the PWA for two years, necessitating an increase of \$25,000,000 in expenditures.

5. Surplus cotton crop loans totaling \$130,000,000.

6. Falling off of expected treasury income by \$256,000,000 from the April estimates.

All these items, Mr. Roosevelt pointed out, combine to increase the deficit to \$1,018,000,000. But the economies which he has effected or intends to effect, totaling \$323,000,000, will result in a new deficit of \$695,000,000.
