## INDIAN FINED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

Alexander Forester, Indian, was fined \$25 by Police Judge Langelet Wednesday on charges of having liquor in his possession. Iva Scott, Indian woman, was fined \$20 or sentenced to 10 days in jail on a disorderly conduct charge, and Fred Grant was fined the same amount on a drunk and disorderly count. He also drew a fine of \$100 and 50 days in jail on a vagrancy charge. The latter sentence is to be suspended after the first sentence is served. A jail sentence of 50 days and fine of \$100 assessed against James O'Neil were suspended by the police judge with the understanding that the defendant leave town within 45 minutes. Pauline Johnson and Carl Johnson were fined \$10 each on drunk charges, and are being held in city jail pending investigation on other counts. Hulda Bechold was charged with vagrancy and held for investigation.

## DISTRICT RESOURCE COMMITTEE MEETS

A meeting of the national resources committee for the seventh district, comprising the Klamath basin and the northwestern corner of California, has been called for Klamath Falls October 25 at 9 a. m. B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath reclamation project, has been appointed a member of the committee from this district. B. G. Courtwright, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, has been appointed a representative for Oregon and California of the national committee by Secretary of the Interior Ickes. Courtwright said he expects to call a number of meetings in the two states at which problems concerning drainage, irrigation and other water projects will be considered and reported upon to the president of the United States in accordance with a recent executive order.

## TURKEY TRADING SCHOOL TO BE HELD AT ALBANY

Arrangements have been completed for holding a government turkey trading school at Albany, Ore., October 29 and 30, starting at 10 a. m., at the Swift and company plant. Purpose of this school is to train and issue licenses to government turkey graders and also to familiarize producers with the system used in grading turkeys. Thomas W. Hertz of the USDA will be present to conduct the school. The state department of agriculture, Salem, will have direct charge of the school, in cooperation with the USDA. The meeting is open to all turkey growers throughout the entire state.
