

POTATO LABOR SITUATION NOW NEAR BALANCE

Supply and demand are virtually balanced in the Klamath potato labor situation, according to John E. Cooter, head of the farm labor division of the state employment service.

Cooter, after spending several days here in connection with the potato labor problem, left Friday after sending out "stop" orders to other offices telling them that there is no need for additional men in this region.

The state supervisor said that digging in some smaller fields is being completed, and pickers from those jobs can go elsewhere to fill demand that is expected to arise in larger fields.

He said that the California employment service has cooperated effectively with Oregon in meeting the problem here. About 300 men were moved in through the efforts of the employment service.

Cooter said he plans to return to Klamath later on and to meet with the potato growers for a discussion of various problems, such as that having to do with housing.

Harvest workers now engaged in picking potatoes here will find jobs in the cotton fields of California if they go south after the local harvest is completed, Cooter stated. There is huge demand for help in the cotton area of California.
