utes as California turned loose a whirlwind attack that went 57 and then 70 yards for touchdowns in the first period to remove all doubt as to which was the better team.

Bottari Stars
Out in front of those California marches was a bobbing, smashing, slashing 175-pound halfback, Vic Bottari of Vallejo.

Gaining at either side of the line with equal ease, the black-haired kid who makes California's steam-roller attack roll turned in 40 yards himself of the 37 in the first drive and 34 in the second besides throwing a 27-yard pass to Sam Chapman, his right halfback, to lead the way to the second score.

Bottari made the first two touchdowns, going over standing over the left side of the Trojan line from three and four yards out for the scores.

In those drives and in the third touchdown march in the second period, he had a lot of help from 187-pound Dave Anderson, California's pile-driver fullback.

It was only poetic justice that put Anderson's name in the summary as the chap who scored the third touchdown for Big Dave, busting the Trojans apart in the center of the line, earned the honor.

Held to one measly first down in the first half, when the California forward wall and the back-ups—Barrel—Chested Johnny Meek and towering Bob Herwig, blew apart Ambling Amy Schuler's all-American aspirations, U. S. C. made its touchdown against the California second team.

As in California's five previous victories this season, the Golden Bears gave the impression that they could have scored more than they did if they wanted to put on the pressure once they were in front.

Blocking that sometimes had seven interferences in front of the ball carrier, and defense that rarely let an enemy runner reach the secondary, blew U. S. C. hopes in the final half, they didn't seem to care.

It was with little surprise that a glance at the statistics showed that the California attack, on ground and air, had rolled up 113 yards and 24 first downs. Dave Anderson made 144 of those yards himself, over the Trojan guards and center, and Bottari turned in 164 through the tackles and around the ends.

University of Southern California's attack was feeble in comparison. The Trojans made only 66 yards by rushing and 53 by passes for a total of 119. They completed five of their eight aerial endeavors, most of them in the touchdown march, and they had four first downs.

Stanford 13, Washington 7
WASHINGTON STADIUM, Seattle, Oct. 23. (UP)—Stanford University's red-shirted Indians beat down a bristling University of Washington team, 13 to 7, today to definitely eliminate the defending champions of the Pacific Coast football conference from the 1937 race.

Stanford scored just before the end of the half, when two Stanford players burst through the Husky line to block a kick behind the Washington goal. The ball twisted high in the air, and over end, and finally came down in the arms of Right End Grant Stone who fell to the turf for a touchdown.

An awry punt in the third period by Husky End Henry Wise that went out of bounds on one Washington 16 gave the Indians their next opportunity to score.

After four plays, Groves pierced right tackle for a touchdown.

Washington, which made nine first downs in the first half to Stanford's none, immediately began an attack from its own 21 that was not stopped until it resulted in a touchdown.

On a fourth down, Dick Johnson came around from his left end post to carry the ball to the Stanford five-yard line. Waskopits and Miller pushed to the one-yard line in two plays. Then Fullback Al Cruser slid off center for a touchdown.

However, the Huskies threatened most of the remainder of the game. Speaking for themselves were statistics which showed Washington ground out 224 yards by rushing to Stanford's eight. The Huskies made 13 first downs to Stanford's three.

St. Mary's Edges Out Idaho Vandals in Bruising Struggle

KEZAR STADIUM, San Francisco, Oct. 23 (UP)—Coach Edward "Slim" Madigan's St. Mary's college Gaels Friday defeated the University of Idaho Vandals, 6-0, in a hard-fought football duel here before a weekday crowd of 15,000 fans.

Jack Crampton, big Gael end, scored the only touchdown of the day in the second period on a reverse from Rimassa. Lou Perry, St. Mary's quarterback, failed to make the placement.

The game was featured by the remarkable offensive and defensive playing of big 210-pound Dick Truskowski, 23-year-old Idaho fullback.

Crampton was the St. Mary's hero. He set up the touchdown with a 35-yard run to the Idaho 14 on the end-around play just as the second period opened. An offside penalty and plunges by Rimassa moved the ball ahead, and Crampton took it over from the 13-yard mark.

The teams battled equally during a dull first half, but Coach Orin "Babe" Hollingsberry evidently inspired his Washington State athletes during the intermission.

At any rate the Cougars came back and dominated the last half. Slenko, with Carl Littlefield, fullback, and Paul Calloway, star quarterback, furnished most of the Washington State backfield punch, three times sent his team on dangerous marches in the closing two periods. He recovered a Ucla fumble in Bruin territory and twice intercepted Ucla passes, once racing to the home team's 37-yard line.

The game was a tough defensive battle, with Washington State holding an offensive edge due to Ucla fumbles at crucial moments. Ucla, with the exception of Kenneth Washington's 45-yard run to the Cougar 30, never came close to a score.

Washington State ran up 141 yards to 95 for Ucla on the ground, but only three against 26 in the air. First downs were even at eight apiece, although the Bruins collected three of theirs on penalties, while the Cougars netted only one in that manner.

The Bruins fumbled five times and recovered a like number, while WSC fumbled and recovered four times.

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BEARCATS WIN OVER WHITTIER

Beard Redeems Early Errors by Setting Up Two Touchdowns.

SALEM, Oct. 23 (AP)—The post gradmen of Whittier college, Calif., rated Billy Beard, Williamette halfback, as "Indian giver" today, after he handed them a 6-point lead in the first half and then led a Bearcat rally to defeat the visitors, 13 to 6.

Beard made his gift by fumbling twice, punting out of bounds for 13 yards and interfering with a pass to pave the way for Dick Kunishima, Post quarterback, to pass 18 yards to Jack Shuler in the end zone.

In a sudden reversal of form, Beard led his teammates in a 54-yard drive to a touchdown before the quarter ended. Dick Weisgerber, fullback, carried the ball over for Williamette.

Early in the final period, Beard intercepted Kunishima's pass on the Bearcat 45 and ran to within eight yards of the Whittier goal, finishing the distance on two line backs. Weisgerber kicked the point.

The Bearcats gained 193 yards to Whittier's 75 from scrimmage, and completed eight out of 15 passes for 74 yards. Whittier completed eight passes in 21 tries for 56 yards.

Sensational 'Left Formation' Wins Games for Giant Team

NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (AP)—The football team which eastern coaches and close students of the game suspect has introduced the season's most important and revolutionary style of offense isn't playing today. It plays tomorrow, for money.

The New York Giants, who play for the honor and glory and financial well-being of Tim Mara, are the possessors of this radical new method of gaining ground. It is the brain-child of Coach Steve Owen, who calls it simply "left formation," and it has created considerable excitement in local hoghide circles.

Using it exclusively, the Giants have won their last three league contests in sensational fashion, gaining an average of 265 yards a game against opposition that doesn't yield any yards at all without an argument. Their rivals have been more or less flabbergasted.

There was such a puzzle about it that Owen was asked to diagram his pet at the last weekly chintest of metropolitan coaches and critics. Such talented professors as Jim Crowley, Lou Little, Chick Mehan and Mal Stevens hunched forward in rapt attention.

"It's brand new," said Steve. "And it's so effective and such a natural that I can't understand why it hasn't been used before."

His diagram revealed an unbalanced line to the right, with only an end and tackle to the left of center. His backfield, though, was thrown to the left, with one wingback clear out past the end. The attack, obviously, was aimed at the left, or "weak" side, or through the center.

Someone pointed out what looked like a fatal weakness in the peculiar formation. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to throw an effective play at the strong side.

"That's what some people think," said Owen, patiently, "but it hasn't worked out that way. We've been going every direction with it—ask our opponents—and it has been effective on passes, too."

"What has helped a lot, I suppose, is that we shift into this formation quickly and get going fast. Our opponents, watching our line instead of the backfield, have been prone to shift too hastily and too far toward our strong side. When they do that, our interference catches them cold on the other wing."

Another thing they do is start what looks like a long run to the left, or "weak" side and then wheel and pass far across the field to the right side.

At any rate, Owen, coaching in the country's toughest football league, where every loss is felt painfully at the box office, has proved he isn't afraid to take chances. He gambled what might have been his job on his "left formation," and he's won.
