TRAFFIC FIGURES AT CRATER GIVEN

CRATER LAKE—According to park service officials, 4896 persons visited Crater Lake national park during the month of February, 869 cars carrying 3175 persons entering the Klamath Falls entrance, and 488 cars carrying 1721 persons coming via the Medford entrance.

Of the 4896 visitors, 2320 came to enjoy skiing, 1802 came to see Crater lake, and 774 used the cross park highway for cross park travel.

Records show that during February of 1940, 4692 persons entered the park, which was 204 less than the number for the same month of this year.

A new winter travel record for a single day was set on February 2, this year, when 1160 persons entered the park. The former high mark was set on January 28, 1940, when 1148 persons were checked in.

Visitors from 17 states, including Alaska, registered at the Annie Springs checking station. Of these, 4482 were from Oregon and 414 were out of state visitors.

The travel to date for the travel year, which starts October 1, shows a decrease of 9 per cent, as compared to the same period of last year.
