

OPEN HOUSE SLATED FOR NEW GARAGE

Newest contribution to the Klamath automobile world—the recently completed building at Seventh street and Klamath avenue to be occupied by the Marshall Cornett company—will open formally at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Open house will continue until Sunday night, according to Dick Miller, manager.

The building was designed in the fall by Howard Perrin, architect, and finishing touches were completed Friday by painters and workmen. The one-story structure was built by Dr. Paul W. Sharp for the Marshall Cornett company and cost, including property and building, is in excess of \$50,000. The Brosterhouse Construction company held the contract.

Facing Klamath avenue, the building occupies 166 feet and runs 100 feet along Seventh street. It is constructed of concrete and tile with the imposing front painted cream with large wooden letters carrying the name of the firm. Two neon signs with the name "Oldsmobile" are placed at the corner of Seventh and Klamath. Unique in design, the new building has a 50-foot snow room space opening on Klamath avenue with 12-foot high windows laid vertically to allow for better vision. The snow room is paneled with birch wainscoting with beige walls and a red tile floor. Three general offices including Miller's private office, open off the salesroom. A large sliding door permits the entrance of cars into the salesroom from the exterior parking space which is covered by the roof of the building proper.

As modern as today's newspaper is the parts room which is 20 feet wide, and 60 feet long. In charge of parts is Floyd H. Hamstreet, who has been with the corporation since its organization four years ago. Assistant is B. F. Burgess.

The daylight shop, in which the work of servicing and repair is done, includes a score of new features. The space is 60 feet wide by 140 feet long with no posts used. A trussed roof overhead assures a clear space for work. Here every facility for all kinds of automobile service has been included, and in charge is L. Hankins. In a separate section is the body shop which is not only modern and up-to-the-minute, but is also in a fireproof room by itself. The space allotted to the body shop is 50 by 23 feet.

On the Seventh and Klamath corner is the service station with four pumps installed along with other equipment. Richfield products will be distributed. Extra parking space, 25 by 60 feet, is included here for customers.

Free customer parking space has been leased across the alley

Office manager is Lynn Sowell, and in addition to 26 men, three girls are employed by the company.
