

TROPHY WON BY CHILOQUIN DEBATE TEAM

CHILOQUIN—After an absence of four years the debate championship for the south-central district of Oregon returned to Chiloquin, and with it a fine trophy. Henley high school held the title during the past two years. This year, however, the local high school stormed through the district tournament held here Wednesday with loss of but one debate.

In the final standing Chiloquin placed first with three wins and one loss; Keno ranked second with two wins and two losses; while the champs of 1939 and 1940 trailed with but one win in four debates. Observers confidently predicted that Bonanza would repeat this year for the third successive time, thereby gaining permanent possession of the debate trophy. Keno and Chiloquin were given little chance.

The new district champions are: affirmatives, Ada Ciacomelli, Rosemary Richards and Floyd St. Clair; negatives, Lewis Pohll and Lois Loosley. The team is coached by Don Brookman.

The award for the outstanding debater of the tournament was presented by Critic Judge Marvin Krenck of the University of Oregon to Lee Chase, son of the Keno high school principal. As Chase is a sophomore, great things will be expected of him in his remaining year of high school.

The win entitles the locals to compete in the state debate tournament which will be held in Eugene on March 28 and 29. The tournament will be composed of the eight district winners. The local team will be present at the tournament if funds can be raised for the trip.

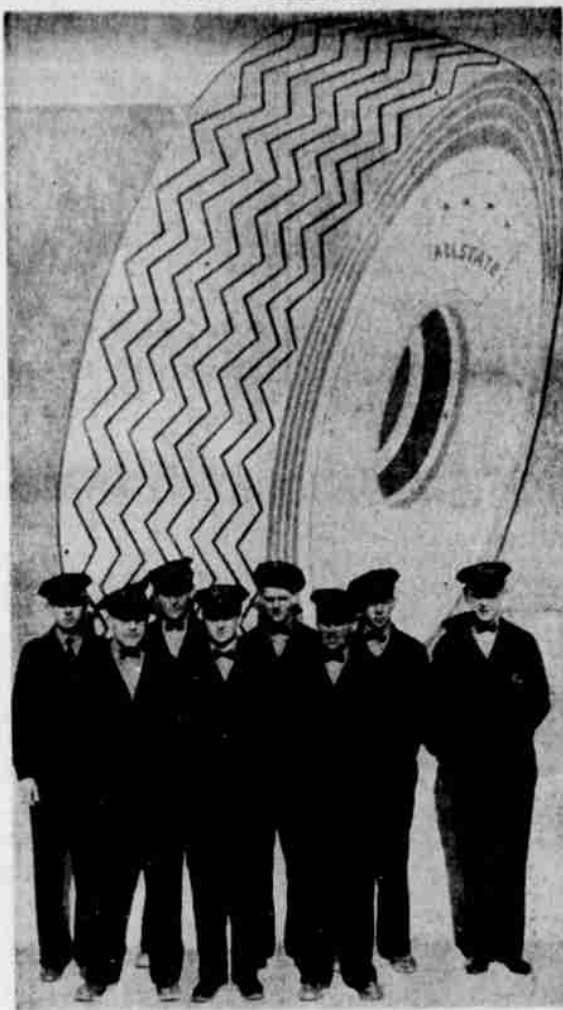

Many Kinds of Birds Found at Hart Mountain

LAKEVIEW—Stanley Jewett, regional biologist for the fish and wild life service, has identified 119 different birds within the Hart Mountain refuge. It is believed that the great diversity of climatic conditions on Hart mountain, combining meadow, forest, desert and water areas, attracts the wide variety of birds.

The lake district along the west border is an ideal nesting place for the waterfowl, while the numerous groves of pine and aspen and the well wooded creek bottoms provide ideal nesting conditions as well as food and shelter for many species of song and insectivorous birds during migration. Some of the unusual birds are the Arkansas king bird, short tailed chickadee, golden eagle, Townsend's solitaire, Rocky mountain orange-crowned warbler, northern pileolated warbler and the western tanager.

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Children Need Greater Supply of Vital Vitamin

Children of subnormal growth and adults with constipation, flatulence, headaches, lack of stamina, and chronic fatigue constitute a defense hazard. Nutritional scientists explain that insufficient vitamin B1 is largely the cause of these conditions.

Salad greens, green vegetables, fresh fruit, milk and meat in liberal amounts are good sources of this important vitamin. But these sources are relatively expensive for families on low food budgets. One of our national problems is to find a cheap and plentiful source of vitamin B1 (Thiamin).

Wheat Germ Cheap

Dr. Henry Borsook, professor of biochemistry, California Institute of Technology, offers a solution. "The problem of finding a cheap rich source of thiamin and the rest of the vitamin B complex can be solved," he says, "by the use of the wheat grain which millers call the 'scalp of the siftings' or 'middlings plus germ.' This cereal is probably the cheapest natural food source of the vitamin B complex. It can be cooked as porridge or baked in bread muffins, scones, etc. For something under two cents per day per person, it provides an optimum amount of vitamin B1 in palatable form."

Dr. Borsook gives this advice to women's committees on defense through nutrition. He says that by prodding your local grocer and by being persistent about it, you can make him get these "scalp of the siftings" from a local miller.

English Meet Problem

To point out the importance of vitamin B1 from a national viewpoint, Dr. Borsook states in his new book: "In July 1940, the English government decided to fortify white flour with crystalline thiamin in such quantities that the daily per capita intake of that vitamin will be increased by approximately 100 International units. This is a very significant decision for a number of reasons. For the first time in the history of the world,

the government of a great country has recognized by law the necessity of supplying a vitamin as well as simply gross food for a whole population.

"Equally important is the recognition by a government that dietary improvement by the educational process is slow and haphazard. Thirdly, a government has embraced the principle of fortification of a staple foodstuff for a whole nation.
