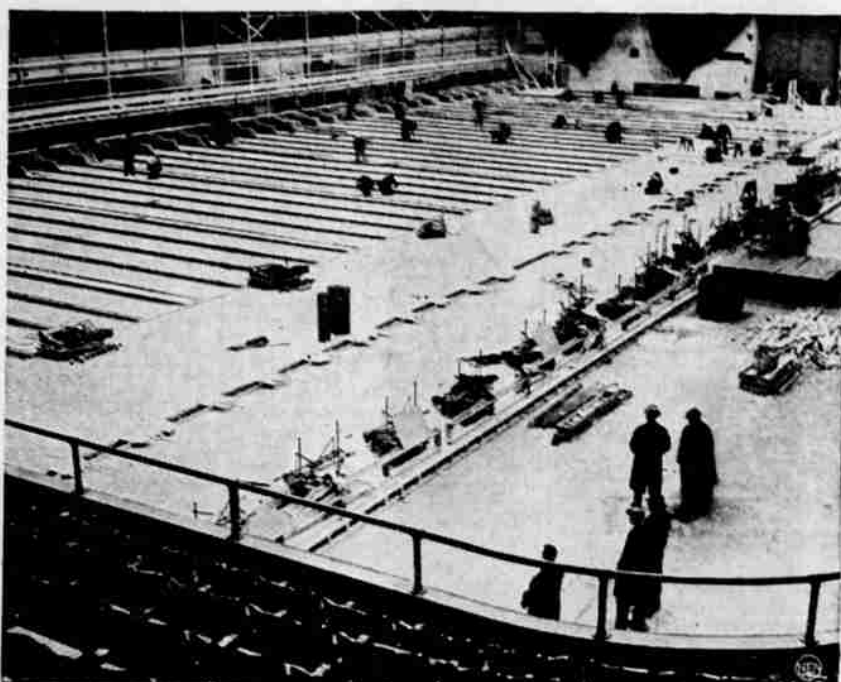
On the social side, Ski Patrolers are planning another of their regular dances for next Saturday night. Tickets may be purchased from any ski equipment dealer in the city.

Townsend On All-Star

Two Webfeet, Two Cougars Named on Players' Quintet

SEATTLE, March 12 (P)—Vic Townsend, Oregon's high-scoring forward, was a unanimous choice for a forward position in the selection by players of a 1941 all-star team of the five northern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball teams.

All players who made the traveling squads of the colleges during the past season participated in the annual all-players' all-conference selection. Each of the 56 players selected what he considered the conference's five best and second best. Scoring gave two points to each player for mention on a first team ballot, and one point for a second team selection.

Townsend succeeded his team mate of last year, John Dick, as the most popular player with other players in the division.

Players differed with their coaches, who announced their all-conference selections last night, by electing George Andrews, of Oregon, to a first team berth. The only other change was made in picking Paul Valenti, of Oregon State, as guard on the second team.

San Diego, runnerup in last year's tournament, started slowly, and, at the half, was behind 14 to 16. Then, Milton Phelps, State's injured guard, went in, and quickly made two field goals to even the score.

Montana was held scoreless for 10 minutes, while San Diego ran up a commanding lead.

Kenny Hale, guard, was San Diego's high scorer, with 15 points; David Aitken was Montana's high scorer with 10 points.

The seeded Pittsburgh, Kas. Teachers were knocked out of the tournament, 33-33, by the Bemidji, Minn., Teachers.

Sportsmen Mull Reserve

Rifleman's Address, Refuge Discussion Highlight Meet

A lecture and moving pictures by Lieut. E. F. Sloan of the National Rifle association and discussion of the Upper Klamath Lake bird reserve highlighted the regular monthly meeting of the Klamath Sportsman's association Monday night in the Willard hotel.

Lieut. Sloan's address dealt with the possible formation of a Rifle club among Klamath Falls students similar to those now in operation at most other schools in Oregon.

Discussion of the bird reserve, concerning which a memorial was recently passed in the state legislature recommending the reserve be abolished, occupied most of the assembled sportsmen's time.

Chief object of the discussion is to maintain the area for public hunting use in the event President Roosevelt recognizes and ratifies the memorial. The land, which covers approximately 5000 acres on the west shore of the upper lake north of Rocky Point, was made a bird reserve during the administration of President Coolidge.

Upshot of the discussion was a decision to appoint a committee to investigate possible methods of keeping the land open for hunting use.

A motion to fix a prize of \$25 in fishing equipment for the winner of the coming association membership drive was passed and a committee named to complete plans for the campaign.

In knocking Roseburg out of the running Klamath Falls set itself up as the team to beat. Roseburg, a tall and clever team, had gained entry into the state finals by dousing Ashland and Medford, both strong outfits. Bocchi, Klamath Falls guard, was high point man for the game with 11 markers.

The Klamaths slipped into a 5-3 lead the quarter pole in their match against the Indians, touted as the "tallest team in the nation." By halftime the locals had widened the margin to 13-8.

Recess over, Coach Jim Watts' lads came whooping back and, by holding 8 markers while the District 3 champs could garner only two, nearly knotted the count. The period ended 18-16 for Klamath.

Coach French's lads picked up again, however, and in turn held the Indians to two points as they splattered the net for 13 and the 31-18 win.

Germans Blast Midlands Area

LONDON, March 12 (P)—German night raiders, back again in force, bombed the industrial midlands and gave a city in northwestern England its heaviest sustained attack in several months.

The bombings, which continued until early this morning, drove at least 150 persons from their homes in the city and buried others—killed and injured—in wreckage.

Six persons were killed on a residential street in another place in the west midlands.

A communique today declared, however, that throughout the entire country casualties were few and damage was not great. Destruction of two German planes was announced.

COAST NINE PROSPECTS Hollywood Stars

HOLLYWOOD, March 12 (UP)—A revamped Hollywood baseball club enters the Pacific Coast league pennant race this year and Manager Bill Sweeney swears for talent will boost the team into the first division—maybe near the top.

Last year's team, lacking in power and speed and swamped with injuries and bad luck, finished sixth after optimistic predictions had given the fans pennant fever even before the season started.

Rosenberg New
The outfield has come in for a major share of the remodeling. John Dickshot, who hit .290 for Jersey City of the International league last year, will be one of the newcomers. Another will be heavy hitting Harry Rosenberg who played for Portland last year. His batting average was .314.

These two will flank Bernard Uhalt in the outfield and should give the Stars its best outfield in years—both defensively and at the plate.

The quality of the infield will depend largely on Sweeney himself.

Last year he was forced out with an injury but if he can hold down the first base job and produce his usual .300 or better batting average the infield will be hard to beat.

Schulte Expensive
The third base position is still unsettled and will remain so until Manager Connie Mack of the Philadelphia Athletics makes up his mind on Bob Kahle whom he has in his training camp. If Kahle

can make the grade with the American league, it will be necessary for Sweeney to look around for a new third sacker.

One of the biggest cash outlays went for the contract of Herman "Ham" Schulte who played for the Philadelphia Phillies last year. He led the National league in fielding and batted .235. His presence at second base will bolster the infield and should lift the Stars' double play average.

Joiner Promising

At shortstop Sweeney has Joe Hoover and possibly Bill Cissell. Hoover had his poorest season in three years with the Stars last year, batting .250. The veteran Cissell played second base last year and batted .289 and Sweeney is counting on him to plug any gaps that appear as the season progresses.

The most promising addition to the pitching staff is Roy Joiner, lefthander, whom the Stars purchased from the New York Giants. Joiner worked in 33 games as a relief hurler and ended the season with two wins and three losses. The year before he

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San Jose State Wins East Game

California Team Beats Culver-Stockton 46-41 In Intercollegiate Go

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 12 (UP)—San Jose State, the "clutch" team of the national intercollegiate basketball tournament, tonight won a thrilling overtime game from Culver-Stockton of Canton, Mo., 46 to 41, to enter the tournament's quarter-final round.

It was a typical finish for the California team. In the overtime period, after Culver gained a 39 to 38 lead on a free throw by Art Henderson, Kenny Hale, San Jose guard, took the ball from out-of-bounds and flipped in a goal. Then Captain Harry Hodgets shot another and Andy Echle scored a third.

P. Wilson of Culver retaliated with one toss and the score was 44 to 41. San Jose, Hale put on the clincher with a last-minute spurt down the floor to make the final score 46 to 41.

It was the tight, zone defense of the Missouri squad which gave San Diego trouble. The Californians shot hurriedly in their effort to outmaneuver Culver, and they missed many shots.

San Diego tomorrow meets Texas Wesleyan of Fort Worth in the quarter finals. Another California entry, Santa Barbara State, also entered the quarter finals and tomorrow plays Appalachian college of Boone, N. C.
