

Tunney Says Next Champ U. S. Army

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 12 (AP)—Gene Tunney thinks the U. S. Army's preparedness program will produce the guy who can beat Joe Louis.

"I haven't seen the next champion yet," he declared today, "but it is certain that he is now training."

The man who came out of the army corps to win the world heavyweight title himself speaks with authority because he has taken an active part in one of the programs.

Tunney, a lieutenant commander in a reserve, has the job of coordinating the physical training of army fliers with their flight instruction.

Tunney has a world of respect for the physical ability of men in the army, navy and marine corps.

"The rigid physical requirements of the service today will bring out the best of the men," he asserted.

The new champion will be greater than Louis.
