ASTORIA, March 11 (UP)—A large herd of Pacific seal is expected to pass off the Oregon shore within the next few days on an annual journey to rookeries in Alaskan waters and the coast guard cutter Onondaga left the Columbia river mouth today to search for it.

Sailors reported seeing scattered groups of seals last week, about 50 miles off shore. The coast guard escorts the herd to Alaska each year under terms of a treaty signed originally several decades ago by the United States, Japan, Russia and Canada.

The treaty was drawn up to protect the herd from extinction, threatened because of irregular hunting. But the treaty lapsed this year and Japan refused to sign it again. The Japanese have declared they are free to hunt seal if they desire.

Only Indians sailing small boats or primitive canoes and using only bow and arrow and spear may hunt the seal, under international regulations.

The government kills 40,000 to 50,000 of the animals each year and sells the furs to the highest bidders after they are tanned. Only three-year-old males are taken.

Raiders Bomb Suez Canal

CAIRO, Egypt, March 12 (AP)—Air raiders again bombed the Suez canal area Tuesday, but caused no damage, the Egyptian government reported.

"An air raid warning was sounded early this morning in the Suez canal area, in the course of which a few bombs were dropped," the Egyptian ministry of the interior announced. "No damage or casualties resulted."

(Germans say that traffic through the Suez canal has been paralyzed by ships sunk in the channel by previous air attacks).

Reward Extended For Walberts

MEDFORD, March 12 (AP)—The Medford Flying club today extended its \$250 reward for the recovery of the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Walbert, Medford couple, missing since last November while on a plane trip to Portland, for another month from March 13, its date of expiration. It is the third extension.

A recently-purchased plane by the Flying club, of which the Walberts were members, will be used during the spring and summer, in aerial hunts for the couple.

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Death struck for the fourth time this year at the membership of the 77th congress, when Representative Pius L. Schwert, Buffalo, N. Y., democrat, suffered a fatal heart attack last night at a hotel dinner party. He was 48 years old.

Schwert collapsed at a dinner table shortly after making a speech at the party attended by his wife and a group of congressmen. He was taken to a hospital but was pronounced dead upon arrival.

A former catcher for the New York Yankees, Schwert was serving his second term in Congress.

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—Joseph Clark Baldwin, new congressional representative from Manhattan's 17th "silk-stocking" district, stepped into the late Kenneth F. Simpson's post today, hailing his victory as proof of American unity on aid to the embattled democracies.

A republican, as was his predecessor, the former city councilman polled 23,252 votes in yesterday's special election. His democratic rival, lawyer-author Dean A. Alfange, whose candidacy had been championed by President Roosevelt, garnered 16,690.

Eugene P. Connolly, American labor candidate and only one of the three to campaign in opposition to the British-aid and defense programs, trailed with 3985.

Baldwin attributed his triumph largely to the endorsement of Wendell L. Willkie, 1940 republican presidential nominee, who said of the election:

"The result is a great forward step toward unity in our country's foreign policy and likewise for competence in the administration of our defense program and sanity in our domestic politics."
