TULELAKE — Names of several more Tulelake men appear on the lists of conscripts to be called during the month of March by local board No. 3, Dunsuir, and board No. 4 of Alturas, Dunsuir having been instructed to furnish 69 men for call on or about March 16 and Alturas 24 men.

When induction of the fourth call is completed California will have called 26,000 of the first year's quota of 37,000 conscripts to military service.

TULELAKE SEWAGE DISPOSAL VOTED

TULELAKE—Ordinances covering applications for easements of ground to be used for the sewage disposal system, of the contract for pumping water for the system, and providing power for the site were passed Monday night by city fathers, clearing the way of technicalities for early completion of the new city improvement which got underway a few days ago. C. A. Dunn, Klamath Falls contractor, started a skeleton crew last week, increasing the force to full man power this week. The contract, weather permitting, is to be completed in 90 days.

The council authorized also removal of big trees in the alley behind the Havalina camp, and okayed final payment of \$442.82 as engineering fees on the water system to Edward K. Hussey, Oakland, present for the council session and \$375.02 to Charles Ledderer, Alturas, city attorney for legal advice on the water system.

The worn-out pump on the city fire truck will also be replaced at a cost to the city of \$130 plus the old pump.
