COPCO BUILDING MILL EXTENSION

A \$9000 Copco extension project into the Ellingson Lumber company mill on the Green-springs highway is now under way, power company officials disclosed Saturday, and will probably be completed by April 1.

The job includes nearly a mile of 66,000-volt line and a step-down transformer which will service a 150-horsepower electric motor for the mill's head rig, provide lighting for a night operation and power to approximately 40 residences surrounding the plant. The Hotchkiss general store will also be served by the new extension.
