DOCTOR SLAIN AFTER TUSSLE WITH GUNMAN

Mrs. Mary Warren, the proprietress, and Georgia Harris, waitress, were farther back to the rear of the building.

The bandits herded the patrons, with the exception of Bragg, into the back room. Bragg pretended to be dazed and sat watching them without molestation.

Took Money
One gunman leaped a counter and opened one of the two cash registers in the place. He scooped out the money in cash and bills and put it in his pocket.

The other gunman went to the other cash register. He attempted to operate the \$3 key, but it failed to open the money drawer. He gave it up and started out of the door with his companion.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Warren had run out of the back door of the building and fired a pistol several times to sound an alarm. Georgia Harris ran out a side door to go for help.

As the bandits left the front entrance, Dr. David followed them, with Miles Saunders close behind.

One bandit, carrying the pistol, turned to the right, while the shotgun bandit went to the

Short Scuffle

The man with the pistol encountered Mrs. Warren. There was a short scuffle, giving David time to catch up.

A blow from the chiropractor sent the bandit reeling, and he fled down the alley between the Buffalo lunch and the Elmer-Johnson jewelry store.

David was close behind and caught up with the man at the rear of the building. They went down on the ground and in the ensuing scuffle, Saunders, who was aiding David, got hold of the bandit's gun. He attempted to use it, pulling on the trigger, but the safety was on and the gun did not discharge.

Warning Shouted
At that moment, the shotgun bandit came up from the other side of the building, standing outside a ragged picket fence and shouting a warning.

David rose from his position on top of the pistol bandit, and there was a roar as the shotgun discharged.

The blast struck David full in the chest, shattering his lungs. Saunders, standing close by, received birdshot in a knuckle and in his shoulder.

The bandit on the ground got to his feet and ran through a gate in the fence as the gathering crowd gave attention to the dying chiropractor.

David was carried inside the cafe and died in a few minutes.

Coat, Mask Found
The fleeing gunman were believed to have gone down the alley towards Washburn way, but they probably first started to the front of the cafe on South Sixth street to get into a car that had been left standing with the engine running.

Officers found a bloody coat, bandanna handkerchief and a pair of old gloves behind a sign board on that side of the cafe. Evidently the bandits decided against attempting to make it to the waiting automobile through the crowd gathering in front.

The car had been stolen from a parking place in front of the Casino, a short distance away on South Sixth street. It belongs to John Huey Harger.

From the telephone in the Buffalo lunch excited telephone calls were made to officers, and city police, state police and sheriff's officers arrived within a few minutes.

As a quick check was made in the surrounding vicinity, the officers took statements from witnesses of the hold-up and shooting. They learned that the two men were roughly dressed, one wearing a brown coat (the coat found beside the cafe) and the other a tweed coat.

Meagre Clues
No one in the place recognized any characteristics of the gunmen that would help in identification, but after a long check-up Sheriff Lloyd L. Low said

he believed the men were from this vicinity and not "professionals" from outside.

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NAZI SUB TO HARASS SHIPS ON U. S. COAST

believed to be an attempt to cause a general dislocation of shipping on this side of the Atlantic.

Ships along the line of British communications might be forced to take longer routes. The British might be required to extend their convoy operations over a larger area and string out still further the thin line of warships protecting their merchant vessels in the Atlantic.

The report here said it was believed the Germans intended to use only one submarine which would seek refueling supplies from a disguised merchant ship.

The United States neutrality zone extends some 600 nautical miles out from New York. The area is constantly patrolled by ships and planes of the U. S. Atlantic fleet. Thus far, in the few instances of hostile actions within the zone, the U. S. forces have acted merely as observers. These instances have involved running down of German merchant ships by British warships.

There was no indication as to what the U. S. fleet would do if a German submarine began actual hostile operations within the zone.

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Four Hurt In Collision On Keno Highway

Four persons were injured and several others badly bruised and shocked as the result of a head-on collision shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday morning between cars operated by Thomas G. Jamieson, Stewart addition, and Orsemous Nelson, Klamath Falls, one block south of Lien's store on the Keno highway.

Marvin Moore, 25, 1317 Adams street, Weyerhaeuser employee, is in Hillside hospital suffering from bad head cuts. He was a passenger in the Nelson car as was Dan Freeman, Long Bell employee. Neither Freeman nor Nelson was injured.

In Jamieson's car were Mrs. Jamieson and their two young children, Jean, 4, and Billy, 2, and Mr. and Mrs. Roy O. Johnson and daughter, Margie, 11, residents of the Keno highway.

The Johnsons were treated at Hillside hospital for cuts about the head but their condition was not serious. Margie is thought to have received a possible fracture of the collar bone.

The Jamieson car, en route from Klamath Falls, was a total wreck. Jamieson told investigating officers the Nelson car was on the wrong side of the road. Nelson is said to have told officers he was blinded by lights on the oncoming car. Both machines were headed toward Keno following the collision. Nelson's car was badly damaged.

ment by a narrow neck of land easily defended.

Already outnumbered by the Germans in the Balkans, the British numerical disadvantage could be made much more acute almost overnight because of the short, easy Nazi communications with the homeland and the immense reserve of manpower under arms there.

For the present, there seems to be a race between British sea and German rail transport, with the Nazis having advantage in the long run. With British reinforcements making the Greeks stronger daily, it appeared, however, the Germans no longer can choose their own time but must attack as quickly as possible if such a campaign is their intention.

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
