

SEARS OFFERS LIVESTOCK TO 4-H MEMBERS

C. C. Jenkins, 4-H club agent, was advised Monday by T. R. Thompson, manager of the local Sears Roebuck store, that the firm had recently approved awarding of 18 purebred dairy heifers and two purebred dairy bulls to 4-H club members.

A committee including T. R. Thompson, T. B. Watters, chairman of the junior livestock show; County Agent C. A. Henderson, and 4-H Club Agent Jenkins, will judge essays written on the topic, "Why I Want to Become a 4-H Dairy Club Member." In these papers it will be necessary to state how dairying fits into the farming program on the boy or girl's home ranch, Jenkins stated.

Papers must be submitted by April 5, the awards to be made in mid-April. Those interested are asked to get a copy of contest plans and entry blank from Jenkins' office in the federal building.

It is the plan of Sears-Roebuck to award the calves to club members who will "grow them out," and when the first heifer calf is born to return the new calf to Sears who, in turn, will place this heifer calf with another 4-H dairy club member, thus creating a revolving dairy calf project.

The contest is open to all Klamath county boys and girls between the ages of 10 to 16 years. The calves will be purchased from the best herds in the state and Jenkins said it would probably be necessary to go into the western section where exceptionally fine dairy herds have been established.

"We expect this new project to lend considerable stimulus to 4-H dairying in the county due to overcoming the difficulty of financing dairy club work over a long-time period," Jenkins stated. He complimented Sears-Roebuck and T. R. Thompson on taking the lead in promoting the dairy industry among Klamath's young people. The calves will be shown at the junior livestock show in mid-September.

4-H, FFA Calves Showing High Daily Gains in 1941

High average daily gains are being made by 4-H and FFA beef calves now on feed for the 1941 junior livestock show September 13 to 16 inclusive, according to C. C. Jenkins, 4-H club agent, following a visit to the Merrill and Olene clubs this past weekend.

As in the 1940 livestock show, girls again took honors with highest average daily gains, Jenkins stated. Shirley Masten of the Olene Buckaroos, has a Shorthorn steer, "Tuffy," weighing 709 pounds and showing a gain of 2.9 pounds per day. Jo Ann Kandra of the Merrill Buckaroos, has an Angus calf, "Mer-rill," weighing 478 pounds and gaining 2.4 pounds per day.

The following table gives the name of the club member, weight of the calf and average daily gain for a 30 to 60-day period, and also the breed:

News Story of Woman's Death Recalls Memories

A news story from London, which appeared in recent issues of The Herald and News, telling of the death of Mrs. Kathleen Humphrey, a Canadian war worker, killed March 8 in the bombing of a London restaurant, recalled to Mrs. M. J. Young of this city an acquaintance of a number of years ago.

Mrs. Young knew Mrs. Humphrey when she was Kathleen Dunsmuir, a comely young woman of 18, just returned to her home in Victoria, B. C. from school in Paris. Mrs. Young recalled that Miss Dunsmuir later married Molyneux, the noted French designer, who, at that time, was aide-de-camp to her father, Sir James Dunsmuir, lieutenant-governor of British Columbia, and that during the first World War she operated a portable kitchen in France.

After a divorce, following the war, Kathleen re-married, her second husband being a Mr. Humphrey. She had at least two children, a son and daughter who were in London at the time of her death.

Of further interest, according to Mrs. Young, is the fact that the Dunsmuir family was linked with the history of northern California, the city of Dunsmuir being named for Alex Dunsmuir who was an uncle of Kathleen Dunsmuir.

LOCAL FIRM GETS LUMBER CONTRACT

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—National defense program expenditures and contracts totaling \$11,971,530 were authorized for Oregon in the February 18-28 period, the office of government reports announced Monday.

Of the amount, however, \$4,200,000 was an RFC loan for construction of an aluminum plant at Bonneville by the Reynolds Metal company, Richmond, Va. The company subsequently decided to locate at Longview, Wash.

Contracts for army construction included: J. A. Terteling and sons, Boise, Idaho, \$7,547,661 for construction of an ordnance depot at Hermiston (cost plus fixed fee basis); J. F. Sharp Lumber company, Redmond, \$3608, lumber; Johnson and Winsatt, Inc., Klamath Falls, \$22,560, lumber; Patrick Lumber company, Redmond, \$13,825, lumber; Tite Knot pine mills, Richmond, \$118,068, lumber.

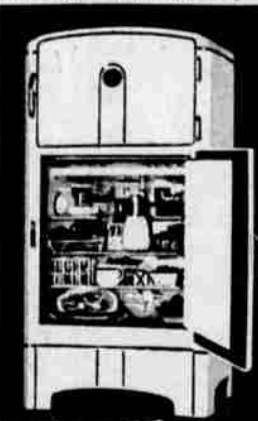
