

JUGOSLAVIA CABINET PUTS OFF AXIS DEAL

power pact on Sunday were held up.

The three ministers — Serb leaders in this nation of mixed peoples — who resigned in protest against a crown council decision to yield to Germany, refused to remain in the cabinet even though Chief Regent Prince Paul ordered them to do so.

Crisis Grows
The dissenters flatly declared they would have nothing more to do with the government.

Their stand, which the country learned via the grapevine method, added to the growing crisis over the governments acceptance of the reich's demands that Yugoslavia align herself with Slovakia, Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria, junior members of the anti-British accord.

A fourth cabinet member who voted against acquiescence to Germany was said to be planning to resign, and the minister to Russia, Gaverilovic, was said to have sent his resignation to Prince Paul.

Serbs to Meet
One of the dissenters, Dr. Branko Cubrilovic, minister of agriculture and leader of the Serb peasant party, called a meeting of his party chiefs to discuss the crisis.

Prince Paul summoned Premier Dragisa Cvetkovic and Foreign Minister Aleksander Cincar-Markovic to the white palace for a conference at which he is reported to have told them their projected trip to Vienna starting tomorrow would have to be postponed while he attempted to reorganize the quarreling government.

He began meeting leaders of the parties represented by the recalcitrant ministers to see if they would agree to name more amenable cabinet representatives.

Political quarters said that only a quick change in the cabinet would enable the official party to leave for Vienna as scheduled.

The tenseness was heightened by disclosure that four of Yugoslavia's most prominent generals were pensioned early in the week as a "mere routine matter."

Observers pointed out that army circles have been among the most vigorous opponents of a surrender to Germany.

But government circles said the remaining high officers had agreed to the government's decision.

Stimson Cautions

Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson also is understood to have cautioned the committee against drastic changes in the bill when he testified yesterday.

The full committee is expected to report the bill tomorrow and the senate will take it up on Monday. Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley (D-Ky.), hopes for a final vote after a maximum of 48 hours of debate.

Maritime commission officials previously stated this country had no ships to spare for Britain and it needed an additional 60 merchant craft to fill minimum United States needs.

To meet this situation, it was said, intercoastal and coastal ships may be shifted to trans-oceanic routes now served by craft which will be turned over to Britain. Traffic normally handled by the intercoastal and coastal ship probably will be handled by railroads.

The nature of the emergency may make it necessary for this government to purchase some of the intercoastal and coastal ships. There were 389 of these vessels of 2000 or more tons each operating in domestic service on December 15, 1940. They do not include Great Lakes shipping.

Another source from which the United States may draw to replace a shipping shortage is some 285 American-owned craft under foreign registry.

Witnesses

Other witnesses were R. E. Switzer, Ira A. Mitcham, Mrs. Anna Turpin, Ray Cummings, P. M. Short and Miles Lepley, all testifying for the defense. Mitcham said he drove up first after the collision of the three cars in the accident. He said one of the cars, driven by Richardson, had passed him going at least 60 or 65 miles an hour. He said when he reached the accident scene all three cars had come to rest.

Cummings, a resident of the Stewart-Lennox addition, testified on the physical condition of Bailey after the accident. He said he went to the scene out of curiosity.

P. M. Short said he arrived while the Richardson car was still moving. The car was on the hard surface of the highway when he first saw it, he testified. It went about 100 feet, turned sharply to the left and flipped over.

District Attorney L. Orth Sismore argued that Bailey was negligent in allowing his car to straddle the yellow line of the highway. He said that skid marks on the road were made by the right wheels of Bailey's car, therefore part of the car must have been over the yellow line. Lamar Townsend and Edwin E. Driscoll, attorneys for the defense, argued that the knee action of the Bailey car was damaged on the left side upon impact with Richardson's car and that the left wheel caused the skid marks.

Abductor Kills Self After Wild Ride With Pair

KANSAS CITY, March 21 (AP) — A crippled, self-styled madman who kidnapped a young couple and terrorized them as he drove their car at 80 miles an hour killed himself late yesterday while three police detectives stood outside his hotel room door.

Police Chief L. B. Reed said the man was Oliver Norris Bridges, Jr., 21, of Sherman, Texas, who had served vagrancy sentences in Los Angeles and Wichita, Kas.

Miss Jeanne Harvey, 19, and James L. Person, 28, told Chief Reed that the man:

Pointed a pistol at them as they emerged from a downtown night club Wednesday night and drove away with them in Person's car.

Kept them captive nearly six hours on a wild ride of more than 250 miles.

Remarked while passing an insane asylum in Kansas, "right there is where I belong."

Commented as they crossed into Kansas, "I'll get 30 more years now for kidnapping and the Mann act."

He once attempted to compel the couple to disrobe but relented after Miss Harvey wept.
