NEW LIBRARY PLAN LAID AT SPRAGUE RIVER

SPRAGUE RIVER — Miss Mary McComb, county librarian, visited Sprague River Thursday, March 20, to help the women of the Service League make plans for the establishment of a new branch library. This library project is planned as the league's chief aim of 1941. Lots have already been purchased and a large number of men have volunteered services as carpenters and helpers.

It is planned to combine the present school libraries with the new town library so that a larger selection of books will be available to both school children and townspeople. Mrs. McComb urged that the library should be opened evenings so that workers and townspeople may spend an hour or two at study.

The town library will be housed in the back of Martin's barber shop for the time being, with Mrs. Hazel Martin as librarian. The days that the library will be opened to the public will be announced later.
