

SEATTLE FLOWER SHOW THROGGED

SEATTLE, March 24 (AP)—The premiere of Mother Nature's "million dollar show" drew 20,000 flower lovers to the civic auditorium yesterday.

The estimate of the cost of the 22nd annual national flower and garden show was made by Alex Henderson of Chicago, president of the Society of American Florists and Ornamental Horticulturists, which is sponsoring the event.

W. J. (Wee) Coyle, auditorium manager, who has been "counting noses" for many years, estimated the first day's attendance and Coyle and Henderson together figured there were at least 1,000,000 blossoms in colorful exhibits on two floors of the spacious auditorium.

This was the first time this queen of all flower shows has been presented in Seattle and it gave the gardeners and florists of the Pacific Northwest the opportunity to show what the evergreen state can produce.

For instance there was a 1000 foot-square woodland setting of evergreen trees, Japanese maples, azaleas and rhododendrons framing a waterfall, beds of 200-square feet each of azaleas, camellias, hydrangeas and geraniums, exhibits of hundreds of blooms of special varieties of roses, some of whose stems were 60 inches long.

Thousands of sweet peas in 10 different displays and an exhibit of 1000 carnations in colors ranging from flesh pink to purple and maroon sent their sweet fragrances throughout the hall.

About \$15,000 in prizes and medals will be awarded in this show although many of the classes are non-competitive. Top prize winners during the first day of the eight-day exposition included: Billy Baxter, Detroit, who won \$750, sharing first place with three Seattle institutions in the contest for the best exhibit covering 1000 feet.

California Counts Traffic Increase

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 24 (AP)—Traffic over the three state-owned toll bridges continued to increase throughout the month of February, the state department of public works reported today.

Total vehicles using the San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge during the month was 1,285,683, an average of 45,917 per day, representing an increase of 58 per cent over that for the same month a year ago.

Traffic over the Carquinez bridge totaled 238,352, which exceeds the record for February, 1940, by almost 80 per cent.

While carrying a much lighter traffic than either of the other bridges, the Antioch bridge, nevertheless, showed a substantial increase over the previous year, with a total of 11,606 vehicles using the bridge.

Crime Increases In California

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 24 (UP)—An increase of 2312 in the number of criminal offenses reported during January and February — as compared with the same months in 1940 — was reported today by the state criminal identification division.

A total of 8311 cases was reported this year, compared with 5999 last year. Burglaries were mostly responsible for the rise with 5129 reported in 1941, against 3966 in 1940.

Crimes were reported for the first two months of this year as follows: Assault to murder, 9; burglary, 5129; fictitious checks and forgery, 871; pickpockets, 206; purse snatching, 340; robbery, 976; miscellaneous, 780.

Last year's crime totals were: assault to murder, 11; burglary, 3988; fictitious checks and forgery, 584; pickpockets, 182; purse snatching, 205; robbery, 604; miscellaneous, 447.

REBER TO HELP WELCOME KYSER

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, March 24—Ehler Reber, Malin, will be one of the members of the Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, who will be on hand to welcome Professor Kay Kyser and his band when they open a spring session of the "College of Musical Knowledge" here Friday night, March 28. Reber, a senior in journalism, is serving on the poster committee for the dance.

The entire Kyser faculty of Ginny Simms, Ish Kabibble, Sully Mason, Harry Babbitt, and the rest of the musical troupe, will be on hand when the professor quizzes six students, chosen at random from the audience as his student body. Kyser will go through the antics "in person" which have made his program a nation-wide attraction.

President Off For Fishing, Relaxing Trip

ABOARD THE U.S.S. BENSON WITH PRESIDENT AT SEA, March 24 (UP)—President Roosevelt, aboard the yacht Potomac and under the protecting guns of the destroyer Benson, headed for the warm waters off the coast of Florida for 10 days of fishing and relaxation.

With the presidential party when it sailed Saturday were Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes and Attorney General Robert H. Jackson.

The presidential yacht, anchored Friday near the entrance to Port Everglades, was tied up only a few hundred yards from a German merchantman flying the red, white and black swastika. The ship was the Arauca, which sought haven in the Everglades in December, 1939, when it fled from the pursuing British cruiser Orion, and which

now is held in port by maritime libels.

The 44 man crew of the German ship generally displays only a small swastika upon the vessel's stern, but when the Potomac and the Benson arrived they broke out a huge flag.

The bill, which carried an urgency clause and went into effect immediately, will permit the state to provide care of the mother and child.

It was introduced by Senator Thomas Keating of San Rafael.

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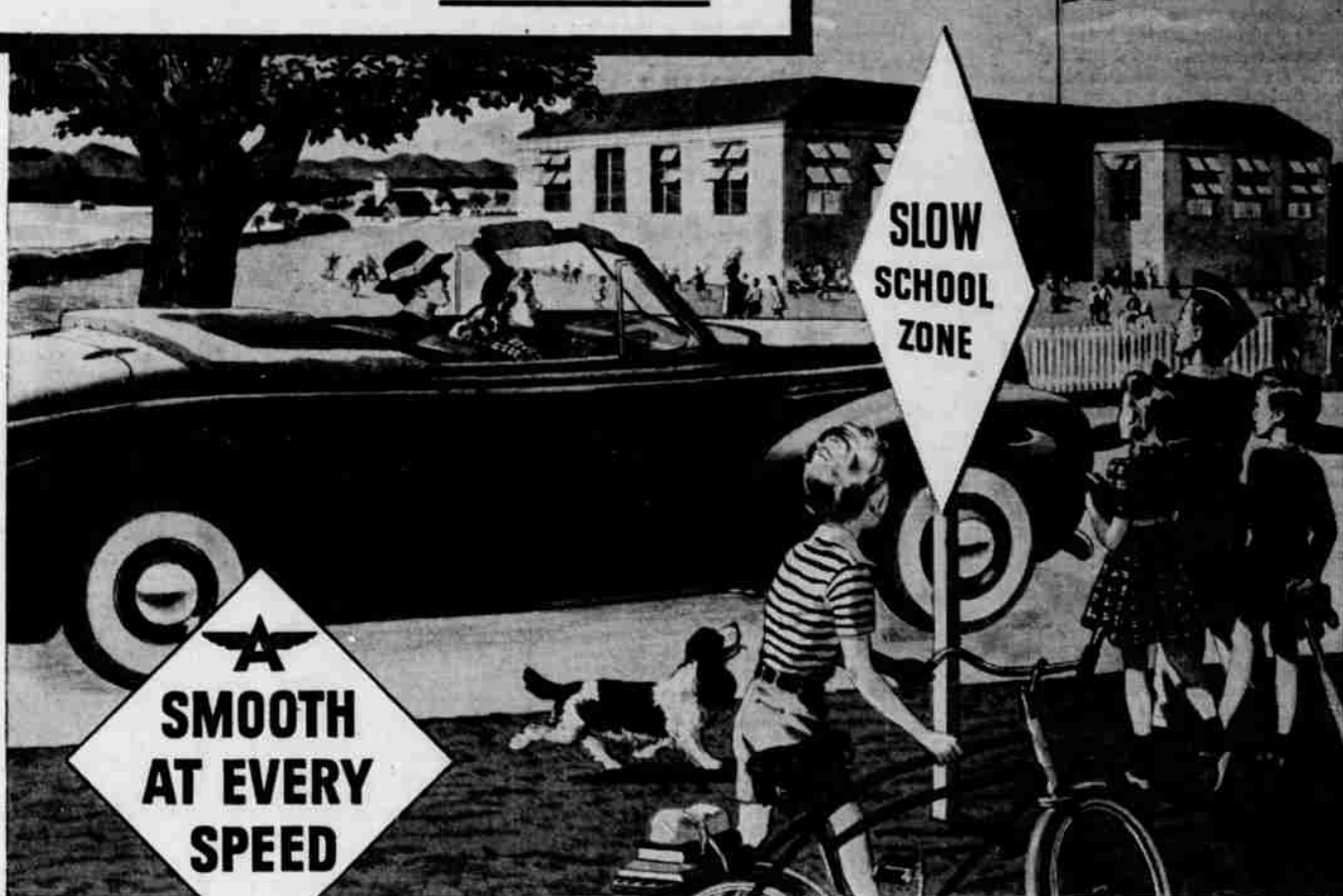
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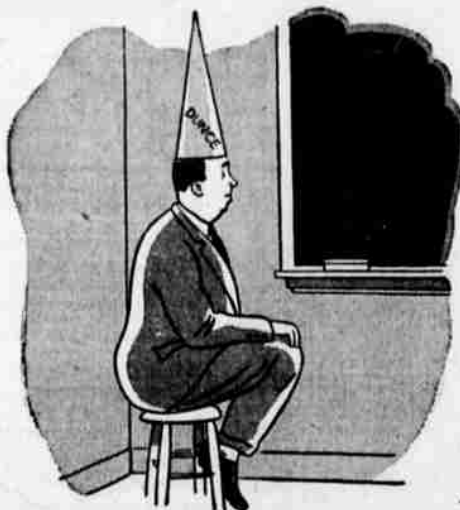
