

STRIKERS FLIP MORE THAN 40 WORKERS' CARS

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who discharged tear gas this morning when a mass of pickets attempted to halt workers from entering the plant. Five pickets were injured in the morning disorder and all required hospital treatment.

The policemen were pelted with stones and strikers then turned on their tear gas guns which they had taken from the police cars. The seven patrolmen

were finally rescued by other police. No arrests were made.

Police Charged

The strikers charged the police deliberately ran the cars into them in an effort to clear a path so night shift workers could enter the gate.

The violence broke out as a crowd of 10,000 massed at the main entrance to the plant and shortly after Sheriff W. Calvin Nickel of Northampton county had appealed to Gov. Arthur H. James for aid in maintaining order.

It was not learned immediately how many, if any, non-strikers gained entrance to the plant at the Saucon gate. The scene was quiet a few minutes after the outbreak.

In his appeal to the governor, Sheriff Nickel said he would be unable to "control the situation" with the men at his disposal. James immediately sent Col. G. Adams, state motor police commissioner, and Lewis G. Hines, labor and industry secretary, to Bethlehem to investigate.

Tear Gas

City police brought the tear gas into play when some members of a group of about 200 pickets massed at the plant's main gate attempted to upset the automobile of a non-striker.

Twenty policemen drove the pickets back in the first attempt. As the worker again moved his automobile in the driveway, the pickets rushed it and one patrolman fired a tear gas shell.

The gas temporarily blinded two pickets and affected four others, and the whole group of pickets retreated to the street.

Police estimated the crowd milling around the main gate during the morning at 6000. Howard T. Curtiss, local SWOC director who called the strike, said the pickets would be strengthened further.

At noon Plant Manager R. A. Lewis said all steel making departments of the plant were "operating substantially at capacity," and said about 70 per cent of the normal force of 21,000 was at work.

Curtiss claimed at least 60 per cent of the workers had joined the strike.

SUPPORT OF STRIKE VOICED BY ORTON

O. M. Orton, international president of the International Woodworkers of America, said here Tuesday that the IWA is fully supporting the strike of the plywood workers against the Kalpine company here. Orton came to town to address plywood workers and others on the labor situation.

The IWA president reiterated the union's claim that the company broke off negotiations with the CIO union committee prior to the strike, which still persists at the plywood plant.

Discussing the issue of a majority at the Kalpine plant, Orton said that the union had accepted a company suggestion that a check of union cards be made. The check, he said, was made by Gerald Murray, county juvenile officer. He said Murray's check showed a majority for the union, that the company refused to accept the check and broke off brief negotiations that followed Murray's report.

Orton said no specific deadline had been set for turning the union cards over to Murray, whereas the company claims that the deadline had been set for 12 noon on February 25 and

that Murray's check was made after that time.

Orton is scheduled to make a radio broadcast Tuesday at 8:15 p. m.

Since the strike occurred, company and union negotiators have been generally at deadlock, chiefly over the majority issue. The union claims the majority has already been established by the card check, while the company has suggested an election be held.
