

ALLIS PLANT ORDERED TO END STRIKE

ly affecting the delivery of navy orders.

"We can no longer wait for settlement of the strike by ordinary means."

"We must ask you to notify your entire force to report for work and start operations immediately. We are sure the country can rely on the patriotic spirit of your workers to return to work on vitally needed defense orders without delay."

"Negotiations can be continued while all men are at work."

Line Added

This line was added to the message to the union leader:

"We expect your full cooperation in carrying out the above program."

The ultimatum cleared the way for use of government's most drastic weapon to assure defense production—the draft of industry—in event the Allis-Chalmers forces refuse to resume operations.

The selective service law empowers the government to draft recalcitrant industries, but does not authorize the drafting of labor.

The government could, however, remove the preferential draft status given employees involved in this and future disputes because of the importance of their work on defense projects. Both weapons were utilized by President Woodrow Wilson during the World war.

park and attempted again to demonstrate. Police interfered again.

Police last night dispersed a group of students at Sarajevo where the assassination of an Austrian archduke in 1914 touched off the World war—when they demonstrated against the pact.

The University of Lubiana was closed after student demonstrations.

Heavy forces of police, armed with machine guns and tear gas bombs, were on the alert to quell demonstrations as Premier Dragisa Cvetkovitch and Foreign Minister Alexander Cincar-Markovitch returned from Vienna, where they made Jugoslavia a satellite of the axis.

They arrived by special train at the Topolcer suburban station and were met by fellow members of the cabinet and diplomatic representatives of the axis powers.

It was reported in diplomatic quarters the cabinet which took the country into the axis camp against widespread opposition would soon be replaced by one of "greater strength" to act during the coming months. General belief seemed to be the government was in control of the situation and opposition was not sufficiently organized to become effective.

TURKS RUSHING DEFENSE WORK

and perhaps later on Turkey." Indicating that it may not be a long wait, diplomatic travelers reaching here from Bulgaria—they are virtually the only ones permitted to leave Bulgaria—said that Germany is believed to have close to 500,000 troops in the Balkan zone.

The German forces, it was said, are "consolidated and ready for action" and many of their officers are talking of the Suez canal and Africa as their ultimate objectives.

British soldiers recently arrived here reported simultaneously that they were aboard a convoy which carried additional British expeditionary forces to Greece.

Hungarians seeking to return to Budapest from Turkey were told by German authorities to delay their departure because all Balkan communications lines are "tied up for military purposes."

Turkish political quarters and the press are generally playing down the significance of the soviet-Turkish declaration and are pointing out that Russia still is "playing along with Germany" but is willing for Turkey to defend her own territory as she sees fit.

growing community's only link with the outside world and that there are no physicians in Sprague River.

He said further that in the winter there are days when it is impossible for children to reach the Sprague River school even though their homes are on the road.

Parks said that the census showed 999 residents in the voting precinct of Sprague River. School attendance has been increasing rapidly until there are now 170 children in the school.

County Engineer Frank Z. Howard said the county plans to spend between \$4000 and \$5000 on the Sprague River road this year, plus about \$1200 in repaving a bridge at the town. He said the money will be used in repaving the worst places on the road.

In answer to a query, Howard said it would cost between \$11,000 and \$12,000 to bring the nine miles of road (between Lakeview highway and Sprague River) to standards permitting the oiling of the road. Oiling would cost about \$2000 a mile.

Ivy Clark, Sprague River justice of the peace, said he had received a letter from Congressman Pierce suggesting that efforts be made to have the Indian service earmark Indian road funds for the Sprague River road. Pierce said that such a plan had been successful in connection with a road on a reservation in Nevada.

In the discussion, past efforts to have the road included on the state highway secondary system were reviewed, and little immediate hope for that was held out.

Justice Clark said he had been informed the county has \$40,000 more this year in its available road funds than last year, and urged that an appropriation be made from the fund to do a permanent, constructive piece of work on the Sprague road.

AFL CLAIMS MAJORITY OF KALPINE MEN

It appeared last night that not only both unions are claiming a majority among Kalpine employees, but both have filed unfair labor practice charges against the company with the national labor relations board.

The CIO union filed such charges several days ago. Another development last night was a report that there would be a "mass demonstration" of CIO pickets at the Kalpine plant on the Weed highway and Klamath river Thursday morning. It was slated to start at 7 a. m.

The CIO has been peacefully picketing the plant with a few men since March 4.

Since the strike started, there have been several meetings between the management and CIO union, but it has been understood they have been deadlocked. The union has claimed it had established a clear majority through a count of union cards, and that the company should proceed to negotiate with the union for a contract. The company has not agreed with the union on the majority issue, and has suggested an NLRB election.

As late as Tuesday, O. M. Orton, international president of the CIO, repeated the claim the CIO had a majority at Kalpine, to be followed by Pavolka's unexpected announcement last night that the AFL claims a majority.
