KALPINE ASKS MEN TO WORK PENDING VOTE

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representative coming Monday will remain to conduct Tuesday's election among Kesterson Lumber corporation employees. At that election, vote will be for AFL, CIO or "no union."

The chamber of commerce telegram read as follows: "REGIONAL OFFICE NATIONAL LABOR RELATIONS BOARD UNITED STATES COURT HOUSE

"SEATTLE, WASHINGTON LOCAL SITUATION HAS ARISEN WHICH AFFECTS COMMUNITY VITALLY. KALPINE PLANT NOW STRUCK WITH BOTH CIO AND AFL CLAIMING MAJORITY AND YOUR BOARD HAS BEEN REQUESTED TO HOLD A HEARING TO DETERMINE THE BARGAINING AGENCY. EMPLOYEES HAVE BEEN OUT OF WORK APPROXIMATELY FOUR WEEKS. IT IS OUR UNDERSTANDING THAT A REPRESENTATIVE OF YOUR BOARD WILL BE IN KLAMATH FALLS TO CONDUCT HEARING IN ANOTHER CASE ON TUESDAY APRIL FIRST AND WE RESPECTFULLY URGE THAT REPRESENTATIVE ARRIVE IN SUFFICIENT TIME TO INVESTIGATE KALPINE MATTER ON MONDAY MARCH THIRTY-FIRST WITH VIEW OF REACHING IMMEDIATE DECISION.

"KLAMATH COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE." The company's lengthy statement issued last night went into detailed history of the Kalpine situations as it developed before and since the strike. It expressed the company's viewpoint that the matter of a majority had not been fully settled by a card count of CIO employees, whereas the CIO union has claimed this had established its majority.

Late Friday the CIO and AFL both issued additional statements in the well-warmed-up labor dispute. The CIO statement follows: "In a press release by Rev. Joe Boyd, he makes the remark that certain leaders of the IWA are trained propagandists. We say that none is needed, any boy fresh out of school could expose the puerile drivel that the leaders of the Oregon Washington district class B Carpenters and Joiners are advancing as facts. "In Rev. Boyd's release, he stated his excuses for a secret meeting with the company officials of a strike bound plant, that also had unfair labor practices filed against them by the striking local.

The thing that hurts him is that he got caught at it. He says the reason that they did not meet in the company office for his "open and honest conference" with the company was because the Carpenter and Joiner union

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announced because it still was being prepared. Yugoslav circles here believed no answer would come from Belgrade for at least another 24 hours.

Nazi comment continued guarded on the probable attitude of the new Yugoslav government toward the axis pact signed by its predecessor but one official spokesman summed it up by saying: "It is not usual for one government to cast overboard treaties signed by a predecessor."

Many Germans were reported leaving Yugoslavia. The impression prevailed among observers here the German government was not inclined to let matters drift and would insist upon a quick clarification of Yugoslavia's attitude.

Nazi official spokesmen said radio reports of the maltreatment of Germans in Yugoslavia "unfortunately were confirmed."

The ALF statement follows: "The key to understanding the Kalpine situation is to be found in the items glossed over in the CIO statement, in the things that the CIO article does not say. The CIO states: 'Immediately after the strike was voted.' Let the CIO tell the public how such strike was voted and how many workers in Kalpine had anything to do with it.

Out of a majority of employees of Kalpine who were in AFL hall by persistent questioning each man denied that he had ever had opportunity to vote himself on strike. We have information that not more than nineteen men were present in the strike vote and not all of those were eligible to vote. This number will check up approximately with the number of men in the picture taken of the picket line.

"It is charged that AFL has no valid interest or members. The fact is that AFL has had cards signed by men in the plant and men carrying union cards, before CIO ever made an appearance in Kalpine.

"The class 'B' smear is utterly unfounded and vicious. It implies some mysterious allegation that the Lumber and Sawmill Workers is not bona fide and is unworthy. There is no proof nor can such proof be made. The Lumber and Sawmill Workers union is giving workers all the rights and benefits of honest collective bargaining.

"The arrangement for a meeting with the management followed our usual procedure. Notice was sent in writing by registered mail notifying management that AFL had majority and asked for a conference. The conference was arranged as previously explained in the union office. As in all instances the

management was free to bring any officials or counsel management wished. Mr. Drury brought three men of the company besides himself. ARMY CONVOY PAUSES HERE TO GAS UP

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three big trucks and filled the cans. A score or more of motorcycles led the caravan of army trucks into town. Men stationed at Center and Main streets directed the convoy to Klamath avenue.
